**RED RULE OF RIOT DRENCHES SEATS**

NON-UNION MEN PULLED FROM CARS BY NEW ORLEANS STRIKERS AND BADLY BEATEN.

**MILITIA MAY BE CALLED TO ACT AT ANY MOMENT**

Street Railway Company Makes Effort to Operate, but Police Are Powerless Against Mob, Which Smashes Windows and Deals Death to All in its Way—Emergency Police Sworn In.

New Orleans, Oct. 7.—Violence started with the first attempt of the railway company to carry out the order of the mayor to run its cars today.  
Just before 7 o'clock the company started out three cars from the barns on Canal street. On each car, manned by a non-union motorman, there was a police force.  
Crowds of strikers and sympathizers were on the streets. When the cars reached Miro street the tracks were blocked and when they came to a stop, made an attack. A pistol shot was fired and the non-union men attacked. One of them, F. H. Scheenick, a conductor from Chicago, was badly beaten.  
When the rioting spent itself three cars were left standing upon the track guarded by policemen. All the windows were smashed. The mob captured Scheenick and his motorman and both consented to join the union. Some of the policemen were hurt by flying stones.  
Will Call Out the Militia.  
When news of the rioting reached the city hall the mayor issued a call for a meeting of the police board. It is understood the object is to swear in emergency policemen.  
Governor Heard will order out the militia when he is notified by Mayor Capdeville that the situation is beyond his control.  
As the company temporarily abandoned the attempt to operate cars on the Canal street line the situation quieted down. The union headquarters will be kept open to receive any offer of negotiations looking to a settlement.

**O'BRIEN VERSUS FINLEN IN COURT**

ARGUMENTS HEARD IN ANNUAL CASE BEFORE HARNEY—OTHER LITIGATIONS HEARD.

After the numerous applicants for citizenship in Judge Harney's court had been disposed of, the presentation of testimony and argument of counsel in the case of W. O'Brien against Miles Finlen was resumed. Attorneys Robert and F. T. McBride presenting the case for the plaintiff and Attorneys C. F. Kelly, A. J. Campbell and R. B. Smith being present for the defendant.

On the application of Attorney Cotter, a judgment of \$700 for the plaintiff was signed and ordered entered in the case of James Peirce against Robert Julien.  
Guy Bellinger has begun an action in the district court against William Tyack and James B. Furey, sheriff, to enjoin them from selling or disposing of the Jimmy lode claim, to which Frank Tyack alleges to have acquired a title by foreclosing a mortgage he held from Thomas Colbert. Bellinger claims to have located the claim after Colbert had abandoned it, and alleges that as he has a clear title to it, Tyack has no share in it, and Sheriff Furey must be restrained from selling it to satisfy Tyack's mortgage. The property was advertised to be sold at auction by Sheriff Furey at 2 o'clock this afternoon, but he was restrained by a temporary injunction issued by Judge Clancy.

**KNEW MONTANA IN THE EARLY TIMES**

PIONEER OF ALDER GULCH DIES IN ADOBE OF HEART FAILURE—LEAVES A NEAT SUM.

Virginia City, Oct. 7.—John W. Hampshire, one of the oldest pioneers of Alder gulch, died suddenly while sitting in a chair in Nick Carey's store in Adobe, two miles below here, last night at 7 o'clock. Heart failure is given as the cause of death by a jury convened this morning by Acting Coroner M. B. Johnson.  
Hampshire was a forty-niner in California and made considerable money there in placer mining. He came to this gulch in 1864 and has been here ever since, engaged in mining. He was nearly 80 years of age at the time of his death. He has no relatives in Montana, but is thought to have some living in West-morland, Pa.  
Hampshire left \$1,700 in a local bank.

**DIVERSITY OF THEIR CROPS**

Southern Agricultural Conditions Are Being Discussed in Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 7.—One hundred and fifty delegates, representing every section of the country, met here today in the sixteenth annual convention of the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment stations. Prof. W. M. Leggett, president of the association and dean of the Agricultural College of Minnesota, responded to an address of welcome which was made by Mayor Mims.  
The opening session was occupied with the reports of the executive board and committees.  
Among the subjects of interest that will come before the convention will be the need of diversity of crops in the South. The beef problem in the Southern states also will receive attention.

**HUM CHICK IS UP TO LATEST TRICKS**

WILY ORIENTAL TELLS HOW END-LESS CHAIN OF CHINESE DODGE GEARY LAW.

**HOW THE SAME PASSPORT DOES FOR A LONG STRING**

It is Easy When You Know How to Work It and Inasmuch as All the Chinks Look Alike, They Go to and Fro on the Same Papers, Which They Sell to Each Other Without Detection.

Hum Chick is a wise Celestial. What he doesn't know about dodging the Chinese Exclusion act would make a very insignificant volume, and as he stood in the hallway of the courthouse this morning, he interested a small group and made an argument that shows that in dusky ways and vainglorious tricks, the "haythen Chinese" is not a whit less peculiar than he was 20 years ago.

Hum is a Chinese merchant and had to come to the office of the clerk of the district court with a bunch of papers which he wanted signed and sealed, so that the authorities would not question the legality of the passport of his partner, Hum Keo, who is about to make a pilgrimage to the Flowery Kingdom.  
In one of the documents it was stated very positively that Hum Keo was not a hony-handed son of toil in any sense of the word; that he was not violating the letter or intention of the Geary act by entering into competition with the American working man, his ox or his ass or anything that is his.  
They All Look Alike.

At the bottom of the paper was a photograph of Hum Keo with his Oriental cap and his equally Oriental smile. It might be learned from the paper that Hum's picture was not appended to the passport for any decorative purposes, but that because of the remarkable similarity that exists between Chinamen in general it was found impossible to rely upon a description for identification without a good clear photograph.

It was Hum Chick's wisdom on the matter of photographing Chinamen and its necessity that struck his small audience with so much interest. In describing the inner workings of the Geary act and the methods of dodging it, he said:  
"What's de malla Uni' Stat's law. No good, velly muchee dam fool all time. No likee Chinaman send him home China. Pay his fare back, too, all time. My cuzzen Hop Hi, he lik go back China. Uni' Stat's law, he come lound he say, 'You catch him papers. My cuzzen he say, 'No, no papers.' 'Velly good, I send you back China,' he says." "The mysterious 'he' is the United States law which in its executive, judicial and legislative departments all in one, Hum blames for its lack of vigilance.  
An Endless Chain.

"Velly good," he added after an oratorical pause, "My cuzzen he go back China, no pay his fare all time he catch him papers in his trunk. When he get China, he say to my udda cuzzen, 'You like him go back Uni' Stat's. You pay me \$25, you luke velly muchee likee me, you takin papers, you name Hop Hi. You go back, stay long time, makim plenty money. Want to come home, go takim Uni' Stat's law no catchim papers, he send you home! Plitty soon I have t'ousand cuzzens only one paper. You savee,' and the smile that spread across his physiognomy threatened the loss of the top half of his head.  
His argument was not delivered in the best English, but it shows that Hum is next to the ropes, and that the vaunted Geary act is capable of being shot full of holes by the wily, yellow peril from Shanghai.

**BURGLARS CAUGHT AT WALKERVILLE**

TWO MEN WHO ARE GIVEN A TRIAL BEFORE JUSTICE O'CONNOR FOR BURGLARY.

William St. Clair and John Harmon, the two sneak-thieves whom the state of Montana has dignified by the name of burglars, were taken from the county jail this afternoon and brought before Justice O'Connor at Walkerville for a preliminary hearing.  
Both are getting fat in jail and do not seem to be materially affected by their confinement. Their wives, both young women who might have better consorts, are permitted to go into their cells to visit them, and when the order came from the justice court this afternoon Mrs. St. Clair was released with her husband.  
Notwithstanding that neither of them can be classed with real live burglars they were fortunate to escape the fate of Martin who was sent to eternity with a revolver bullet while conducting operations last summer.

Many respectable citizens of Butte would willingly shoot daylight in either of the men, if he found him entering his house at night. They both will doubtless spend the next few years in meditative solitude at Colonel Tom McTague's hostelry at Deer Lodge.

**LONGSHOREMEN PERFECT A LARGE ORGANIZATION**

From Nome to San Diego, Pacific Coast Workers Are Now Ready to Stand Together on Anything.  
Delegates from all important points on the coast from San Diego to Nome, Alaska, were in attendance in Portland, Ore., yesterday at the opening session of the first convention of the International Longshoremen, Marine and Transport Workers' Association of the Northwest. Daniel J. Keefe, the international president, presided.  
The main work of the day's session was to perfect plans for the establishment of a central organization to have charge of the work in the Northwest, and the committee that had this in charge proposed in its report that a per capita tax be levied on all of the unions for the purpose of keeping an organizer and a paid secretary, who would have charge of the coast work and through whom local difficulties could be reported. This will facilitate action without having first to consult the national organization.  
The most important report was the organization committee's.
