THAT REBELLION GROWS SERIOUS

TURKS ARE UNABLE TO DISLodge MACEDONIANS FROM PASS AND MANY ARE KILLED.

CONCERTED EFFORT FOR LIBERTY NOW PROBABLE

For Their Altars and Their Fires, for the Green Graves of Their Sires, God and Their Native Land, the Modern Descendants of Philip of Macedonia Are About to Strike.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] London, Oct. 10.—Conflicting reports have been received as to the actual situation in Macedonia. The correspondents who have visited Salonica give varying accounts, some to the effect that the rebellion is not important, while others, the correspondent in Athens of the Standard, for example, declare this morning that the situation is very grave and that people possessing any considerable wealth are leaving the country.

In Vienna there is a tendency to minimize the seriousness of the revolutionary outbreak. It is asserted that two opposing Macedonian committees are neutralizing each other and that the movement will soon die of inanition providing Turkey effectually guards all mountain passes.

THOUSANDS WILL BE OUT OF WORK

SCARCITY OF COAL MAY COMPEL THE NEW YORK GARMENT WORKERS TO CEASE OPERATIONS.

UNABLE TO HEAT THEIR IRONS UNDER CONDITION

Trans-Atlantic Traffic Hindered as Never Before—Rumor That British Miners May Take Advantage of Strike in France and the United States and Try for Better Pay Themselves.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, Oct. 10.—"If the miners' strike continues a few days longer," says the Tribune, "paralysis of the garment and cloak industry, one of the greatest sources of employment on the East Side, may be expected."

"One of the most conservative members of the Garment Makers' union, who has been for years associated with that industry, is quoted to the effect that 10 days more of the strike will mean the throwing out of work of at least 15,000. "This will be caused by the inability of the pressers to get any coal or any other fuel with which to heat their irons."

"A good deal of the pressing is done in the tenements. Women and children do a considerable share of it, and the margin of profit is so small that the cost of changing to another mode of heating is declared to be out of the question."

First Touch of Winter. "Inhabitants of this city are now feeling the first touch of cold weather. At 5 o'clock this morning the temperature was 46 degrees above, a drop of 27 degrees since 1:30 p. m. Thursday, and three degrees colder than at midnight."

After Return Cargoes. "Agents of more than 25 large steamers that have been chartered to bring coal and iron and steel to the country are now seeking return cargoes for their vessels. "They are offering them for various dates up to December, loading at 15 7/8d for the largest ships, and 19d for smaller vessels, and quite a number of steamers have been chartered so far this month for return cargoes, largely on the foregoing terms."

CANNON HEAVY SHOTTED SHE WAITS FOR BATTLE

Colombian Rebel Gunboat Is Laying for Federal Craft and Means to Do Some Things to Her.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] San Francisco, Oct. 10.—The officers of the steamer Acapulco, which has arrived here from Southern ports, state that they saw the Colombian revolutionist gunboat, Padilla, at a point about 20 miles south of Punta Arenas, Costa Rica, here to and, apparently, lying in wait for the steamer Paos, which was purchased some time ago from the Costa Rican government by the insurgents to be used as a warship.

Carnegie Shells Out. London, Oct. 10.—Andrew Carnegie's gift of \$75,000 to Belfast and \$35,000 for Limerick, for the establishment of libraries, have been accepted.

Tunnel Caves In. San Rafael, Cal., Oct. 10.—One man was killed, another fatally, and four others more or less seriously injured today by the caving in of a tunnel on the North Shore line near Inoules.

Panhandle Secures Concession. New York, Oct. 10.—The Rapid Transit commission yesterday voted to grant the franchise to the Pennsylvania Railway to build a tunnel, which the road asked for, and granted it to the company on its own terms.

Forest Fire in Greece. Athens, Oct. 10.—An immense forest fire of incendiary origin is raging at Piekermi, midway between Athens and the Marathon river. A large force of troops has been dispatched to the aid of the fire brigade.

At Clark University. Worcester, Mass., Oct. 10.—The collegiate department of Clark university was dedicated, and President Carroll D. Wright was inaugurated yesterday. Senator Hoar, president of the board of trustees, presided and made an eloquent address.

Irish Leaders Coming. London, Oct. 10.—John Redmond, chairman of the United Irish League, accompanied by John Dillon, yesterday went to Liverpool, whence they will sail for Boston to attend the national convention of the United Irish League, which is to be opened in that city October 19.

Another Peasant Outbreak. Berlin, Oct. 10.—Another peasant uprising has broken out in the division of Peltava, Russia. Fierce conflicts are occurring between the peasants and local forces who are now being reinforced. Many persons are reported to have been killed or wounded.

To Get After the Rebels. Morocco, Oct. 10.—Negotiations with the Berbers tribes at Mequinez have been stopped. It was found that their only object was to gain time. The sultan is preparing to take a large expedition from here with the purpose of thoroughly punishing the rebellious Berbers.

New Electrical Discovery. Los Angeles, Oct. 10.—Dr. O. S. Barnum, a Los Angeles physician, claims to have made a new discovery in the use of the cathodray, which increases its intensity fully 100 per cent by the use of multiple spark gaps, introduced at intervals on the electrical circuit.

No Truth in It. Buda Pest, Hungary, Oct. 10.—There is absolutely no truth in the report circulated by a news agency in the United States that the Magyar independent party in the lower house of the Hungarian parliament, Wednesday offered a resolution declaring the newly born son of Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his Morganatic wife, Princess Hohenberg, to be heir to the Hungarian throne, and expressing the hope that Hungary would insist that he ascend the throne at any cost.
