

MELROSE CITIZENS HAIL CANDIDATES

EVERYONE WHO ATTENDED MEETING OF SATURDAY NIGHT WILL GO FOR G. O. P.

NUMBER OF CANDIDATES MAKE ROUSING SPEECHES

And the Dance After the Talking Put Everybody in Good Humor—Speakers Show That the Republican Party is the Party of the People, for Candidates Are Nearly All Laboring Men.

Republicans opened the campaign in Melrose Saturday night with a rousing meeting. The citizens of the little town turned out en masse to meet the candidates and an enthusiastic session was held, in which the speakers outlined the plan of campaign, which is to result in victory November 4.

Several of the county candidates were present and all made brief addresses, as did also A. N. Yoder, chairman of the county central committee. Those journeying from Butte to be present, were: Judge J. S. Shropshire, candidate for district judge; J. H. Grice, candidate for county attorney; James Tachell, candidate for county coroner; Malcolm Gillis, candidate for state senator, and M. E. Le Blanc and Cyrus Retalack, candidates for the legislature.

After the speech making there was a social and dance which was participated in by nearly every one present and it was a most enjoyable as well as instructive affair.

Harney Made a Hit. Judge Harney of Melrose was the life of the occasion, and as presiding officer, musician and leader of the grand march, he made a hit. He was equally at home in either position and if the gathering was not a success in every way, it was not the genial and versatile judge's fault.

Malcolm Gillis was the first speaker and he discussed the political situation almost wholly from a local workingman's standpoint.

"Which shall rule," quoted Mr. Gillis, "wealth or man? Which shall lead—money or intellect? Who shall fill public stations—educated and patriotic freemen, or the feudal serfs of corporate power?"

"In this contest," he continued, "the republican party of Montana and Silver Bow county stands undeniably, unequivocally, emphatically the organized instrument of the common people of the state."

Mr. Gillis then proceeded to show that a large percentage of the republican nominees were laboring men and carried union cards in their pockets.

Judge Shropshire explained that he had not intended to speak, but that he yielded to the entreaties of his old friends in Melrose and made a few remarks relative to the local situation.

He was followed by Chairman A. N. Yoder in an able and comprehensive speech, relative to the political life of Montana and the part the republican party plays.

M. E. LeBlanc made a rousing address, which was well received. He was followed by James Tachell, who warmed the hearts of the sympathetic audience by a few good-natured remarks. If Melrose voters have their way about it, Mr. Tachell will be the next coroner.

Cyrus Retalack made a brief talk and then the dancing commenced and continued until midnight.

Cattle Thieves Are Not Easy to Convict in Yellowstone Valley.

Livingston, Oct. 13.—Sheriff Belet, who has been in the Upper Yellowstone valley, investigating the cattle stealing cases recently brought to light there, returned last night without having gained any further evidence.

It has been demonstrated by the famous Gasaway case, tried last spring that unless the owners can prove that the hides discovered were those of their cattle, it is impossible to convict a man of the charge.

WALL STREET STOCKS

Today's Quotations: [BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, Oct. 13.—Stocks opened weak under the burden of selling of from 1,000 to 7,000 shares in the principal active stocks, the latter of Missouri Pacific.

The western and southwestern stocks were most acutely affected, but large fractional losses were shown in other parts of the list. Saturday's professional short-sellers covered on the opening decline and the buying caused a steadier and higher market for a while. The bears then sold the list again on evidence of long selling and got prices lower than before.

Missouri Pacific lost 4; Delaware and Hudson 3/4 and St. Paul, Louisville, Illinois Central, New York Central and Canadian Pacific 2 to 4.

There was a sprinkling of other less prominent railroads and specialties that were notably weak.

The bank statement Saturday was taken as an indication of continuing stringency of money and prompted liquidation for long account. Prices continued the downward trend under a steady stream of liquidation. The 15 per cent money rate at the opening intensified the pressure to sell. Delaware and Hudson's loss reached 5. General Electric 7/8; U. S. Express, 10; Missouri Pacific, 4 1/4; Louisville, 4 1/2; Illinois Central, 4 1/4; St. Louis and San Francisco and New York, Ohio and St. Louis, 3 1/4; and St. Paul, Northwestern, Canadian Pacific, Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie stocks and some minor stocks 3 or over.

The average losses ran from 1 to 3 points.

The market steadied at noon. Louisville recovered 2 and Missouri Pacific, Canadian Pacific, St. Paul, New York Central, Reading and a few other stocks a point. The market became duller at the rally.

Bonds were weak at noon.

The rally did not go far and prices slipped back a fraction in the period of dullness and waiting that followed. Money loaned as high as 18 per cent. Lackawanna, after opening up a point, broke five.

Cal money rate eased off slightly. The appearance of some large orders for Reading, St. Paul and the Pacific caused an expansion of the general demand and the shorts were inclined to run to cover. Business increased considerably. The principal gains included 6 in New York Airbrake, 4 in Delaware and Hudson, 3 in Lackawanna and Sloss-Sheffield, and 2 more in St. Paul, Northwestern, Louisville, Illinois Central, Missouri Pacific, New York Central, Reading, Metropolitan and a few others.
