REPORTS FROM MINES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Stephen A. Bywater of Kalispell Has Returned From the North With Some Good Reports.

Stephen A. Bywater of Kalispell, president of the Broken Hill Mining & Development company (limited) has just returned from a visit to the company's property near Ymir, B. C. President Bywater is well known throughout the Northwest. He has for years been a passenger conductor on the Great Northern, running out of Kalispell.

He has connected with him, as vice president of the company, Cornelius Shields, second vice president and general manager of the Dominion Coal company and the Dominion Iron and Steel company of Cape Breton island, and formerly assistant general superintendent of the Great Northern, with headquarters at Spokane. John F. Burns, an attorney of Ymir, is secretary and treasurer of the company.

The property was located about six years ago by Philip White, who, with Conductor Bywater, is the principal owner. It contains a group of four claims, situated on the south slope of Mount Massive, on the north side of Wild Horse creek, about seven miles east of Ymir. There are about 83 acres in the group.

GOOD NEWS FROM THE WEST FISHER DISTRICT

Little Joe Mining Company Said to Have a Good Thing Near the Town of Cabinet.

The Little Joe Mining company of Kalispell owns the Little Joe claim and a water right in Fourth of July gulch in the West Fisher district. The claim is located about two miles from Cabinet. It has been developed by about 100 feet of tunnels and a series of open cuts along the course of an vein. The following is taken from the prospectus:

"It has been demonstrated that the lead extends the entire length of the company's property and is from three to eight feet wide. were made between July and September, amounting to only \$30,885.936. This difference is partly accounted for by the heavy division of profits in the first quarter from 1902 earnings; while the payments in the third quarter were much affected by the smaller earnings in the first six months of this year. There have been a number of new companies added to the list.

Of the \$10,797,181 paid, nearly one-half has been contributed in small monthly or quarterly declarations by Colorado, Utah and other mines. The largest individual payers were the American Smelting & Refining company, \$2,625,000 on its preferred stock; Silver King mine of Utah, \$900,000; Homestake of South Dakota, \$894,000; and Daly West, of Utah, \$720,000. The three last named companies make regular monthly payments.

The copper mines paid \$8,951,481. The Montana and Michigan companies continue to pay the bulk of these dividends, although there have been some declarations from California and Arizona by properties which are largely controlled in Great Britain.

TO DOUBLE MILL CAPACITY

Gold Reef Mining Company Proposes to Push the Work on the Property.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Lewistown, Oct. 15.—Since the transfer of the Great Northern mines to the Gold Reef Mining company the pay-roll has increased to \$3,000 a month. A considerable amount of new ground is being opened up and the mill is being thoroughly overhauled.

The tanks are now being enlarged for the purpose of doubling the mill capacity, and mining operations will be conducted with renewed vigor during the coming winter.

WORKING ON NORTH STAR GROUP OF MINES

Said to Be True Fissures and Veins Are Almost Perpendicular So Far as Developed.

D. L. Gillis has returned from the West Fisher district. Where he has been at work on the North Star group of claims, which is located on Great Northern mountain on West Fisher creek and adjoins the Mother Lode properties.

There are five claims in the group—the North Star, Evening Star, Portland, Bluebird and Fraction. They are owned by D. L. Gillis and John Burgoyne.

Unlike the properties so far found in the West Fisher, these claims are located on a fissure vein, standing about straight up and down, and the values are in silver and lead, with gold as a by-product.

The developments consist of a tunnel 130 feet deep on the North Star and another tunnel 40 feet deep on the Evening Star. The balance of the development work consists of open cuts across the vein on the other claims. The ledge is four feet wide in the face of the 40-foot tunnel on the Evening Star and will average three feet wide where it has been cut at the several places along its course. The formation is slate.

It is not the intention of the owners to further develop the property this year.

Screenings.

There will be four saloons and three stores in Roosevelt, Thunder Mountain district, during the winter.

G. V. Burton of Helena has made a report on some mining property near Evergreen, Colo., for New York parties.

Manager Dixon of the Tarbox Mining company of St. Regis, Missoula county, Mont., reports that all the mines around Saltsee, Mont., are working.

The New Mines Sapphire Syndicate of Yogo filed an annual statement at Great Falls last week, showing a capital of \$100,000, paid up, with liabilities amounting to \$36,242.

A. R. Meyer, a member of the board of directors of the American Smelting & Refining company, is quoted as saying that it is only a question of a few months' time until the Argentine smelter at Tola, Kans., which was dismantled a year ago, will be reopened and operated.

Charles Murray and Ed. Miller, lessees of the Lead-King mine, one of Dr. Mussigbrod's properties at Garnet, recently shipped a full carload of ore, which gave smelter returns of \$184 per ton. The mine has been developed to more than 500 feet, the ore being of good milling quality. The mine is temporarily closed on account of a breakdown in the machinery.

Some idea of the demand for labor in the Transvaal mines is found in a recent report of the chamber of mines which shows that at the close of June there were employed in the gold mines 6,727 white men and 29,410 negroes. This was an increase of 2,359 whites and 10,144 negroes over the number reported on January 1; but even in June only about one-third of the milling capacity was employed.
