REPUBLICAN RALLY TONIGHT

Everything Ready to Make the Meeting One of the Most Rousing in the History of the Party in this County.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 18.—The Lincoln Republican club held a meeting last night to make final preparations for the big rally tonight. A big parade has been arranged, which will be pulled off before the program at the opera house begins. A prominent feature in the parade will be a flambeau brigade, which is expected to attract a considerable amount of attention. David Marler will be grand marshal and his assistants will be T. J. Kerlin, J. W. James, J. B. Proulx and Horace Barker. The parade will start from the republican headquarters on Main street, thence marching to Park avenue, thence west on Park two blocks, thence south two blocks to Fourth street, east on Fourth to Ash street, north on Ash to Park avenue, west on Park to Main street and thence to the Margaret theater. Philip Daniels will have charge of the ushers that will seat the big crowd and Harvey Neil will superintend the lighting of the big bonfire. He will also look after the pyrotechnical display, which is said to be one of the best ever given in Anaconda. Two hundred flambeaux have been secured for the parade and these will make an impressive showing. The opening address will be made by Dr. J. M. Sligh, who will also preside at the meeting. Senator Carter will make the chief address of the evening and it is sure to be such a one as will stir all of the people to action, for Senator Carter is well known in Anaconda and never fails to draw a large and enthusiastic crowd. On his arrival from Butte this afternoon, the senator was shown through the Washoe smelter by a committee of prominent republicans.

PROTEST OVER THE HEINZE MISSTATEMENT

Business Men of Anaconda Deny Misrepresentations to the Effect That Business Is at a Standstill in This City or That the Municipality Has Gone Back in Any Way in Past Five or Six Years.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 18.—The citizens and business men of Anaconda have been greatly exercised of late by the efforts of a scurrilous publication, issued from a fatherless word factory in Butte, unworthy the name of newspaper office, to convince the people of the state of Montana that Anaconda, the Smelter City of the state of Montana, is on the verge of ruin and in the midst of a business depression the like of which has never been known before in the history of the world. In carrying out the dirty scheme the publishers of Heinze's newspaper, the Reveille, have from time to time secured the services of some kodak fiend and sent him to Anaconda to photograph empty buildings and have published these photographs as being taken on the main business thoroughfares of this city. In every instance the photographs taken were of some vacant and abandoned store room on either Commercial avenue, Front street or Upper Main street. They would have it understood that the merchants who once occupied these places have long since made assignments and "gone broke."

The fact of the matter is that the merchants who once flourished on Commercial avenue, Front street, or Upper Main street, now occupy for the most part brick structures on Main street or Park avenue. Several years ago Park avenue was but a street unadorned. At that time Commercial avenue was a busy hive of industry. Now the conditions are reversed. Park avenue is built up in brick the greater part of six blocks, reaching from Main to Birch streets. One side, the south, is to all practical purposes, solid. The other is not so much so, but there are very few vacant lots. In all this distance there is not a vacant room to be had. On the other hand, in its palmiest days, the business portion of Commercial avenue covered but three blocks. About 30 per cent of these buildings are now vacant. Monuments of Prosperity. To the residents of Anaconda who have watched the growth of the city for the last few years these empty buildings stand as a monument to the prosperity and advancement of the city socially and industrially. The old merchants who spent years on Commercial avenue during the early days of the city are now located on Main street or Park avenue in much superior buildings and, besides, these merchants are the ones that have come at a comparatively recent date.

But a few years ago the name, East Third street, carried but little weight with it. Now it means much. Blocks from the heart of the city it boasts grocery stores, drygoods stores, in fact, mercantile establishments of every description. These have all grown up with the decline of Front street and Commercial avenue. The cause of all this moving is very apparent. In every city there is, as it were, a period of probation. A certain time must elapse before people will believe in the future of a place. They will not invest their money on hearsay. And during that period the merchants occupy the buildings which are the least expensive. The resident portion of the city has no costly mansions. After it has been demonstrated, however, that a prosperous and live city is an assured fact, a change takes place. Men with money to invest are willing to invest

it. They choose the most suitable location they can find. This then is the first reason why Commercial avenue and Front street property has declined in value. With the erection of the new smelters on the southern side of the valley the street car line was of necessity made to run down Third street. This took much traffic from Commercial and increased that on Park avenue and Third street. The postoffice was moved from East Commercial avenue to Main street. Energetic business men recognize this as the forerunner of a general movement and began to look for buildings on Park and Main streets. Those who were not successful in getting something made known their wants and moneyed men erected blocks to suit them. Only Changed Streets. So the decline of that portion of the city next to the railroad may be laid to, first, the gradual growth and development of the city; second, the removal of the postoffice from that end of town, and, thirdly, to the fact that the new smelters were built on the other side of the valley and the street car line moved two blocks farther south, causing a general movement towards that part of town. Consequently the business men followed the trade and today there are numerous vacant store rooms on Front street and Commercial avenue. Any business man or resident of the city of Anaconda will not hesitate to testify to the truth of these statements. So it is no wonder that the willful misrepresentation of a vile and totally irresponsible sheet should meet with a great deal of severe criticism. It is an injustice to the city of Anaconda as a city, and to the people who make their homes here and who have helped to make it what it is, one of Montana's best cities. Concerning this matter Mayor Stephens said yesterday: "The willful misrepresentation of the condition of affairs in Anaconda, as made by this band of political renegades, is one of the nastiest pieces of work I have ever seen. I have lived in Anaconda for years and I am proud of it. It is my home and the home of my family. I have watched the growth of business and commercial interests here with pleasure and I do not like to see such

Suit Over Him Involves Many Times the Worth of the Dog—Case Is to Go to the Upper Courts.

The suit was brought before Judge Quane, where Mrs. John secured a judgment for \$25 damages, \$5.50 in costs and \$50 more in case the defendant did not produce the dog. In the appeal, Grououd and Sperry say they were not given a fair trial, in that they went to Quane's court in April and were told the case had been settled. Later, they were notified by Constable Rentz of the judgment secured and that they must pay the damages and costs and surrender the dog. The men will fight the case in the upper courts and the contest is likely to make the spaniel an expensive canine for some one. They Get a Rest.
