

RAVENOUS FLAMES LICK UP HIS GORE

NEGRO ASSAILANT OF A WHITE WOMAN TAKEN FROM JAIL AND BURNT IN ARKANSAS.

DEAF EARS TURNED TO HIS PITEOUS CRIES FOR MERCY

Sheriff is Powerless to Withstand Mob Which Acts in an Orderly Manner—Another Negro is Wanted by the Populace Which Has Started on the Hunt—Murdered Mrs. Edward Lewis.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Forest City, Ark., Oct. 21.—Charles Young, a negro charged with assaulting and afterwards murdering Mrs. Ed Lewis, a white woman, was burned last night by a mob of infuriated citizens of this county.

The sheriff used every effort against this extreme measure. He had telephoned to Judge Hutton, who had proposed to come today and give immediate trial for the negro, and the leaders of the mob had given the sheriff positive pledges that they would await the trial and take no violent measures.

About 8:30 o'clock last night a mob marched to the jail and demanded the keys. Deputy Sheriff Murphy undertook to communicate with Sheriff Williams, whereupon members of the mob took the cell keys from Murphy, and, breaking in the jail door with sledge hammers, dragged the prisoner from his cell.

Sheriff Williams was powerless. In the meantime, but his protests were not heeded. The mob took the negro to a point about half a mile east of town, bound him, piled wood around him and set fire to it.

The negro begged piteously for his life, but the mob turned deaf ears. In a short time flames leaped up and he expired, in the presence of several hundred men. After Young had been put to death the mob started in quest of a negro, alleged to have been implicated in the killing of Mrs. Lewis. At midnight he had not been found.

CHICAGO GRAND JURY HAS FOUND GORMLEY GUILTY

President of the Masonic Temple Association Convicted of Conspiracy to Dodge Large Taxes.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Chicago, Oct. 21.—The grand jury has returned an indictment against James H. Gormley, president of the Masonic Temple association, for alleged complicity in the transactions by which an effort was made to have the taxes of the corporation, amounting to over \$26,000, marked as paid on the books of the county treasurer, when no money was paid. The evidence upon which the indictment was voted was given in the trial of Capt. Edward Williams, who is charged with conspiracy to avoid paying the taxes of the association.

Dr. David G. Rush, who was a director in the Masonic Temple association until July 1, testified that he heard Williams and Gormley discussing the payment of the taxes, and that Williams said that the \$26,000 of taxes could be paid for \$20,000, and that it was with the consent of Gormley that the job of avoiding payment of the taxes was undertaken.

After Dr. Rush had given his evidence in court he was taken before the grand jury and several hours later the indictment was voted, Gormley being charged with conspiracy.

He has always denied that he had any knowledge of the attempt to avoid the payment of the taxes.

THEY ARE AFTER PROPERTY

Combination of English and German Capitalists Are Looking Around.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, Oct. 21.—A party of English capitalists, including W. E. Sylvester, Silas Schwabe and Baron von Koenig of Germany, Lewis Randall, John Perry, W. A. Simpson, E. E. Holmes and P. D. Tuckett, which left this city September 16 on a tour of inspection of the partially completed Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroads, has returned.

The Tribune quoted Lewis Randall as saying: "One of the things which pleases us most is that we are able to announce for the first time that we have obtained the services of General Manager Dickinson of the Union Pacific road, who, after January 1 next, will organize the same office for our company."

Sues Big Ditch Company.

Billings, Oct. 21.—F. A. Schauer, through his attorney, W. M. Johnson, has brought suit against the Italian Ditch company for damages amounting to \$315. Schauer alleges that the water from the company's ditch overflowed his land and destroyed a large quantity of hay and converted tillable land into marshes.

Members of special groups moved in contrary directions, notably the soft coal and anthracite stocks. Fluctuations were not important either way and the market became dull after the first few minutes of trading. Stocks made a momentary display of firmness under the influence of a point rise in sugar and fractional gains in some of the Pacific railroads.

The general market sold off again to about the opening level. Lackawanna lost 3/4, Metropolitan Street Railway 1/2 and Smelting preferred a point. The general market was sluggish, owing to the reduction of pool operations and the interest attached to the miners' convention. Prices hardened toward noon under the leadership of St. Paul, which rose a point from the lowest.

Bonds were irregular. The failure of the market to respond to the calling off of the coal strike caused active selling for both accounts and losses of half points were made by St. Paul, Atchison, Canadian Pacific, Missouri Pacific and the Pennsylvania group of stocks. Wabash declined 3/4. St. Paul preferred 3/4 and Northwestern 5/4.
