ARE WORKING TOWARD ANACONDA WITH POLE

Western Union Telegraph Men Are Making Rapid Progress on the New Lines to This Bustling City. [SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 21.—Foreman C. T. Green of the Western Union Telegraph company's construction gang was in the city yesterday. Mr. Green has 20 men at work erecting a new line of poles from Stuart to Anaconda along the new grade built last spring by the B., A. & P. railroad.

This line of poles will carry several new wires into Anaconda. Once they get that finished a new wire will be strung from Anaconda to Butte via the B., A. & P., necessitated by the increasing business out of Anaconda. The workmen are coming towards Anaconda from Stuart and will have reached this city with the new line within a few days.

YOU WILL HAVE TO PAY UP

Two is Going to Send You a Bill for Your Taxes in a Few Days. Anaconda, Oct. 21.—County Treasurer P. D. Twoby will send out the tax announcements during the next few days. The entire force of the treasurer is at work on the notices and they will be sent to 1,800 taxpayers.

The notice is a postal card announcing the amount of the owner's taxes and that failure to pay before November 30, will result in a fine of 10 per cent of the total amount.

THEY WILL NOT STARVE IF EVERYBODY DOES IT

Anaconda Has Done a Lot to Keep Those Fellows Down in the Coal Fields Alive and Will Do More. [SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 21.—If the striking miners in Pennsylvania receive as much financial assistance from the other towns of the country as they have been getting from this city they should not suffer much dire distress. Anaconda probably breaks the record for subscriptions in proportion to the population.

Yesterday afternoon a draft for \$1,077 was sent the miners by P. F. McNeary, financial secretary of the Mill and Smelters' union. This will be about half the amount which will be sent from Anaconda this month.

The sum sent yesterday was made at the ball held at Turner hall by the union. There are a large number of donations for the miners still uncollected. The Typographical union is sending \$36 a week, the Mill and Smelters' union \$400 a month, and various other organizations are sending smaller sums. The subscription for Anaconda this month will amount to about \$2,000.

The visitors were surprised and well pleased to see the perfection of the works here. The object of their visit is to gain ideas for the construction of a new smelter in Mexico by the American Smelting & Refining company.

BUTTE MEN GET CONTRACT FOR NEW CATHOLIC KIRK

Messrs. Wynne & O'Connor Will Erect the Handsome Structure to Be Added to St. Peter's.


