WHISKY GULCH PLANT IS ONE OF THE BEST EXTANT

Cyanider in Lewistown Treats Ore as Low as 65c Per Ton Under Management of a Man Who Must Know. Lewistown, Oct. 21.—The Whiskey gulch cyaniding plant of the Central Montana Mines company is one of the most complete and satisfactory plants in the Judith mountains and under the management of Charles T. Durell is run at a small expense—less than 65 cents per ton for treatment.

The bulk of the ore now being treated is obtained from the Myrtle basin, on the west side of the hill from the plant and distant about half a mile. The ore is brought to the mill in cars through a working tunnel, and though the old horse cars are yet used, it is probable that in the near future an electric system of transportation will be installed.

COOKE CITY IS HAVING A BOOM OF REAL SORT

All They Need There Now to Make it a Big Camp is a Railroad, So a Citizen of It Says.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Livingston, Oct. 22.—Jim Hall, the well-known Cooke City miner, is in the city this week. He reports that in the camp is looking better than it has for a number of years, and that all it requires now is a railroad to make Cooke City one of the best mining camps in the state.

He says that the rich strike recently made on the Scotch Bonnet property has not been exaggerated and that several assays made from ore taken from the new vein runs over \$300 a ton. Cooke has experienced the most remarkable weather this year that it has since he can remember, and he had been there for nearly 20 years. There is no snow so far to interfere with work or travel—a very unusual condition for this season of the year, particularly in such a high altitude.

A. J. Pritchard, discoverer of gold in the Coeur d'Alenes 20 years ago, died in his log cabin in Murray on the evening of October 3, after a long illness, the direct cause of death being heart failure. He lost much land through litigation in the years he lived in the Coeur d'Alenes.

Gold was discovered in Colorado in January, 1859. The state has yielded since then gold to the amount of over \$400,000,000. Gold was discovered in California in 1848. That state's gold output is figured by some statisticians as being \$1,400,000,000.

An extensive trial run has been made on the ores of the Homestake mine near Helena, three miles west of Wickes.
