MARTIN DEE IS TO BE TRIED TONIGHT

TRADES AND LABOR ASSEMBLY TO LOOK INTO MATTER OF EMPLOYMENT OF SCABS.

There will be a meeting of the Silver Bow Trades and Labor Council committee this evening for the purpose of inquiring into the Martin Dee matter.

At the last meeting of the council a committee was appointed for the purpose of making inquiry into the facts relative to Mr. Dee employing unfair labor and refusing to get right when notified by the union. The committee set tonight as the time at which it would hear Mr. Dee's defense, if he has one, and he will be given an opportunity to tell his side of the story.

Already the Building Trades Council have decided that Mr. Dee is not a friend of union labor, although a union man himself, and they have published resolutions condemning him.

EDWARD M. CONANT WHO IS WANTED IN THIS CITY

On a Charge of Forgery, Preferred by Alex Vellman, Is Caught by Anaconda Police.

Edward M. Conant was arrested at Anaconda today on a charge of forgery preferred by Alex Vellman of the Montana Liquor company and will be brought back here for trial. The complaint alleges that by false representations Mr. Vellman was induced to endorse a forged draft for \$200 in favor of Conant on the Northwestern National bank of Minneapolis. Mr. Conant is a buyer of old iron and other metals for some Eastern firm.

MILLARD F. MARTIN SUIT AGAINST J. R. REED ET AL

He Claims a Lien of \$189 for Labor Performed—Evidence to Show That He Was Paid for Work.

The trial of the case of Millard F. Martin against J. R. Reed and others, for the foreclosure of a lien on the Reed livery barn on East Broadway, occupied the attention of Judge Harney this morning. Mr. Martin claimed a lien of \$189 for labor performed in quarrying the stone used in the construction of the building.

The defendant offered in evidence some receipts signed by Martin, showing the account to have been paid in full after the labor had been completed. Other evidence was introduced tending to show that Mr. Martin had been fully paid for his labor, and in the course of argument by counsel, in the absence of the jury, the court stated that if the jury should bring in a verdict for the plaintiff he would have to set it aside.

The case was still on trial at a late hour.

ORGANIZED GANG WORK IN BUTTE

ARREST OF TWO MORE ALLEGED FORGERS, SAID TO BE PALS OF W. M. MANSFIELD.

said to be pals of W. M. Mansfield, were taken into custody this afternoon by Officer McGillie. Young was found in his room at the Elva block on Colorado street. When searched at police headquarters, he had nothing on his person to show that he was connected with the gang of forgers.

But Officer McGillie says that he has been directing the operations of the gang and as he is a skillful penman, can copy any description of signature. McGillie had two checks in his possession when arrested. The name of W. Barry Hamilton was forged to one of the checks for \$20, payable to Leonard Mellgren. It was drawn on the W. A. Clark & Brothers' banking house. The other check was for \$42 signed by George Evans and made payable to John Mitchell. This was drawn on the State Savings bank. Passed on Local Stores.

Officer McGillie says that several forged checks were passed at the Symons dry goods store and the Hub clothing store a few weeks ago by members of this gang. They were in the habit of waiting until Saturday night when the stores were crowded when they knew that the checks would be hurriedly examined.

Many of the checks passed are signed by T. P. Manley, a prominent contractor on whose bank account the forgers would have made inroads, but for the fact that they were detected at the banks.

Mellgren, who was the last arrested, was found at the Owl rooming house which has evidently served as the headquarters of the gang. He is a confirmed "dope fiend" and was enjoying the slumbers caused by the long draw in company with two negro women when Officer McGillie appeared on the scene and gave him a rude awakening.

Young is thought to be the man who has been forging the checks for circulation by his pals and he will be sent to the county jail this afternoon until all the evidence is collected against the entire gang.

"Pennsylvania."

Of the state plays now before the theater-going public it would be a difficult matter in the extreme to pick a more thoroughly interesting production than "Pennsylvania," which opened at the Broadway last night. "Arizona," with its admirable portrayal of rugged, western life created a furore when it first came out and as a general thing playwrights have heretofore overlooked the opportunities that the East affords for dramatic compositions.

Located as the action is in the anthracite coal mining section "Pennsylvania" is a particularly interesting production just at this time. Daniel Hart and C. E. Callahan have succeeded in their joint effort to give to the public a play which abounds in a happy combination of romance, pathos and comedy. It is a comedy drama of the highest type and unlike the large portion of such compositions it is well written, the hand of the master being apparent in the most insignificant line. It is attention to such details as this that makes a successful play.

While the story of "Pennsylvania" presents nothing startlingly new or strikingly original it is so cleverly constructed and the several dramatic situations are worked up in such a masterly way that the attention of the audience is commanded at all times. It is a play that holds from the rising of the curtain on the first act to the close of the last. In a scenic way "Pennsylvania" is admirably staged and the third act which shows the base of a coal mine shaft is decidedly realistic. A powerful climax is reached at the conclusion of this act when the mine is wrecked by an explosion of coal gas.

The company presenting "Pennsylvania" is a creditable one. Fred T. Fairbanks, in the leading role of Thomas Dawson handles a difficult part with intelligence. Josephine Fox, as Nellie Reid, his sweetheart, was scarcely adapted to the part, but succeeded in creating a very favorable impression. The best work was done by William Marble, Junior, who gave to the thankless role of Charles Broadhead, the wealthy mine-owner and scheming villain, an atmosphere of refinement that commanded respect. Lew Kelly did well in the light comedy part and kept the audience in a good humor by his clever handling of an interesting character. James S. Kirts, Dan Evans, W. B. Gaffney, Harriet Willard, Ave D'Arcy, J. G. Gibson, Roland S. Rex and H. E. Gibson were acceptable in small parts. Incidental musical specialties were introduced by Mr. Fairbanks and the Eagle Quartet.

The performance of "Pennsylvania" will be repeated tonight and a special matinee has been announced for this afternoon.

"The County Fair."

One of the most interesting attractions that is to come to the Broadway this year is the appearance of Neil Burgess in "The County Fair" which is held for one performance only, Thursday evening. The revival of this famous old play has met with the approval of the theater-going public wherever Mr. Burgess has presented it. In the role of Abigail Prue this actor has few if any equals. It is a part that can almost play itself, but when Neil Burgess undertakes it it becomes more than unusually effective.

This production as put on this season is said to be up to the standard of all high class attractions. One of the entertaining features is the quartet which has been engaged especially for the final tour of Mr. Burgess in this famous old play.

The introduction of the home missionaries was then in order. T. W. Pinkerton spoke for the work in Utah; Rev. Edwards of Oklahoma; B. B. Sanders for Texas; J. F. Ghormley for Oregon; C. C. Black for Indian Territory; O. P. Siegel for New Mexico, and William F. Calvin for North-west Territory.

W. B. Taylor of Chicago delivered the morning address on "The Problems of City Evangelization," and Frank L. Bowden of Kansas City spoke on "Methods of City Evangelization."

SNYMAN DOWN IN MEXICO

Boer Patriot Is Pleasured With Reception Accorded Him.

Mexico City, Oct. 22.—General Snyman, late of the Boer army and Marshal Bond of New York, who are here investigating the suitability of Mexico for the settlement of Boer colonists, are pleased with the reception by the citizens as well as by the government.

They have had an interview with Finance Minister Limantour and will travel in several states, examining lands. The British subjects residing here have shown generous hospitality to the Boer generals.
