WILL REMEDY THE SMOKE EVIL

Anaconda Company Will Take Steps to Avoid Injury to Vegetation Arising From the Smoke From Smelter on the Hill.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 22.—Surveys and plans are being made at the instance of the Anaconda company which tend to the protection of the farmers and ranchers of the county who complain that the smoke and deleterious substances contained in the smoke from the big smelter have injured their crops, and particularly the trees and stock allowed to feed on the ranges and pastures. Representatives of the company are investigating the matter and have two plans, either one of which is expected to greatly improve the conditions. The number of dust chambers, calculated to retain the deposits of mineral substances which are now being carried away in the smoke and which are supposed to injure the vegetation. In case these dust chambers do not prove effective the company intends to use a screening process by which the mineral substance in the smoke from the smelters are retained in woolen bags. Another plan is to build an immense flue extending from the smelter to the summit of the mountain and which will discharge the smoke in the air at a height which will cause the poisonous substances to be dissipated to a great extent before descending to the earth. A plan has been prepared also for the proper filtering of the waste water discharged from the smelter and which, the ranchers say, pollutes the streams in the vicinity. The company is building four large slum ponds to retain the tailings, and a large dam will also be built natural channel and conduct it along until thoroughly filtered. All of this is being done at a great expense to the company in an effort to free the neighboring ranches from any ill effects arising from the new plant.

YOU NEED NOT KEEP THE TOTS AWAY FROM SCHOOL

Health Board Are Certain That Measures Taken to Prevent Spread of the Scarlet Fever Will Work.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 22.—Health Officer Dr. Evans and President M. J. Fitzpatrick, of the school board, do not think there is any danger to the pupils from scarlet fever, as they believe the precautions adopted prevent the spread of the disease. Whenever it is learned that scholars have been exposed to the disease or some member of the family has contracted it, those scholars have been dismissed from the school and the room and everything with which they have come in contact is thoroughly fumigated. President Fitzpatrick believes that the precautions taken minimize the danger, and that no pupil should remain away from school in the fear of contracting the disease.

Tomorrow Night the Dancing Season Will Be Inaugurated.

M'GEARY MURDER TRIAL DUE SOON

CONFESSED SLAYER OF W. J. EVANS IS TO BE ARRAIGNED HERE NOVEMBER 10.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 22.—Today the first subpoenas were served from the office of Sheriff Conley on a number of persons who will be witnesses for the state in the Evans murder trial, which has been set in the district court of this county for November 10. On that date John McGeary, who confessed to the shooting of W. J. Evans, Sr., July 19 last, will be put on trial for his life. It is thought that it will require fully two weeks to try the case.

The witnesses for the state will be many. County Attorney Duffy has been devoting a great deal of his attention to the matter of late and has it well in hand. What sort of defense will be put up by McGeary and his attorneys is not known. Since the day of the shooting McGeary has been a prisoner in the county jail. He does not mix with the other prisoners, and never mentions the crime of which he is accused. The first day he was confined in the jail he broke down and cried, but since that time has been as impenetrable as a sphinx. The trial will be watched with interest not only by the citizens of Montana, but all over the country, as Mr. Evans, the murdered man, was a gentleman of national reputation in his profession—that of constructing engineer.

FOR YEARS HE HAS LIVED WITH US AS A STRANGER

Rumor Hath It That Peter Sheriff, Who Died Yesterday, Came of a Rich Family in Effete East.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 22.—Peter Sheriff, a resident of this city, died yesterday at St. Ann's hospital with Bright's disease. Although the man had lived here for nine years, he was just as much a stranger to the people as if he had just arrived. He was found ill in a lodging house and removed to the hospital by the county physician. Sheriff is supposed to have relatives in Pennsylvania and a brother in Salt Lake, but nothing is known of them. Since his death a story has been circulated to the effect that he came of a well-known and wealthy family and that he had received a college education. The body is now at Tuttle's undertaking rooms.

GREATEST GAS WELL EVER STRUCK IN PENNSYLVANIA

New Gusher in Armstrong County Is Sending Up 20,000,000 Cubic Feet Every Twenty-four Hours.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Worthington, Pa., Oct. 22.—The greatest gas well ever struck in Armstrong county, if not in Pennsylvania, is now sending into the air more than 20,000,000 cubic feet of gas every 24 hours. It is defying all efforts to bring it under control. The well is on the Peter Kerr farm, a short distance south of here. The gas escaping, it is estimated, would supply a city of 10,000 inhabitants. In the 11 days that have elapsed since the sand was struck more than 220,000,000 cubic feet of gas, it is believed, have gone to waste.
