REVIEW OF WEEK IN WALL STREET

UNUSUAL DULLNESS OWING TO RUMORS OF FURTHER LABOR TROUBLES.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, Oct. 25.—Unusual dullness prevailed in all branches of the stock market throughout the week. The causes advanced for this condition were many and included in the usual ante-election apathy, rumors of further labor troubles, and the high rate for sterling exchange which, at one time, threatened heavy gold exports.

Trading was almost entirely professional, very light in volume and narrow as to distribution. Commission houses took no part in the week's operations, which, with a few exceptions, were limited to certain specialties and reflected pool manipulation.

There was no apparent pressure to sell, but the absence of anything like hearty support was conspicuous at all times. The banks were moderately heavy lenders of cash, but much of this was for mercantile uses. The rate for call money eased off to 2 per cent, but this figure was altogether nominal.

The bank statement probably will be a favorable one, as viewed by the conservative element. A large increase due to the week's bond purchases is expected.

IF THIS IS TRUE IT IS BIG THING

MONITOR AND RICHMOND MINES IN THE BITTER ROOT ARE SAID TO BE THE BEST EVER.

E. A. Wetmore, the well-known mining man, has just completed an examination of the Monitor and Richmond mines of the Bitter Root Copper company, located at Saltese, in Missoula county.

Mr. Wetmore makes a very flattering report upon the properties. He says that there are between 50,000 and 60,000 tons of high grade copper ore in sight and that the showing made upon the properties is very favorable.

This group of claims is situated about five and one-half miles in a southerly direction from the station of Saltese, on the Coeur d'Alene branch of the Northern Pacific railroad.

There has been two well defined veins so far developed on the property of this company, these two veins being approximately parallel and lie about 1,500 feet apart. The general trend of these veins is an easterly and westerly direction, having a slight southerly dip. The vein known as the Richmond has been opened a total length of 550 feet by 4 shafts, three of these shafts have been sunk an average depth of 60 feet each and the fourth one is now being sunk on the vein in good ore.

All mining facilities, such as timber, fuel, water, etc., are in abundance on the property and mining costs can be reduced to a minimum. At a comparatively short distance from the mine, water power can be generated sufficient for all mining purposes and a gravity tram will convey the ore to a favorable smelter site and power can there be generated to any desired extent.

VALUABLE LEDGES OF IRON ORE DISCOVERED

Little Development Work Has Been Done But Dillon People Think There is a Lot of It There.

One of the most valuable ledges of iron ore in the state has recently been located by L. D. Graeter, J. R. Ball and W. Tate Taylor and its location will be filed for record within the next few days, says the Dillon Examiner. It is situated on the left hand fork of Birch creek, near the top of the range which divides the waters of Birch creek from the Battlemountain. The ledge is fully twenty feet wide and the iron it carries is of the specular variety. Mr. Graeter has a sample of the material on exhibit at the Carley grocery store. This piece of rock is nearly pure iron and an analysis shows that it carries 87 per cent iron and eight per cent silica.

For fluxing purposes specular iron is the very best substance known to smelters and it is also extensively used in the manufacture of commercial iron and steel. Specular iron is a variety of hematite and the ledge discovered by Mr. Graeter and his associates is undoubtedly one of the very best, if not the best in the state.

The ledge is well defined and there are many boulders of the ore lying around the mountain side, many of them weighing several tons. It was from one of these big boulders that the specimen at the store was broken and its value is apparent at a glance.

The ore can be easily mined and it lies in a well-defined ledge. A good wagon road leads to within a short distance of the mine and it can be extended to the Iron King, as the mine has been named, with but little expense. At present but little work has been done—enough to properly locate the claim and a little more. The gentlemen interested had a small force of men at work a short time ago, but the weather was so severe at that time that no headway could be made and work was abandoned until spring when it will be pushed with vigor. Then the true worth of the iron ledge will be arrived at.

The sample shown by Mr. Graeter is composed of soft crystals and is nearly pure. This is a picked sample, however, but considerable of the ledge will run over 50 per cent in iron and it carries some little gold as well.

TO DOUBLE THE CAPACITY

Barnes-King Mill in Lewistown Has Been Improved.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Lewistown, Oct. 25.—The addition to the Barnes-King mill for the purpose of doubling the capacity has been completed and is now in full operation. The capacity of the enlarged plant is 250 tons per day and over 170 tons is now being handled and in the course of a few weeks the plant will be worked to the limit. The property is being developed more fully every day and the results of the work show that it is undoubtedly one of the best mining propositions in this section of the state.

FAMOUS CLAIMS OF EARLY TIMES

NUMBER OF THEM KNOWN TO HISTORY ARE BEING WORKED NEAR AUSTIN.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Austin, Oct. 25.—Within three miles of this place are located some of the notable gold mines of the state, among them the War Eagle, Blue Cloud and Red Bird.

The Combination Mining company southeast of Austin, is now doing some extensive development work. Two tunnels are being run that will soon cut known leads. The work is under contract and is being pushed with day and night shifts. The work is under the management of Mr. C. J. Burt.

Screenings.

A strike of high grade ore has been made in the Eureka claim on the Bald Butte mountain in Lewis and Clarke county. This mountain is proving to be a veritable treasure vault of gold.

A find of valuable ore was recently made in the American Boy mine, half a mile south of the Empire, in Lewis and Clarke county. A bag sample showed the ore to carry 114 ounces of silver, \$8 in gold and 8 per cent in copper.

On Arastra and Mill creeks in Emigrant Gulch are promising quartz properties and still farther east on the same belt and only twenty miles away are the Contact and Independent camps, all in Park county and on this great belt.

The Washoe Copper company is preparing to do considerable development work on the Clerk Grit mine north of the West Stewart. This property has not been worked for more than 10 years and never reached a greater depth than 300 feet.

Judge L. O. Ray returned to Teton recently, says the Teton Miner, to look after his extensive interests in the active camp. Judge Ray went to Butte as a delegate to the International Mining congress and spent seven days in the copper city.

He found a greater interest in Teton at Butte than anywhere else in the country. The mineral exhibit at the Mining congress was the finest that has ever been made under similar conditions. The Teton section attracted as much attention as any.
