For the Amendment to the Constitution Relating to County Commissioners.

Against the Amendment to the Constitution Relating to County Commissioners.

State of Montana, County of Silver Bow.—ss.:

I, John Weston, county clerk and recorder of said county and state, do hereby certify that the foregoing is a full, true and correct list of the nominations to office to be voted for at the general election to be held in said county and state on the 4th day of November, A. D. 1902, as shown by the certificates of nomination of the different parties, now on file in my office.

I hereby further certify that the following is a full, true and correct copy of the Constitutional Amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state of Montana, as certified to me by the secretary of state of the state of Montana:

NOTICE OF ELECTION.—CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.—HOUSE BILL NO. 55.

Act providing for the submission to the qualified electors of the state of Montana of an amendment to Section 4 of Article XVI of the Constitution relating to county commissioners.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana:

Section 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Montana at the next general election to be held in said state, the following amendment to Section 4 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to county commissioners.

That Section 4 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the state of Montana, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. In each county there shall be elected three county commissioners, provided that the term of office of those elected on November 6, 1900, shall expire on the first Monday in January, 1907; provided further, that at the general election to be held in November, 1902 (in counties where commissioners are to be elected that year), three commissioners shall be elected whose terms shall expire on the first Monday in January, 1907; provided further, that at the general election to be held in November, 1906, one commissioner shall be elected for a term of two years, one commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years, and one commissioner shall be elected for a term of six years, whose term of office shall commence on the said first Monday of January, 1907; and provided further, that at each general election thereafter, commencing with the general election to be held in November, 1908, one commissioner shall be elected for a term of six years. A vacancy in the board of county commissioners shall be filled by appointment by the judge of the judicial district in which the vacancy occurs."

Sec. 2. The vote upon this amendment shall be counted and canvassed by such officials and in such manner as is provided by law for the counting and canvassing of the votes for member of congress, and if a majority of all votes cast at said election for and against said amendment shall be in favor of the amendment, the governor of the state shall immediately so declare by public proclamation, and said amendment shall be in full force and effect as a part of the constitution from and after the date of said proclamation.

Sec. 3. The official ballots to be used at the next general election to be held in this state shall have printed thereon the following words in such manner as to allow every elector an opportunity to indicate thereon by proper marks his preference to-wit: "For the Amendment to the Constitution Relating to County Commissioners."

BISHOP HANBURY TELLS OF PORTO RICAN WORK

Money is Needed for New Episcopal Churches and Parish Houses on Our Island Possession.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, Oct. 27.—Rev. James H. Hanbury, bishop of Porto Rico, at St. Bartholomew's Episcopal church yesterday, told of his work on the island to which he was sent as a missionary in February, 1901. He said that two churches on the island, at one of which the rector, who had spent his whole life in the work, has been totally blind for the past three years.

This man now asks that another man be sent to the parish and that he receive \$300 a year, so that he can remain and be of what assistance he may.

"In San Juan," continued Bishop Hanbury, we are erecting a church that will cost \$15,000. I have \$10,000 toward that, and I want the other \$5,000."

The bishop dwelt at some length on the temptations that surround young men who have gone to Porto Rico from the United States. He said that to do any effective work among them he must build parish houses in larger towns. To do what he has planned already he must have \$30,000, and he begged that it be given him without delay.
