MINING COMPANY'S GENEROUS ACTION

ANACONDA COPPER MINING COMPANY GIVE GENEROUSLY TO A NEW MISSION HOME.

Rev. Alfred H. Henry and the members of the congregation of Mountain View church are jubilant over the generous action of the officers of the Anaconda Copper Mining company in assisting in the establishment of the proposed new mission of the church.

The company have notified the pastor that it will present to the church two lots at the corner of Garden avenue and East Mercury street to be used for mission purposes.

The Mountain View church has supported a mission in that neighborhood for several years past. The work has been done under difficulties owing to the poor location secured. But withal the mission has been successful and the good accomplished has attracted attention.

With a suitable building on property which is not eating up money in rents the church will be able to widen the scope of the mission and increase the good done and, through the generosity of the company, prove doubly successful in the future.

The Methodists of the city unite in appreciating the gift which has made possible modern and effective mission work.

Already there have been in the neighborhood of \$3,000 subscribed by the Methodists of the city to build a Sunday school, which is now assured.

J. B. Penhall is superintendent of the Sunday-school and will have charge of the mission work under the supervision of Rev. Henry and the trustees of the Mountain View church.

DR. HANSON BRINGS SUIT FOR DAMAGES

and treatment of Dr. Cayley after he was wounded, and up to the time of his death.

In reviewing the complaint says: "And said article throughout imputes to this plaintiff and concerning this plaintiff that he had not sufficient medical or surgical skill to give to the said Cayley the proper and correct treatment for the injuries he had received, and the said article imputes to and concerning this plaintiff a lack of sufficient knowledge to properly perform an autopsy upon the body of the said Cayley."

Referring to the damages the complaint says: "Said article was intended to and does cast upon this plaintiff reflections and charges as to his professional skill and ability as a physician and surgeon, and is calculated and was intended to injure this plaintiff in the minds of the people throughout the city of Butte and the state of Montana, wherever said article was circulated, and to injure and destroy the plaintiff's practice of medicine and surgery, and was intended to and does create in the minds of the readers of said paper, wherever the same was circulated, a bias and prejudice against this plaintiff and against the medical and surgical skill of the plaintiff to such an extent that it very greatly injures and damages the plaintiff in the estimation of the public as a skillful practitioner of medicine and surgery."

It injured His Practice. Further it states: "That said article injures this plaintiff in his profession so that he is not enabled to maintain his practice and standing with the public generally, and causes the public to withdraw from the plaintiff their patronage and tends to destroy and does destroy plaintiff's means of maintaining himself and his family."

The complaint concludes with this paragraph: "That by reason of the publication and circulation of said article and the charge therein imputed to and against this plaintiff and by reason of the fact that his standing, skill and ability as a physician and surgeon has been attacked in said article, and the mind of the people generally has been poisoned against this plaintiff by reason of said article, he has been damaged in the sum of \$50,000, for which sum, together with costs, the plaintiff prays judgment."

Following the regular mode of legal procedure the defendant, the Butte Miner, will next file an answer to the complaint. The case will probably not come to trial for some time because of the extent of litigation already in the courts.

Appeared Last Saturday. The article referred to appeared in the Miner in the form of an editorial in the edition of last Saturday.

In relating the incident of the shooting the complaint says that "Immediately after the shooting of the said Cayley, said Kelly telephoned for the plaintiff herein to come to the assistance of the said Dr. Cayley." Subsequently the words, "said Kelly" are faintly traced out and over them are written the words, "At the instance of said Cayley someone."

Dr. Hanson in his complaint states that he was the principal physician and surgeon having in charge said Dr. Cayley and the treatment of the wounds of the said Cayley. Robert B. Smith is attorney for Dr. Hanson.

DIXON WILL BE AN EASY WINNER

Like another Lochinvar, Joseph M. Dixon has come out of the West, and is carrying all before him in this campaign. His fight for congressional honors is one of the most spirited yet made in the Treasure State, and when the votes are counted November 4, there is little doubt, in the minds of either party that he will be found the favorite. Mr. Dixon is now closing in Butte a brilliant tour of the state. He is an immense favorite, and will come to the boundaries of Silver Bow with a majority of from 4,000 to 5,000 votes.

In connection with his appearance in Butte, it may not be amiss to mention his labor record. Mr. Dixon has always been the friend of the laboring man. The estimation in which he is held by the workers of his home town can be no better shown than by these resolutions, passed by the Missoula Trades and Labor Assembly recently, who come out boldly and announce themselves as opposed to his opponent, John M. Evans, also of Missoula:

"To the Officers and Members of the Western Montana Trades and Labor Council of the City of Missoula and County of Missoula.

"We, your committee, duly appointed to draft resolutions condemning the candidacy of John Morgan Evans for representative in congress, respectfully report as follows:

"Whereas, It is a notorious fact that John Morgan Evans has shown by his past actions that he is an upholder of the Mongolian race, having employed one in his own home until after his nomination for representative in the congress of the United States; and by his action in the democratic county convention of 1900, that he is an enemy of organized labor,

"Therefore, Be it resolved that the Western Montana Trades and Labor Council of the city and county of Missoula declare him unfit to represent the laboring people of the state of Montana in the congress of the United States."

"Be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to each union in the state of Montana and also be published in the daily press.
