

ART EXHIBIT AT PUF AHL'S IS ONE OF THE BEST EVER SEEN HERE

A DREAM OF ORIENTALISM.



Here is One of the Displays to Be Seen This Week in Pufahl's Art Store. If You Love Fine Pictures, Bric-a-Brac, Etc., Do Not Fail to Go There.

Throughout the world Butte has been recognized as the greatest of mining camps. In every city where finance reigns Butte has been a synonym for wealth and financial greatness. The people have become accustomed to the classification, and even here at home it has become a settled and accepted fact that Butte is a mining metropolis wealthy but uncultured.

Yet never was a greater mistake made than that most common among the travelers from the East who come here with the fixed idea that all there is to Butte are mines and money.

The growth of the city financially has been equalled by the growth of class and culture, and there are as richly furnished and adorned homes in Butte as in any city in the country. That this is a fact, and that the demand for things artistic is constantly increasing is amply demonstrated by the great change in the stores of the city and in the grade of merchandise and stock carried by them.

They are Equal to the Best. The stores of the city carry a big assortment equal to the assortments of any of the marts of the East, and so much has the demand for beautiful things increased that it has become necessary to create

depots of art where the constantly growing taste of Butte's culture can be met and satisfied.

In this line and to meet this demand there has been opened in Butte, on a large scale, an art emporium which will rank with any depot of its kind in the country. That emporium is Pufahl's, No. 79 West Park street, in the new Clark building.

It is at Pufahl's one is brought to the realization that Butte is no more the rough camp of the mines. It is with Pufahl's beautiful collection of art and Orientalism that one is brought face to face with the fact that here among the mountains are people with the artistic sense and the cultured critique that demands more than the ordinary wares of the usual Western metropolis.

Once among the treasures of the collection so artistically displayed one cannot help the thought that to the West, the home of the money kings and the source of a major portion of the great wealth of the mines, that art and its followers are coming to meet the demands which wealth and education create.

It is Worth Seeing.

To the people of Butte a rare treat is afforded this week in the display of the art creations at Pufahl's. Today began the reception of those interested in such collections, and to afford these the opportunity of full inspection, Mr. Pufahl today gave an opening to which all the ladies and others interested in collections are invited.

The opening began at noon today and during the afternoon hundreds were taken through the beautiful rooms, arranged especially for the occasion, and at times the crowd was almost too great for comfort.

And the visit amply repaid every one taking the trouble to come down town. In every room a surprise was planned, and each was so arranged as to display to the delighted guests treasures in art work of every description.

Almost before entering the beautiful emporium one is attracted by the splendid collection displayed in the window. The central piece in this display is a large and magnificent Swedish vase of great value, surrounded by other bits of workmanship, which prepare the visitor slightly for what is to come.

Rich Display of Draperies. The opening is mostly devoted to the display of draperies of every design and degree of richness. Almost at the entrance are shown wonderful creations of Orientals in stripes and colors, and there are velours, silks, brocades and Orientals in profuse display.

At the entrance of the art room, where are collected cut-glass and bric-a-brac in a display most magnificent, there is a pair of Louis XIV. curtains, hand embroidered, which were the envy of every lady present at the opening.

In close proximity are velour curtains, with bow knots in water color silk and silk

brocades and Orientals, all of the rich and handsomest designs.

With Artistic Carelessness. Scattered about with artistic carelessness in the big art room downstairs, were more draperies on old brass fixtures, showing every design, color and effect and all suitable for any room or place.

In the downstairs rooms the display is a picture from dreamland. The heavy mahogany and weathered oak pieces of furniture, interspersed with brass effects and art treasures of every description, showed plainly the touch of an artist in decorative effects.

Though to the careless eye negligently thrown about, every piece of wood, every brass design and each bit of almost priceless china, was placed with care, and the harmonizing effect produced such as only can be seen where art reigns supreme.

It has been the aim of Mr. Pufahl to gather together in his collections those things and treasures which are not handled through the ordinary mercantile channels, and his success in this is fully demonstrated in the display made at this special opening.

It is Bewildering.

Throughout the whole display is shown the many effects and designs of the choicest French and Oriental draperies, some in beautiful and costly handwork, and others in plainer effects and in the silk finishes. Tapestries and art effects of every design predominate, set off by the beautiful and costly collections of individual furniture and bric-a-brac.

There is a large assortment of exquisite silk brocades in all colors, Old Colonial tapestries and Oriental displays of rugs and Indian designs in real Navajo blankets, which add to the appearance of profusion, wealth and harmony.

Owing to the great interest taken in the opening Pufahl has decided to continue the display the remainder of the week, and it is evident that the rooms will be crowded every day with those who are being afforded a new experience in the exhibition of rare works of art among which the pictures used in the wall decorations are not the least.

Special Display Each Day.

Each day during the week there will be special displays particularly in the line of draperies, and it is well worth a visit to inspect the magnificent collections.

In every niche and corner there is something new and artistic, and the beauty of it all is the fact that here in Butte such things are offered for sale at prices which, in many instances, are below the Eastern quotations on the same grades. Nowhere in the East is there a larger or choicer display, and not only the owner but the people of Butte are to be congratulated on the opportunity afforded not only to inspect but to buy at prices within reach for the cream of the collections brought here for that purpose.

BUTTE WOMEN DO NOT MAKE A HIT WITH HER

Madame Davenport Tells Them That They Are Shortcoming in Several Important Particulars.

In speaking to the women of Butte at the Auditorium yesterday afternoon, Madame Charlotte de Goliere Davenport suggested that if the Women's club would give more attention to physical culture than to parliamentary drill, its influence would be more general. Madame Davenport spoke very plainly to her sisters and pointed out many of the shortcomings that she had observed in them during her short stay in the greatest mining camp on earth.

The ladies did not respond to the call in as large numbers as had been expected, and the speaker did not hesitate to tell her hearers that she did not think the women here were ready for this advanced study. In her opinion, the women of Butte do not possess an alarming amount of humor and vitality, for the reason that they do not give sufficient attention to the rules of hygiene and dietetics.

Madame Davenport advised the women to drink more water, from eight to 10 quarts a day. It was important to exercise great consideration with regard to diet. Worry over trifles is useless. Madame Davenport wanted to form a class of 50 ladies to whom she proposed giving three lessons and lectures for \$15; but only 15 of the women present agreed to partake of the instruction and the class was not formed.

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LAUGHS AS HE IS GIVEN TWO YEARS

"BILLY THE KID" THINKS HE GOT OFF EASY, AS TEN MIGHT HAVE BEEN GIVEN.

NEGRO SENT TO DEER LODGE FOR BURGLARY

Something of the Maneuvers Billy Employed on Taking \$50 and Sundries. Together With an Account of His Extreme Solitude Concerning Some Wee Kittens of His Acquaintance.

It was a smile of satisfaction which spread from ear to ear over the black face of William Kidd, alias "Billy the Kid," when Judge Harney told him this morning that he would have to serve two years in the state penitentiary at Deer Lodge for burglary.

As he was led away by Deputy Sheriff Morrison, the smile grew into a broad grin, and when he reached the jailer's office the grin had lengthened to a laugh. Something was tickling the negro and he didn't care who knew it.

"What's the matter with him?" asked a bystander. "He seems to look forward to a couple of years under the care of Colonel McFague with considerable satisfaction."

He Thinks He's Lucky.

"He expected to years and he's mighty glad to get off with two," remarked a deputy. "Billy is a bad egg, and he has served time in the penitentiary before. Not many years ago he was sent up from Anaconda for burglary for two years and a half, and when he found that the previous sentence was not taken into consideration, he was naturally a little elated."

Billy was arrested a few weeks ago for breaking into the Mikado restaurant, on West Granite street, and stealing \$50, a fur overcoat and a pocketbook. The property was subsequently found on him, and considering this and his previous unsavory record, he was only too glad to plead guilty this morning and take the minor punishment.

He had been employed at the restaurant as a dishwasher, and while the proprietress, Miss Nesbitt, did not have any particular confidence in "The Kid," she was satisfied at the way he juggled the dishes. "All at once he served notice that he was going to quit, having satisfied himself, as it subsequently appeared, that he was thoroughly familiar with the location and working of the money-drawer and the position of other valuables in the establishment."

Sollicitous Concerning Kittens.

About two weeks later he appeared at the back door to inquire about the health of some kittens that arrived during his time of service. He was taking a new look at the surroundings, and it evidently satisfied him, for not more than three nights later he made a visit when everybody was asleep and took away everything he could lay his hands on.

Miss Nesbitt's suspicions were directed his way, and his arrest followed soon after. With him was arrested one William Randolph, also colored, who will have a trial later, although the "Kid" was believed to have been the prime conspirator.

Attorney James Baldwin appeared for the negro and waived the statutory time permitted him to plead, whereupon Judge Harney told him the number of his room for the next two years.
