GUNSHOT WOUND IN EACH OF HIS LEGS

AUSTRIAN WHO CANNOT SPEAK ANY ENGLISH MAY HAVE SHOT HIMSELF OR MAY NOT HAVE.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 29.—A. Kline, an Austrian residing in East Commercial avenue, appeared at the hospital yesterday afternoon suffering from a gunshot wound in each of his legs. They were not serious at all but exceedingly painful. Dr. Feenan picked several No. 2 shot out of Kline's limbs, dressed the wounds and allowed him to depart, as their injuries did not at all interfere with his walking.

The fellow could speak no English at all, and the hospital attendants were unable to learn whether or not the shooting was an accident or whether someone else handled the gun and shot Kline on purpose. They are inclined to believe that it was accidental, however, as the victim did not seem to be at all angry, and did his best to explain how it all came about. All that could be made out for certain was that he had been hunting, but whether alone or with someone they were at a loss to ascertain.

CONN WELL KNOWN AND LIKED IN THIS VICINITY

Anacondans Are Sorry to Hear of Death of Willow Creek Rancher and Will Watch the Case.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Oct. 29.—William Conn, the well-known ranchman of Granite county, who was murdered yesterday, was known to a great many Anacondans, especially to the old-timers.

County Assessor George Miller was and had been for years an intimate friend of the Conns. He was deeply affected by the news of the tragedy.

"Conn was one of the finest men I ever knew," said Mr. Miller this morning. "For years he has stayed on that ranch working hard and supporting his old mother. He was a man who had many friends and but few enemies. I can't imagine his being murdered in such a manner."

Many other residents of Anaconda expressed themselves in a like manner, and will watch developments in the case with a great deal of interest.

STRIKING BILL POSTERS DRAGGED OFF IN WAGON

Chicago Police Deal Summarily With Men Who Disregard Injunction of the Courts in Windy City.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Chicago, Oct. 29.—Twelve striking bill-posters and their sympathizers were arrested yesterday for violating a restraining order issued by Judge Chytraks.

All day long the streets in the vicinity of the American Postage service office were crowded with angry men. Every attempt at violence met with a rush from the police and, if caught, the culprit was taken into custody.

Teamsters who tried to blockade the streets were pulled from their wagons and hustled into patrol wagons. Each arrest was followed by a volley of stones and mud, but the police found little difficulty in coping with the men.

When arrested the men scoffed and jeered at the injunction. All were released on bonds signed by the union's attorney.

Business Agent P. J. Murray and Patrick Gottlieb were charged with inciting riots, assault and disorderly conduct. The others were accused of contempt of court.
