## OLD YORK STATE IS REPUBLICAN BY BIG MARGIN

Think Odell Will Have From 37,500 to 40,000 Majority For Governorship.

## DOWN IN UTAH G. O. P. IS CERTAIN OF SUCCESS

It Looks Good All Over the Country and if Indications Count for Anything, the Entire Nation Will Return a Clean Majority for the Republican Party and as a Handsome Compliment to the Man Who Sits in the White House.

New York, Nov. 3.—The day before election finds both the democratic and republican leaders still expressing confidence of victory in the Empire state. Predictions vary from 10,000 to 50,000 on each side, though the estimate of the two states chairmen, Frank Campbell for the democrats and Colonel Dunn for the republicans, are almost exactly the same, the former claiming 35,000 for Coler and the latter 37,600 for Odell.

Both assert that their predictions are based on a most thorough examination of the situation throughout the state. Governor Odell today estimated his majority at 40,000, and Mr. Coler said that he expected to win by 60,000.

For Greater New York Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany hall, reiterated his belief that Coler will have 120,000 plurality.

Democratic leaders expect 30,000 of this to be furnished by Kings county, 1,000 by Richmond, 3,000 by Queens and 78,000 by New York county. The republican estimates cut the democratic plurality to 14,000 in Kings, 2,500 in Queens and to 45,000 in Manhattan and the Bronx, reducing the democratic plurality below the Bronx from 62,000 to 65,000.

Nashua, N. H., Nov. 3.—The vote in New Hampshire promises to be much lighter than that of two years ago. The republican candidate for governor, it is thought, will receive not less than 6,000 plurality. The present congressmen will be re-elected. Democratic gains are likely to be registered in both branches of the legislature.

### Down in Colorado.

Denver, Nov. 3.—The political situation in the state this morning is unchanged. Both sides are claiming victory by large majorities. The issues will undoubtedly be mixed in many counties, but the betting favors the election of the democratic state ticket, and a majority of the county offices. There is great interest in this city over the claims made by the republicans of wholesale fraudulent registration. The democrats this morning claim to have over 400 affidavits from those whom the republicans assert are fraudulently registered. County Clerk Aichel too certified to the election judges at least a portion of the names which he had been enjoined from certifying by Judge Johnson. Owing to the shortness of the time at their disposal the democratic attorneys did not today press their application to the supreme court for a writ of prohibition to nullify Judge Johnson's injunction.

### Pennsylvania Is Easy.

Philadelphia, Nov. 3.—Indications point to the election tomorrow of Samuel W. Pennypacker, the republican candidate for governor, by a reduced majority. Robert E. Pattison, the democratic candidate, who has twice been elected governor, will probably carry the state outside of this city, but the heavy republican vote in Philadelphia will likely overcome this democratic majority.

Chairman Quay of the republican state committee, estimates Pennypacker's plurality at 100,000. Chairman Greasy of the democratic state committee, states that Pattison will be victorious.

Of the 32 congressmen the republican leaders claim 28, while the democratic leaders concede them only 24. There has been a warm fight on the legislative candidates. United States Senator Penrose is a candidate for re-election by the incoming legislature and he has conducted his fight personally. He claims the election of many more than the 120 assemblymen and senators necessary to choose him on joint ballot.

### Down in Utah.

Salt Lake, Nov. 3.—Both the democratic and republican state chairmen issued statements today on the probable result of tomorrow's election. The republicans claim a plurality of 3,500 and a large majority in the legislature. The democrats claim to have made a successful fight, especially as regards the legislative ticket in Salt Lake county, which they claim will give them control of the legislature.

### In San Francisco.

San Francisco, Nov. 3.—The election campaign in California practically closed Saturday night, but there will be numerous meetings and parades tonight. Both republicans and democrats are confident of winning. The election of Lane, democrat, for governor, is claimed by 12,000, and Pardee, republican, by 14,000.

HEINZE'S LAST DREAM BEFORE BEING SUBMERGED.

## FORECAST INDICATES A SWEEPING VICTORY!

It is Up to the Business Men of Butte and Silver Bow County to March to the Polls and See That the Party of Prosperity Wins Out Tomorrow---Result of Canvass by County Central Committee Shows That the Heinze Ticket Has Only a Small Following--Fight Is Now Between Old Line Parties, With the G. O. P. Strong in the Lead---What the Situation Is Over State--Looks Good For Republican State Nominees and For Entire County Tickets Everywhere.

"It will be a fight between the old line parties after all," said Chairman A. N. Yoder of the county central committee this morning.

"We have the figures to show for it. Here is a careful, thorough and conservative canvass of the county. It shows beyond any possibility of a doubt that the Heinze ticket will not poll more than 2,500 possibly, or 3,000 votes in the entire county.

"This cheap claptrap and gallery play to win the votes of the workmen of Silver Bow county has met with the inevitable result. Time has been the ruin of the Heinze ticket. People have had an opportunity to examine the bait and they have decided that they will not bite.

"And so we have found that the fight will be between the republican and democratic parties and that with the republicans fighting shoulder to shoulder, united as of old and going to the polls to vote the ticket from top to bottom, the party of the people, the party of progress and prosperity, will win beyond a doubt.

"Stand Shoulder to Shoulder.

"There is practically no disaffection among the republicans. The total of those whom we can consider outside of the ticket will not exceed 50, who are in the employ of Heinze. All other efforts to breed trouble have been utterly unsuccessful.

"From the result of our canvass, which

has been completed this morning, we find the following facts: We will carry the city of Walkerville by not less than 100 plurality. Centerville by not less than 100; Meaderville by not less than 200; East Butte and the Braund house district by not less than 450, and the Colorado precinct by not less than 100 votes.

"This will bring us into the city of Butte with 1,000 plurality and our check of the democratic precincts shows us conclusively that if the business men and representative men of the republican party do their duty tomorrow the democrats cannot overcome the majorities of the republican precincts.

"The Final Appeal.

"With these facts in their midst, the members of the county central committee make this final appeal to the people who own homes in the city of Butte, to the men who conduct business of whatever nature in this community, to those who are rearing their families and who look for an honest and respectable administration of public affairs. We ask them to vote for good government, to stand together and show the people of the state of Montana that Butte and Silver Bow county cannot be used as a catspaw for men to pull their chestnuts out of the fire.

"Fortunately for the best interests of the community we have had time to expose the methods and disreputable style of campaign employed by the Heinze party.

"That time has worked wonders. It has brought many back to a realization of the danger which they so narrowly averted; it has been the opportunity for the thinking men, to deliberate and investigate for themselves the causes and results of the issues which have been presented to them. Above all, it has given the voters of the county the much-needed opportunity to review the situation; to look over what the professional politicians have done for them in the past; to make a correct assay of the numerous goldbricks that have been handed to them, and to resolve to take the affairs of the county and put them in clean hands, in the custody of men who are not trimming their sails to every fitful wind that blows, but who represent the sober, sensible thought of the community, the bulwark of our great republic."

Watch Out for Canards.

"We have no doubt but that the usual number of campaign canards will be sprung tomorrow; the baseless lies that are calquered to pervert men's judgment at the eleventh hour; the traps that are always sprung at a time when men have no opportunity to investigate for themselves. To the many who have been voting in Silver Bow county for years there is no necessity for advice in regard to these liars and their lies, but this year many of our young men and many who have availed themselves of the rights of Ameri-

can citizenship recently, will vote for the first time. To them the county central committee of the republican party has a few words to say.

"Act according to the dictates of your conscience and your judgment, in line with conservative, sensible thought and the best interests of the community at large.

"We have reason to believe that among the many means to stampede voters will be the effort on the part of the Heinze leaders to convince the people that the Amalgamated Copper company will instruct its employees to vote the democratic ticket.

"I want the Inter Mountain to say for me in my official capacity and for the county central committee of the republican party that I am positively assured that nothing of this nature will be done. I call upon all republicans to remember this fact, and not only to pay no attention to such canards themselves, but to brand them as false wherever and whenever the opportunity presents itself.

The closing days of the campaign finds the fight narrowed down to the republican and democratic parties, for the Heinze ticket is clean out of it.

This was the verdict of a prominent republican and an equally well-known democrat who met on the street this morning and exchanged pleasantries on the coming fight.

"We knew he couldn't last through the campaign," said the man from the G. O. P. "We saw his finish three weeks ago," said the gentleman from Bourbon affiliations.

Not the least peculiar fact that developed during the morning hours was that both the old line parties came within a few hundred votes of estimating the strength of the Heinze ticket in the city. It was agreed that the biggest vote polled by the anti-to-be-trusted men with their bob-tailed auxiliaries would not exceed 2,700, both parties making what is con-

sidered conservative estimates.

Today the democrats turned all their batteries on the republican ticket, realizing that the respectable element of the community has been turning its attention to the party of prosperity.

In making an effort to gain the votes of the workmen of the county, who after all constitute the majority, the democrats find that they have run up against a pretty hard proposition in the person of Malcolm Gillis, the valiant young republican who has been identified with the true labor interests ever since he came to Butte many years ago.

Merry Bursting of Bubbles.

Empty bubbles have been bursting with remarkable regularity in both the Heinze and democratic parties during the past few days, and when they find themselves confronted with the statement that on the republican ticket are found more men carrying union cards in their pocket than in any of the other parties they find a proposition that is hard to confront in a county of union men.

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## AMERICAN TEACHER IS MURDERED BY LADRONES

Three Miles From Bacolod D. C. Montgomery Was Attacked by Bolomen.

## MURDERED AND MUTILATED WITH ROBBERY AS MOTIVE

Constabulary Have Offered a Reward for the Fiends and It Is Thought They Will Be Apprehended--First Instance in Which a Teacher in the Islands Has Been Harmed by the Natives--Murdered Man Was From Nebraska.

Manila, Nov. 3.—D. C. Montgomery, superintendent of schools in Oriental Negros, was murdered Friday by Ladrones three miles from Bacolod.

Mr. Montgomery was going to Bacolod for a consultation with the retiring superintendent and to assume control of the division. He had a large sum of money with him.

Six natives armed with bolos and spears attacked him, quickly killed him and then mutilated and robbed him. The constabulary have offered a reward for Mr. Montgomery's murderers and it is thought they will be captured.

Robbery is understood to have been the motive for the crime. This is the first instance of a teacher in the Philippines being harmed while in the discharge of his duty.

Mr. Montgomery leaves a widow, who is a teacher in the island of Negros.

## GREATER PART OF DISTRICT COVERED

STRIKE COMMISSION PUTS IN BUSY DAY SEEING WHAT IT IS TO DO ON QUESTION.

Hazleton, Pa., Nov. 3.—The anthracite coal strike commission arrived in the Lehigh valley region from Scranton today. The party was met at Pond Creek, about twelve miles north of here, by District President Duffy of the United Mine Workers, who will represent the miners while the commission is in this region.

The program for the day covered the entire Hazleton region. The greater part of the territory was viewed from the special train. A visit to one of the mines took up the time until noon. This afternoon the south side will be gone over, and it is probable that tomorrow will find the arbitrators in the Panther valley.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Nov. 3.—All the mines in the Wyoming and Lackawanna regions are working with an increased force of men today and the output of coal for the day will be the largest since mining was resumed. President Mitchell has completed his task of collecting statistics and other matters of information for the investigating commissioners, and all of it is now in the hands of the recorder of the commission. President Mitchell's legal advisers think a very strong case has been made out for the miners.

## MARCONI NEARLY READY TO TRY IT

THE WORLD WILL SOON KNOW WHETHER OR NOT HIS WIRELESS SYSTEM IS A SUCCESS.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 3.—A dispatch from Sydney, C. E., says that preparations for the final test of the Marconi wireless system has already commenced and that the inventor anticipates the complete success of the system.

Mr. Marconi said yesterday, alluding to his experiments: "For 200 miles from Poldhu I transmitted messages on my last trip, and I received messages at a distance of 500 miles from Poldhu house. As soon as the machinery is all installed in the table-head station I will commence to experiment."

"I will first place Carlo Alberta a short distance from the shore and experiment between here and Tablehead, and when I am satisfied everything is going properly I will send a message across to the Poldhu. It probably will be a week before I have a statement to make regarding my communication between Poldhu and Tablehead."
