

WILL NOT STAND FOR ORGAN

Baptist Leader Leaves Church Because the Congregation Want It. [BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Lexington, Ky., Nov. 3.—As the result of a decision of the elders of the Broadway Disciples church to submit to a vote of the congregation the subject of installing an organ, Rev. J. W. McGarvey, president of the College of the Bible, founder of the church in 1870, and its first pastor, yesterday asked for letters for himself and wife that they might transfer their membership. His attitude has prevented the introduction of an organ for many years, but the sentiment in its favor became so great that the vote was overwhelming. White Woman Who Was Married to a Negro Passes Away in a Manner Which Leads to Investigation.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Nov. 3.—Mrs. Jennie Madison was found dead at 10:30 o'clock this morning in the yard in the rear of the Washoe saloon by Bob Jones, the colored porter of the establishment. Mrs. Madison resided in Cabin No. 3 on Chestnut street with her mother, Mrs. Mary Thompson. Her mother stated that the Madison woman left home last night at 8:20 o'clock and that she had not seen her since that time until she viewed the body in the undertaker's rooms. Mrs. Madison was a white woman, but was married to a colored man, Robert Madison, a porter about town. They had not lived together for six months. The woman's whereabouts after leaving home last night are not known. Her mother said she left home in a good humor and stated that she was going to see her husband. How she came to be in the place where she was found has still to be ascertained by the coroner, who has the remains in charge.

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COLORED PRIVATES ENGAGE IN A DUEL

AS A RESULT ONE LIES FATALLY WOUNDED IN THE ARMY HOSPITAL IN MISSOULA. [SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Missoula, Nov. 3.—Frank Scott was shot in the abdomen early this morning by John Tyler, and is supposed to be mortally wounded. Both men are colored privates of the Twenty-fourth infantry stationed at Fort Missoula. They were in town during the night drinking, and about 4 o'clock got into a controversy in front of the Headquarters saloon, in West Front street. They came to blows and Tyler, getting the worst of the encounter, drew a gun and shot Scott. Tyler was placed under arrest and Scott removed to the hospital at the fort.
