ELECTION DAY IS UNUSUALLY QUIET

DEPUTIES ARE NOT ON DUTY, AS SHERIFF CONLEY HAS NOT APPOINTED ANY.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Nov. 4.—Election day in Anaconda up till noon has been unusually quiet. There are a great many people on the streets and lots of electioneering going on in a quiet way. The rigs of the many different candidates are busily engaged in hauling voters and the indications are that the heavy vote will be in several hours before the time for the closing of the polling places this evening. From a neutral ground the republicans would seem to have the best of it from start to finish. The basis of this is the fact that the labor party has pulled mostly from the democratic ticket, while the republicans have been increasing in strength all fall. It is very evident, however, that there is going to be more ticket slashing in the present election than has ever been the case in this county before. This will tend to make the counting a very difficult task, and there will no doubt be many votes cast out because they have some discrepancy in preparation. Contrary to usual custom there are no deputy sheriffs on duty at the polling places today. Sheriff Conley says he will not put them on unless ordered to do by the county commissioners. "Two years ago," said he, "I assigned men to duty as deputies at the various polling places and in every instance the men worked two shifts, and in some places more, yet they received but one shift's pay. This was very unsatisfactory to them and to me. So this year there will be no deputies unless the commissioners order them. Then there will be no misunderstanding about pay."

JUDGE NAPTON ISSUES A VENIRE FOR EVANS JURY

Fifty Names on the List to Get Twelve Men to See Who Murdered the Mining Man.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Nov. 4.—A venire of 50 names has been issued by Judge Napton from which to select a jury in the Evans murder trial, which will be called in the district court next Monday. County Attorney Duffy will conduct the prosecution and will be assisted by John Tolan. The defense will be conducted by Attorney Wines of Butte and Trippett of Anaconda. It is the opinion of the attorneys that nearly two weeks will be consumed in the trying of the case, including the time spent in securing a jury.

One of the boarders not recognizing Healey gave him a beating and then the latter was arrested in the belief that he was influenced by liquid absorption. Healey will have his trial next Thursday afternoon.

MAY BE A DOUBLE TRAGEDY

Suspicion Points to Robert Madison, a Suicide, as the Murderer of His Wife—Kills Himself Over Grief For Her.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Nov. 4.—Crazed with grief over the death of his white wife, Robert Madison, the colored porter of the Apicius club of this city, committed suicide last night at 9:45 o'clock by cutting his throat with a pocket knife. The tragedy took place in Madison's room in the basement of the club building, and in the presence of Police Officer Barney Fitzpatrick, who had but a few minutes before placed Madison under arrest. The suicide of Madison was the culmination of what may later on prove to be a double tragedy. Yesterday morning, Robert Jones, the colored porter of the Washoe saloon on East Park avenue, found the dead body of Mrs. Madison, who was a white woman, lying in the yard in the rear of that establishment. He at once informed the coroner, who was but a few doors distant, and the body was taken in charge by that gentleman. Had Been Estranged. Madison and his wife had not lived together for some months. The woman resided with her mother, Mrs. Mary Thompson, at No. 10 Chestnut street. Mrs. Thompson stated that her daughter left home the night before at about 8:20 o'clock, saying that she had an appointment with her husband. So far as is known that was the last time she was seen alive. When the body was discovered this morning there was an abrasion under the chin which looked as if it might have been caused by the clutch of a hand, or by striking some object in falling. However, inasmuch as there was some suspicion of foul play, Chief of Police Taylor ordered the arrest of Jones and Madison. Officer Fitzpatrick went to the Apicius club at the corner of Fifth and Main streets and found Madison lying on the bed in his room in the basement. He informed the negro that he was under arrest and was waiting until the latter should prepare to come with him. In some manner the colored man managed to get out his knife and open it unseen by the officer. He then plunged it into his throat before he could be prevented. Fitzpatrick knocked him down with his club, wrenched the knife away from him and seeing that the man was bleeding fearfully, rushed upstairs to telephone for a doctor. As he left the room the officer dropped the knife on a table. The wounded man struggled with his feet and secured the knife again and with the persistence of a demon, sawed at his throat until he fell unconscious on the floor. All this took but a few seconds, but by the time the policeman reached the scene again the negro was beyond all help and died a few minutes later. Autopsy and Inquest. The body was removed by the coroner and an inquest will be held over the remains today. An autopsy will be conducted over the remains of the woman. It is said that she was addicted to the use of drugs, and if so her death may have been due to a sudden collapse. The body of Mrs. Madison was found about 10:30 o'clock in the morning. Madison was informed of the facts in the case by one of the members of the club by which he was employed. This took place in the furnace room of the club building. He was almost prostrated with grief, crying for fully 15 minutes, and exclaiming in the meantime, "Oh, that poor girl." He then went to the undertaker's where

he saw the body and gave way to the most frightful paroxysms of grief. Later in the afternoon he became intoxicated in an effort to drown his sorrow, and in the presence of several of his colored friends threatened to take his own life. At that time he displayed a razor, which was taken away from him. About 6 o'clock last evening he retired to his own room in the basement of the club house and intoxicated as he was fell into a deep sleep from which he was aroused by the arrival of Police Officer Fitzpatrick more than three hours later. His suicide caused the greatest excitement among the colored people of the city, Madison having borne an excellent reputation among them. Coroner Hughes on the Case. Some of the testimony as regards the inquest over the remains of the woman was taken by Coroner Hughes last night. It revealed little of importance except to throw suspicion upon Martin Schuey of having been in the company of the woman at some time during the night. He appeared at the police station with a cut on his head and one theory is that Schuey was found by Madison while in the company of the white wife of the latter, and that Madison then fell upon his wife in a rage. It also developed that Jones did not notify the coroner immediately, but went on to his home on East Commercial avenue and meeting a painter named Sparrow told him of the find and the latter notified the coroner. Most of the witnesses who testified last night will be asked to testify again tonight, after the result of the autopsy. Martin Schuey in Jail. Martin Schuey, the man who is under arrest, suspected of having something of the supposed killing of the Madison woman in a cell at the county jail in a dazed condition from the blow which he received in some manner on the head. He would not tell the chief of police how he received the wound, and will be kept in custody until he recovers sufficiently to tell of the occurrences of Sunday night and how he came to be in his present condition. Chief of Police Taylor is of the opinion that Schuey was in the company of the Madison woman, and was discovered by the woman's colored husband, and that the wound was received at the hands of the latter. Shortly after having been informed of his wife's death yesterday morning Madison was asked if he had met her the night before, and replied that he had not. Made by a Sharp Tool. Schuey came to the police station about 11 o'clock Saturday night suffering from a cut on the head, which he insisted was received by falling on the sidewalk. The appearance, however, is that it was made by some sharp instrument. A negro named Pope told the police that he had seen a man running down the alley between Park and Commercial where it enters Chestnut street about that hour. The man was yelling from fright or pain, and as he reached the sidewalk fell. From there the negro said he went to the police station. It has been ascertained that this man was Schuey. It is the same alley in which the body of the woman was found. Upon these facts the police base their theory that Schuey was with the woman.

MANTLE TALKS TO MULTITUDE

Greatest Republican Turnout in the History of Deer Lodge County Presages the Glorious Victory Due Today.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, Nov. 4.—It was a splendid meeting that greeted former Senator Lee Mantle at Turner hall last evening. It was by far the largest that has been held in this city during the campaign. There was a torchlight procession, with more enthusiastic republicans in line than was ever seen in the smelter city before. These men were not marching through the streets and yelling like wild men for nothing. The demonstration meant that the people of the city and county are tired of democratic misrule and they propose to have a change. It means that the republicans are once more united and ready for victory, and it means that for the first time in the history of Deer Lodge county the republicans will elect their full county ticket. Senator Mantle made a splendid speech

—the best that has been heard here during the campaign. He dwelt at great length on the congressional campaign and urged the necessity for Montana to be represented in the lower house of the federal congress by a man who was in touch with the administration. Mr. Mantle eulogized Judge Holloway, the republican candidate for associate justice of the supreme court. He insisted that Judge Holloway would make an honorable and a just judge. He said that the nomination of the judge came as a surprise, and that it was unsought and unexpected by him. The senator went on to show the inconsistency of the democratic newspapers of the state in condemning Judge Holloway because he had been endorsed by the populists. He showed where the present members of the supreme bench had been elected by the assistance of populist indorsement.

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


