CATHOLIC CATHEDRAL IN THE METROPOLIS

MOST COSTLY IN THE WORLD.



This Roman Catholic Cathedral in the Metropolis Will Eclipse the Famous Fanes of the Old World.

(Correspondence Inter Mountain.)
New York, Nov. 14.—An immense Catholic cathedral, more costly and more spacious than any structure of the kind at present in existence, is the dream of Father Bouillon, canon of the Roman Catholic cathedral of Ottawa, Canada, and a devoted student of ecclesiastical architecture. Father Bouillon has prepared plans for a structure to be erected in New York that will eclipse all the splendors of St. Sophia at Constantinople or St. Peter's at Rome.

The drawings show a building rising in tiers of seven stories, the height to be 300 feet, with a dome supporting a great ball surmounted by a cross. On the buttresses of the first two exterior tiers are the figures of the saints, and nearly every facing in the solid granite holds great niches con-

taining a statue of an angel or saint. The drawings for the interior reveal a conception of remarkable beauty. The enormous dome is supported by four pillars, each 50 feet in diameter, full of columns and niches embellished with reliefs.

Mosaics are everywhere, interspersed with reliefs of sacred scenes, delicate columns of the rarest marbles and reproductions of the greatest works of the old masters.

Father Bouillon has named the project Nova Sancta Sophia. He estimates that the preliminary foundation and basement work alone will cost over \$1,500,000, and has not even attempted to reduce to figures the ultimate cost of the completed structure. The great mosaics to cover the interior of the dome, several of which are provided by the drawings, would cost over \$100,000 each.

NOTABLE EDUCATORS PAY A VISIT TO OUR SCHOOLS

Superintendent Young Entertains Distinguished Party of People Who Know All About It.

Supt. R. G. Young entertained a party of visitors yesterday, among whom were State Superintendent of Schools Welch, Superintendent Koontz of Anaconda and Superintendent Condon and wife of Helena. The visitors arrived here yesterday morning and were escorted about the city by Superintendent Young.

The High School was first inspected and then the grade schools were visited. At the Lincoln school the fire bell was rung and the 800 children in the building filed out in perfect order. The building was emptied in one and a half minutes and the splendid discipline was highly praised by the visitors.

Superintendent Young was congratulated on the apparent fine condition of the schools of the city.

November 23 there will be another party of visitors to be entertained. The State Teachers association will meet in Butte to discuss the school legislation needed and at the same time will arrange the program for the annual meeting to be held in Bozeman next year.

PATRICK WALSH SUSTAINS BREAKING OF BOTH LEGS

Miner at the East Stewart Has a Bad Fall, From the Effects of Which He May Not Recover.

An accident which may have fatal results occurred at the East Stewart mine yesterday afternoon. Patrick Walsh, a young miner 23 years of age, fell into an ore chute and when rescued by his friends it was found that both legs had been broken above the knees.

Walsh was removed to St. James hospital where his injuries were dressed. His condition is considered serious and it is said the young man may not recover.

It is said Walsh fell from the eighth floor of the 1,100 level to the sill floor. Deputy Mine Inspector Barry was in Anaconda when the accident occurred. He returned last night and will make an investigation of the case this afternoon.

REYNOLDS WILL DO HIS BEST AT THIS

CHIEF DETAILS POLICE TO STOP THE BAD BOY NUISANCE AND WILL GET AFTER THEM.

Chief Reynolds will take active measures to suppress the boy nuisance in Butte. He gave orders today to have two officers detailed to enforce the curfew law and arrest all boys found on the streets after dark. "We have done the best we could with this nuisance," said the chief today. "We have tried in every way to have the parents of incorrigible boys take effective measures, but they have failed, and from this on the boys who have been creating disturbances on the streets will be treated the same as any other offenders."

"There will be policemen especially detailed to look after the boys, and every boy brought in after this is going to be held and fined by Judge Boyle. If the parents or guardians can't take care of them the police certainly can. There has been so much talk of the nuisance and it is so evident that lectures will not do any good, that we are determined to use stricter discipline. I think after some of the parents have paid fines or a few of the boys have laid in jail for a week or so, the lesson will be more salutary."
