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# LEOPOLD ON THE ANARCHISTS

Belgian Monarch Says He Fears Them Not, But Will Continue to Devote His Life to His Country as Long as He Lives.

Brussels, Nov. 21.—King Leopold made a somewhat striking reply yesterday to a denunciation from the chamber, headed by the president, who presented his majesty with an address of congratulation on his escape Saturday from the anarchist's bullet.  
After thanking the deputies the king continued: "The times are very troubled. Agitators are constantly stirring up their followers to disturb that order which is the guarantee of public liberties. Without order only license remains, which leads inevitably to despotism. These agitators find in their path firstly the heads of states. If they fail to reach them they attack their wives, as in the case of the horrible drama

at Geneva. Their blows are also aimed at ministers as in the case of Senor Canovas, and they also blow up the houses of private individuals.  
"They want to intimidate us, but they will not succeed. Even if they struck down the head of the state it would make no difference as he would soon be replaced. In addition to revolver shots they employ the pen which can write what calumnies they please.  
"I am nearing the end of my life. I do not know how long I shall live, how long they will let me live, but I can assure you all the rest of my existence will be devoted within the limits of my constitutional powers to the good of my country and the protection of its liberties."

After being out four hours the jury in the Rosette-Original Mining company action in Judge Harney's court returned at 8 o'clock last night with a verdict in favor of the defendant company. Four years ago Andrew Rosette, a timberman in the Original mine, was killed. The cable parted and the cage was precipitated to the bottom. Rosette was in the cage. The defense showed that the guides along the side of the shaft were responsible for the accident. It was part of Rosette's duty to keep these guides in good condition.  
His administrator entered suit for \$20,000, and the hearing has consumed all week in Judge Harney's court. The Original mine, in whose favor the verdict was rendered, is one of the Clark properties.

# WORK OF GOVERNMENT BUILDING IS STOPPED

Uncle Sam Will Not Allow His Contractors to Proceed Whenever There is Danger From Cold Weather.

Owing to the frosty weather, it has become necessary to suspend work on the new federal building at the corner of Main and Copper streets. The excavations have been completed, and if the frost had not come it would have been possible to complete the foundation in several weeks more. The government does not permit any work on its contract after frost sets in.  
Architect Jordan said that he had not given up hope of getting any further work done this season, for he had been told that some of the famous chinook winds might come over the hills any day and give us another stretch of good weather. However, it is not probable that we will have another Indian summer, because the good weather has held on a good measure already.

During the last few days copper ore has been struck where excavations were being made for the elevator pit. Mr. Jordan is making a collection of the mineral specimens taken from the ground, and these he will send to Washington to be put in the national collection. He feels that the government should take great pride in the fact that the elevator in Butte's postoffice will rest on a copper foundation. Some good galena specimens have also been taken from the ground. Mr. Jordan will send these, together with some decomposed granite, talc and other unusual rock.

Shackleton & Whiteway are sending out blue prints for the structural iron and will be receiving bids for the work in the near future. Drawings of the terra cotta will also be submitted for bids in a short time.

# HAYES AND CASEY ARE IN A CELL TOGETHER

Which is Highly Appropos, Inasmuch as the Gentlemen Are Jointly Charged With the Same Crime.

Dick Hayes and Tom Casey occupy a cell in the city jail and before they can regain their liberty they must explain to the satisfaction of the police what they had to do with the attempted burglary of the Oppenheimer store on West Galena street last night.

The watchman at the store, Charles Gunderson, claims that he saw Hayes trying to get through a window in the store, and that not wishing to use his gun on the marauder, he frightened him away. He then followed Hayes up the street and had Officer Barshaw arrest him. Casey, who was with Hayes at the time, was also taken into custody.

There is considerable doubt as to Casey's guilt. He is a miner and has regular employment. Hayes is serving a 60-days' sentence at the county jail and is a trusty. His attempt at burglary last night was made while out of jail for a few hours.

# WOMAN NOT YET LOCATED

Sheriff Furey Was Unable to Find Any Trace of LaBonta.

After two weeks of searching on the coast in the Northwest for Madam La Bonta, who is wanted in the murder case of Dr. H. A. Cayley, Sheriff Furey returned last night without the woman. In Seattle and Vancouver he had traces of her, but she had left for parts unknown.

Sheriff Furey says that the \$300 reward offered by the local commissioners was not sufficient inducement to influence other officers to make an effort to detect the woman.

Harry King, Arraigned for Assault Upon Chinaman, Says a Mysterious Stranger is Guilty.

Notwithstanding the positive identification by the Chinaman and the officer, King swears that the other man, a stranger, knocked Sing down and tried to rob him.

The case will be given to the jury this afternoon.

The case of Jerry McMahon, charged with horse stealing, was set for trial November 25.

H. A. Frank, as attorney for Mark Kelley and Frank Butler, asked that the pair be given separate trials, which was granted and the county attorney elected to try Kelley first.
