THIS IS THE REAL DUCK BOAT

When a Couple of Fellows Go Out in This New-Fangled Contrivance, They Will Bring in Everything in Sight...How the Thing Works.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Nov. 21.—Rowboats, catamarans and rudely constructed mud scows are to be found in any number on the lakes in the vicinity of Anaconda. A genuine duckboat, constructed on thoroughly scientific principles and with a plausible reason for every peculiarity in its build, has just been purchased by a local sportsman, and at the present time it stands alone in its class in this city.

At such a height as to enable him to see over the man ahead of him and over the prow of the vessel, so that anything ahead or at either side of the boat is within range of his vision. The head man has to lay flat and depend on the man in the rear for the tip. Loops around the side of the pit in the boat form places wherein dead grass or other material may be fixed and thus, to the unsuspecting duck, the boat has the appearance of a small floating island.

INSPECT THE SCHOOLS AGAIN

NATIONAL FOUNDERS MAKE THEIR TERMS

Moulder's Union Will Have to Pass Upon These Restrictions, Which Are of Utmost Importance.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. Detroit, Mich., Nov. 21.—The convention of the National Founders' association was brought to a close yesterday by the election of officers and the adoption of an agreement with the Moulder's union and requesting the members of the union not to make any other local agreements.

The resolution declares, however, that in making a yearly agreement "the association does so only on condition that such agreement must embody equitable matters relating to apprentices, restriction of output, limitation of a man's earning capacity, abolishing of fines imposed on moulders for the purpose of limiting an individual moulder's production, the right of a non-employer to operate moulding machines or any other foundry appliances, in accordance with his best judgment and to maintain equitable piece work and premium system, the abolishing of a flat minimum wage rate and the establishment of a differential wage rate for moulders."

The resolution also declares that no agreement shall be entered into for a shorter work day's work and declares the nine-hour day is a local and not a national issue.

WHERE MEN PRODUCE.

Paperbox makers at San Francisco, Cal., have submitted a new wage scale to their employers. They demand a 20 per cent increase in wages and a nine-hour day.

Stationary engineers in the employ of the Chicago Milwaukee Brewers' association

tion have made a demand for an eight-hour day, union wages and working conditions.

Cigarmakers of Albany, Troy, Glenn Falls, Saratoga, Hudson and Amsterdam, N. Y., have formed a joint conference board for the advancement of organized labor.

A deputation of government canal lockmen from the Welland canal has asked Canadian cabinet ministers for an increase of pay from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a day and shorter hours.

SECRETARY MOODY HAS MADE IMPORTANT RULE

Workmen Will Be Permitted to Let the Department Complain or Make Reports.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Secretary Moody has made an important rule by which employees of the naval board are allowed to present to the board of wages any question directly affecting the rule of wages. The secretary states that his decision is to form a precedent and will apply to all navy yards of the government.

In his letter he says: "I desire to establish the following precedent, viz: that workmen in any trade in the yard, by making application to the commandant, shall be permitted to appear before the board of wages and present data concerning the rate of wages paid to workmen in their trade in the vicinity of the yard, and make explanation concerning conditions under which the work is performed, and that the data shall be printed and statements shall be given careful consideration by the board in submitting its recommendation as to wages."

HAZLETON MINERS DECIDE TO ACCEPT AN AGREEMENT

In One Company, All the Men but Three Who Are Accused of Urdu Activity, Will Be Reinstated.

Hazleton, Pa., Nov. 21.—The trouble at the Cranberry and Crystal Ridge collieries of A. Pardee & Co., where the employees refused to return to work because they were asked to sign an agreement not to interfere with non-union men, was settled today, and operations will be resumed on Monday. Instead of signing the agreement individually at the mines, the men agreed in a body to abide by its provisions, and empowered a committee of their "legal" to make written promise that all their employees will comply with these conditions. All the men but three who are accused by the company of having been unduly active during the strike were reinstated.

The only collieries in this district where the differences have not been settled are those of Cox Bros. & Co., whose men will meet this afternoon to receive a proposition from the company, outlining a plan of settlement.

IRISH UNIONIST STONED BY MOB HE ADDRESSED

Belfast, Nov. 21.—T. M. Russell, the unionist member of parliament, was stoned by a mob after he had addressed a meeting at Drumore last night. The rioters attacked the hall where Mr. Russell had made his speech and caused him to seek refuge in a neighboring house, whence he tried to escape in a carriage. The mob discovered him and bombarded the buggy with stones. Mr. Russell was struck on the head, but not seriously injured.
