FITZPATRICK SAYS BETTER NOT CLOSE

PRESIDENT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD THINKS THE CHILDREN ARE BETTER OFF AT WORK.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Nov. 24.—Last Saturday afternoon M. J. Fitzpatrick, president of the school board, stood on the corner of Main street and Park avenue and watched more than two hundred children of school age walk up the street singly, in pairs and by threes and fours. They would stop to look into windows, occasionally throw a snowball, and the small boys were eternally on the lookout for a sleigh, the rear end of which they could catch and ride for a block or so. Judge Fitzpatrick was talking to himself, emphasizing different thoughts with vigorous shakes of the head. "Some people," said he, "wanted the schools closed. This day there is no school and the street is full of children. It would be this way every day if there was no school. There is a good deal more danger of them catching scarlet fever on the street than there is in the schoolroom." And the president of the board walked down the street fully convinced, as are many others, that it is best that school continue and that the precautions that are being taken make the schoolroom a vastly safer place for the young ones than are the streets at any time.

DEATH FROM NATURAL CAUSE

Such is the Verdict in the Case of Mrs. Mary Brabazon.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Nov. 24.—Coroner Joseph Hughes held an inquest over the body of Mrs. Mary Brabazon last night and a verdict was returned of death from natural causes. Mrs. Brabazon was found dead Saturday afternoon by her mother, Mrs. John McMillan. The daughter had complained of not feeling well and at noon went to her bed to lie down for a while. Other members of the family testified at the inquest that Mrs. Brabazon had been a sufferer from sharp pains in her left side. The Brabazon home is at No. 605 East Eighth street, and there are four small children left motherless. The husband is in Seattle, and wired yesterday that he would leave at once for Anaconda. No arrangements for the funeral have been made as yet.

EUGENE TYLER ON ROBBERY CHARGES

COLORED GENTLEMAN ARRAIGNED IN DISTRICT COURT—ALSO COLORED LADY.

Tyler is accused of having robbed Richard Rule of a sum of money one night last June. The affair took place on Main street, near the B., A. & P. depot. Shortly afterwards Tyler and two colored women were arrested while driving down the street in a buggy. They were searched and the pocketbook identified by Rule as being the one of which he had been robbed was found in their possession. They were all arrested and later one of the women, Gomer by name, pleaded guilty in the district court and was sentenced to the penitentiary. She will be brought from Deer Lodge to testify against Tyler. The other woman, named Montressa, has made known that she will plead guilty to the charge and receive sentence.
