KNIGHTS OF LABOR MEN

They Are on Trial in Washington for Alleged High-handed Proceedings.

Washington, Nov. 26.—The hearing of the case of the five labor leaders claiming to be accredited officers of the Knights of Labor, whose trial for alleged forcible entrance into the national headquarters of the organization here has been going on for several days, was continued yesterday, but without reaching a conclusion and the case was adjourned until Friday.

He did not know who opened the door. He saw it open and he was with those who entered. He admitted that certain charges, dated July 18, 1900, filed against him when he was general master workman of the order, were still pending in November last when he presided over the Niagara Falls convention.

This testimony, it was explained, was introduced to prove that he presided illegally in violation of the constitution of the order.

Counsel for defendant produced evidence to show that five men came to Washington with the bona fide belief that as officers of the Knights of Labor they were entitled to take possession of the headquarters.

Racine, Wis., Nov. 26.—The sisters of Jackson I. Case, the manufacturer who was reported to be near death's door, state that his illness is not nearly so serious as reported; that he is able to be about the house and attend to his correspondence.

He Is Not a Candidate.

Whatcombe, Wash., Nov. 26.—Supreme Justice-elect Hiram Hadley yesterday issued a statement in which he denied he was a candidate for the United States senate and asking his friends to cease discussing his name in connection therewith.

Sold to Highest Bidder.

Lancaster, Ky., Nov. 26.—Two negro women and one negro man were sold by the sheriff to the highest bidder before the courthouse on Friday—one for three months, the other two for one and three years, respectively. They were convicted of vagrancy in the circuit court.

Collide in St. Vincent.

St. Vincent, C. V., Nov. 26.—The Prince line steamer Westminster, Captain Black for Capetown, while entering this port yesterday collided with the British steamer Edderton, Captain Russell. Both vessels were considerably damaged.

WILL SOLVE GREAT QUESTION

Charles E. Adams Talks on Labor Before Massachusetts Board of Trade.

Boston, Nov. 26.—In the report at the Massachusetts board of trade's annual meeting here yesterday, President Charles E. Adams endorsed the suggestion made by President Roosevelt last summer for the appointment of a national committee to consider and report to congress on matters of tariff legislation. In speaking about labor, he said:

"The movement recently initiated among non-laboring men of the United States to form a national association, is the commencement of a forcible sentiment that will hasten a solution of the great question regarding the right of all who are now constitutionally a part of this nation."

LOCAL TEAMSTERS TO GO OUT

Contractor Hennessy is Said to Have Violated Union Regulations.

It is current rumor that all of the teamsters working in Butte may refuse to work at any time. Contractor Hennessy, who is hauling ore, has violated union regulations and unless he comes to time a strike may be ordered.

WHERE MEN PRODUCE.

The jurisdiction of the Master Steam Boilermakers' association has been extended, and branches will be established in Europe. The association already has branches in Canada and Mexico. The object of this extension is to secure the enactment of uniform license laws.

A defense league for employers is forming at Toronto, Canada. The main object of the league is to place business upon a more permanent basis and to render strikes impossible by providing means in all cases for arbitration upon an equitable basis of all matters in dispute.

The only white labor wanted in South Africa is for the building, agricultural and pastoral industries. Building trade hands can find employment at from 10 shillings to 12 shillings 6 pence a day, exclusive of overtime. The average normal week is from 48 to 51 hours.

There is no change in the situation as regards the trouble between the Carpenters' union and the packing-house and stock yards employers at North Worth, Tex. The employers say they have no proposition to make, and the union men who quit work have refused to go back again.

The strike of foundrymen at Newport, Monmouthshire, England, continues. It involves pipe-bedmen, pitmen, pipe-testers, dressers, cupola men and general laborers. These struck for better wages and conditions of employment. The men belong to the National Amalgamated Laborers' union.

A meeting of the iron and steel workers, mechanics and others' sliding-scale committee of South Wales and Monmouthshire, England, was held at Abercynon to receive the auditors' report for the three months ending August 31. As a result of the award wages will be reduced one-half per cent.
