Anaconda, Dec. 6.—Judge Napton has set the date for hearing the election contest case between the rivals for the office of sheriff in Deer Lodge county for December 20.

Mr. McMahon, the contestant in his complaint requests a recount of the precincts of South Deer Lodge, Elliston, Avon, Washington and Gulch and Ovando.

In the document filed it is alleged that Barnden was given 96 votes in the Deer Lodge precinct, whereas in truth and in fact he did not receive more than 80 votes. At Avon he was given 58 votes when it should have been 54.

In view of the fact that Barnden's majority was only 8, and both men are well known, the contest is being watched with much interest in both Deer Lodge and Powell counties.

TICKET FORGERS ARE CONVICTED

WESTERN PASSENGER ASSOCIATION BREAKS UP A CHICAGO GANG OF SMOOTH OPERATORS.

All the railway offices in Butte have received instructions to be on the lookout for ticket forgers, while conductors and ticket exchangers on all lines operating in the West have received instructions to examine tickets closely to see that they are not forged.

The reason for this is that the several companies have discovered a nest of ticket forgers in Chicago. Though the gang has been broken up all efforts are being directed to prevent the operation of other gangs. The Chicago American of November 10 tells of the arrest of the Chicago forgers as follows:

"Charles J. Allardt, ticket broker, Edward Farnum and James Donaghy, his two assistants, were convicted of conspiracy yesterday before Judge Brentano by a jury. They will go to the penitentiary.

The three convicted men were immediately thereafter arraigned before Judge McEwen on charges of forgery. Edward Farnum pleaded guilty, while the others pleaded not guilty.

Alexander T. Freeman, the fourth of those on trial, was acquitted. Margaret Moran, who was one of the ticket-forging crowd, but who pleaded guilty and turned state's evidence, will probably be given her freedom.

"The ticket forgers operated at 102 Clark street, where they forged and manufactured tickets representing more than 25 railroads throughout the country. The railroads concerned estimated the value of the spurious tickets issued at \$200,000 in a year.

Allardt was tried once before in the criminal court on charges of ticket forgery, but was acquitted.

Despite the convictions secured the cases for forgery will be vigorously prosecuted. The Western Passenger association has spent much time and expense in ferreting out the ticket forgers and the railroad officials are much elated over the convictions."
