

# MICHIGAN MAN IS ALL AFIRE

### Writes From Jackson to Ask if There is a Vacancy in the Ranks of the Butte Regiment of Filibusters Who Are to Go South to Free Castro From Haughty Powers.

The fighting fever has spread from the army of the Creme De Menthe brigade even to the wilds of Michigan. The patriotic spirit has stirred in the breast of H. C. It is said that at least one well armed company, all crack shots and old mountain men, will go south in a few days. A number of Spanish war veterans and several veterans of the Fenian invasion of Canada are among the men enlisted."

# TO FURNISH POWER FOR ALL PURPOSES

### THIS NEW ELECTRIC PLANT IN CONNECTICUT WILL SURELY BE A BIG MONEY MAKER.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. New Haven, Conn., Dec. 23.—Work has just been begun at Bulls' Falls, on the Hoosatic river, three miles below Kent, on what is to be the largest water-power plant in this state. A dam 200 feet long and 20 feet deep is to be constructed on the Hoosatic and a large storage reservoir will be built. The water from this reservoir will be conveyed two miles through a canal to the power-house, where there will be a fall of 116 feet. This canal will be partly blasted through solid rock and will be 30 feet wide by 10 feet deep.

The plant will generate 7,000 horsepower, when run at its full capacity. The plan is to generate electricity to sell over a wide area of Western Connecticut for manufacturing purposes, town and city electric lighting and trolley and third rail roads. It will be possible to transmit the current as far as Derby and possibly Waterbury.

The work involves an outlay of nearly \$2,000,000.
