## HE FAVORS A CONSOLIDATION

### Kelliher Thinks County and City Governments Might as Well Be One. Mayor and Aldermanic Committee Are Off to Helena—Opposition to Measures of Butte Business Men's Association.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN.  
 Anaconda, Jan. 13.—William Kelliher, chairman of the board of county commissioners of Deer Lodge county, has gone to Helena and while there will interest himself in the proposed legislation relative to the government of towns and cities.

Mr. Kelliher is ardently in favor of the plan to consolidate the county and city governments in counties like Deer Lodge and Silver Bow. He can see where such an arrangement would be a great saving to the taxpayers and enable those in charge of the funds to get the municipality out of debt.

He has but little hopes of passing such a law at the present session of the legislature, but is quite of the belief that the matter will be brought up at the next session and in all likelihood be passed. While in the capital city Mr. Kelliher will do what he can to help along the bill introduced by Representative Allen, rearranging the county lines between Deer Lodge and Silver Bow counties.

Mayor Stephens and County Attorney Sawyer will leave for the capital on one of the trains leaving the city this evening and will probably be accompanied by the aldermanic committee appointed by

the mayor at the last meeting of the council.

They have been notified that their presence is needed and it is particularly desired that the city attorney go over for the purpose of consulting with the other city attorneys in drafting the legislation sought by the cities and towns of the state.

It seems that there will be some opposition to the measures proposed by the Business Men's association. The ranchers and others living outside the city limits are of the opinion that it is up to them to defend the rights of the county.

One gentleman who was in the city today expressed the belief that the cities and towns in the state were well treated in the matter of taxation and other things. He points out the fact that all, or nearly all of the expense, such as the trial of criminal cases, the care of the county poor and the necessity of an expensive jail, comes from the city.

It cost Deer Lodge county quite \$20,000 to look after the poor last year and every one of the inmates of the county poorfarm are the product of city life. This is not an argument against the joining of the city and county governments and so far not one dissenting voice has been heard to the scheme.

## NEW SMELTER FOR THE GARDEN CITY

### MINNESOTA CAPITALISTS MAY ERECT A PLANT AT MISSOULA IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

 Anaconda, Jan. 13.—James B. McContry, who resides in the western part of Missoula county, is in the city and is authority for the statement that the Bitter Root Copper Mining company will, in all probability, erect a smelter in Missoula. He says that the company is largely composed of Minnesota capitalists and that they approve of locating the plant in the Garden City, provided that the citizens make it an object to the company.

It is understood that a site will be asked at a minimum price and that if the terms are satisfactory the smelting works will be built there and if not at some point further west, probably at Saltese.

According to Mr. McContry the contemplated smelter will cost a large sum and be one of the most modern of its kind and will when built and in operation give employment to hundreds of men, with a pay roll amounting to many thousands of dollars monthly.

The mines of the company are situated near St. Regis and are said to be well developed.

## GLOOMY OUTLOOK FOR THE GERMANS

### FINANCES OF PRUSSIA ARE SAID TO BE IN VERY BAD SHAPE—DIET CONVENES.

 Berlin, Jan. 13.—The Prussian diet was reopened today. The chancellor, Count von Buelow, read the speech from the throne. No mention was made of foreign matters nor of the canal bill. The speech took a gloomy view of the finances of Prussia.

It is said that accounts for 1901 closed with a deficit of \$9,375,000, and added that it was not anticipated that the accounts for 1902 would be appreciably more satisfactory. As for 1903, a demand would have to be made on public credit for a considerable loan in order to establish equilibrium between the revenue and expenditure, and in consequence of the depression in agriculture, trade and industry a further depreciation in the receipts of several of the administrative departments would result.

### Whistling Bullet Fired byirate Colored Lady at Flying "Big Boy" Grant Skims by His Head.

 Anaconda, Jan. 13.—In a row which took place between a colored man and woman here yesterday Sheriff George Storrer came very near losing his life. Storrer was walking along the street, when a bullet whistled by his head. Turning quickly he saw Mrs. Pete Goss, the wife of the colored proprietor of the Goss boarding house, standing at the door with a smoking revolver in her hand.

He arrested the woman and afterwards learned that she had lived at the house of "Big Boy" Grant, who lives at the house.

According to the woman's story, Grant came into her room in an intoxicated condition and refused to leave. The woman says that the man drew a knife and threatened to kill her, and that she, seeing the revolver on a table, took a shot at him.

The pair are in the county jail.

## RUTH BROUGHTON A BONE OF CONTENTION

Little Ruth Broughton, whose mamma and papa were separated by a divorce decree lately is still a bone of contention between her parents. Papa has her now, or at least his sister, a lady who lives down on Colorado street, numbers her among her household, and papa's possession is founded upon an order of court made by Judge McClernan.

This morning Attorney Thresher, representing the mother of Ruth, appeared in Judge Clancy's court and made an effort to upset Judge McClernan's order and reopen the matter. He did not succeed, but he has not given over his efforts and will make a flank movement on the order on next Saturday through the medium of Judge Clancy's motion calendar.

### Her Mamma Remarried.

Judge McClernan made two orders in the case heretofore. The parents of Ruth are, or were before Mrs. Broughton was remarried, Edward C. Broughton and Emma Broughton. Mrs. Broughton sued for a divorce on the ground that Broughton was dissolute and cruel, and she was awarded a decree and alimony and the custody of the child, Mr. Thresher said, but the written decree did not contain anything relative to the child or the alimony.

Mr. Thresher told Judge Clancy that a petition was filed in Judge McClernan's court on December 10 alleging that Mrs. Broughton had remarried and that her new husband was about to convey her and the little girl out of the state, which was a proceeding not nominated in the decree, the understanding being that the child should remain within reach of the father, so that he might see her now and again and thus satisfy his natural affection and in some sort oversee Ruth's physical, moral and mental welfare.

Upon this petition Judge McClernan ordered that the child be taken by the sheriff and turned over to Broughton, and that certain alimony be kept there, and these things were done.

### What Thresher Maintains.

Mr. Thresher declared that the petition was not properly verified, but that Judge McClernan was not aware of that fact. On that ground he asked Judge Clancy

to annul Judge McClernan's orders and have another hearing as to who should have the child. Judge Clancy declined to do any annulling, and said that verifications cut little ice in his estimation and that Mr. Thresher would have to come before the court in some other way if he wished to get action on the question of who should have Baby Ruth.

Judge Clancy said that he was not much impressed by all the solemnity of verifications so much heard of in this neck of the primeval forest, and that he had never heard anything much about such things till he came here, over fifty years of age.

"I won't open this matter again till you show the man's unfit to have the child," he said, "and you'll have to come in some other way."

So Mr. Thresher said he would put the matter on the motion dock for Saturday and withdrew.

## STEALING COAL IS NOT A THEFT NOW

### TOLEDO WORKHOUSE BOARD WILL NOT RECEIVE PRISONERS SENT UP ON SUCH A CHARGE.

The order includes directions to the superintendent to receive no prisoners from any court sending them in for petty coal thefts. It is explained that no prosecutions for coal thefts will be recognized by the board during the coal famine.

## WELDON B. HEYBURN NAMED AS SENATOR FROM IDAHO

### Receives the Vote of Every Republican in Both Houses—Pretty Compliment From the Opposition.

 Boise, Idaho, Jan. 13.—The houses of the legislature in separate session today elected Judge Weldon B. Heyburn of Wallace, for senator to succeed Henry Heitfeld. He received the votes of every republican in both houses, 50 in all. The 17 democrats voted for James H. Hawley of Boise.

The feature of the session was the speech of Mr. Galloway of Washington (dem.), who seconded Senator Hawley's nomination. He said the people of the state had expressed a wish at the recent election for the republican senator. The democrats, he said, could not elect, and he therefore regretted he was denied the opportunity of voting for W. E. Borah, the defeated republican candidate, who, he said, was the peer of any of the candidates of the opposition party, and whose interests were identical with those of Idaho.

This indirect reference to the fact that Judge Heyburn maintains an office in Spokane, Wash., was greeted with wild applause.

## STATE FARMERS' ASSOCIATION

### Convenes at Great Falls to Discuss Agrarian Interests.
