ROBERT EMMET LITERARY SOCIETY WILL MARK THE ANNIVERSARY OF HERO'S BIRTH

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Feb. 26.—It has been decided by the Robert Emmet Literary society of Anaconda to celebrate the one hundred and twenty-third anniversary of the birth of the great martyr to the Irish cause. It is also the one hundredth anniversary of his death.

Robert Emmet was born March 4, 1778, in the city of Dublin. At an early age he was admitted to the famed Trinity college, Dublin, but was expelled from that institution before graduating, after which he went to the continent, living mostly in France.

He was one of the founders of the famous historical society of Trinity college, and a classmate of the immortal Irish poet, Thomas Moore. He was expelled from the college for making a patriotic speech before the historical society in 1798 and he did not return to his beloved country until 1802.

It is presumed that he had the assurance of the great Napoleon that he would receive assistance if the Irish people made an effort to throw off the English yoke.

HEALTH OFFICER IS TO MAKE CLEANUP

EVANS WILL SEE THAT REFUSE MATTER OF ALL SORT IS TAKEN OUT OF THE STREET.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Feb. 26.—Dr. Evans, the city health officer, will soon take formal action looking to the thorough cleansing of the city of all refuse matter. There is much to be done to make the city present a good appearance.

It is claimed by the officials that Anaconda is not a dirty city by any means, but it is also admitted that during the winter months the streets and alleys become littered with paper and other refuse matter that, while not particularly unhealthy, gives the appearance of carelessness and neglect.

All of this will be remedied, and in addition thereto, the back yards, cesspools and stables will be given a thorough overhauling and, in addition thereto, all of the nooks and corners sometimes neglected, which breed scarlet fever, typhoid fever and other dangerous and contagious diseases, will be looked after.

The recent warm weather has disclosed the fact that the streets and alleys are strewn with paper and that in places there are spots that require the immediate attention of the scavenger.

Property owners will be required to clean up, but if they do not so their premises will be cleaned up anyway and charged to them.

It is understood that work along this line will be commenced tomorrow morning.

MRS. ANNA A. HUNTER IS AFTER LEGAL SEPARATION

Anaconda, Feb. 26.—Mrs. Anna A. Hunter wants the bonds which bind her to Robert Hunter dissolved by the district court, and through her attorney, John R. Boardman, yesterday filed a complaint in the district court.

There are now four vagrants in the county jail awaiting the action of the justices of the peace and later on the street commissioner.


There was a little blaze in the calcein department of the Washoe smelters yesterday, but it was quickly extinguished with but small damage.

PROMINENT MEN ARE TO ADDRESS BROTHERHOOD

St. Andrew's Men Plan Interesting Services for Lenten Season.—Rev. Robbins' Pamphlet.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Feb. 26.—Rev. H. E. Robbins, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, has issued a little pamphlet addressed to his parishioners, relating to the observance of the Lenten season. The little book is full of good reading and wholesome advice and announces the regular Lenten services.

There will be a litany service and short address every Wednesday and Friday in Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday at 3 p. m.

Services will be held on Sunday as usual at 8 a. m., 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. At the Sunday evening service addresses will be made upon the "History of the American Church."

Good Friday the services will be held at 3 p. m. and at 8 p. m. At the evening service the choir will sing "The Daughters of Jairus."

Easter day the choir will render an elaborate program both morning and evening, and it will be assisted and augmented by several pieces of orchestra and by some of the best musical talent in the city. The Brotherhood of St. Andrews will invite a number of prominent men throughout the state to deliver addresses in the church Wednesday evening during Lent. Among those who will be invited and who are expected to respond are former Senator Hon. Lee Mantle of Butte; Hon. E. C. Day and Judge McConnell of Helena; ex-Gov. Robert B. Smith and A. B. Keith of Butte; G. S. E. Wisner and several others. Several of those invited have already accepted the invitation and it is expected that this will be a popular feature of the Lenten observance.

TO GET THE DEPOT

Helena Will Have a Fine Structure for Both the N. P. and G. N.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Helena, Feb. 26.—Word has been received from St. Paul that work upon Helena's long promised union depot will be commenced in the spring. The excavating for the foundation will be started as soon as the frost is out of the ground. The depot will probably be completed and ready for occupancy this year.

It will be used by both the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific and will be located near the present Northern Pacific depot. The building will be one of the finest in the state, second only to the depot at Livingston.

EXTREME CRUELTY ALLEGED

Mrs. Carrie Tillinghast Institutes Suit for Divorce at Missoula.

Missoula, Feb. 26.—Extreme cruelty, even including threats against her life, are alleged by Mrs. Carrie Tillinghast in her complaint for divorce in a suit she has commenced here against her husband, Charles W. Tillinghast, of Helena. They were married here in January, 1901.

December 16 last she says he threatened to kill her with a pistol which he pointed at her. She says that he is a cocaine and morphine user.

The wife claims he is receiving a salary of \$100 per month.

RULES RELATIVE TO THE SEASON OF ABSTINENCE

Edict as Given Out by Bishop Brondel of Helena for Use During the Days of Lent.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Feb. 26.—Yesterday morning, in the churches which observe the Lenten season, commenced the period of abstinence and closer attention to religious duties and ceremonies. During Lent the regular and special services of the church for that season will be conducted as during previous years, and Catholics will be subject to the regulations of the church as prescribed by Bishop John B. Brondel of Helena.

The rule relative to fasting is as follows: By an edict of August 3, 1897, the use of flesh, meat, eggs and white meats is allowed at every meal on Sunday, as well as the principal meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays—Saturdays of the Ember days and Holy Week excepted. But the use of flesh meat and fish together at the same meal is forbidden during the whole of Lent—the use of white meats and eggs is tolerated on all the days of Lent at the evening collation and at the principal meal on those days on which the use of flesh meat is forbidden. In the morning a small piece of bread is allowed with a cup of coffee, tea, chocolate, or some similar drink. When the principal meal cannot be taken at noon the order may be inverted, and the collation taken in the morning and the dinner in the evening. Lard or grease, commonly called fat, may be used in preparing the lawful victuals. Those of the faithful who are exempt from fasting may eat flesh meat more than once a day—the days on which the use of flesh meat is permitted.

RASMUSSEN SUICIDE

Takes His Life in Lodging House at Miles City—Tired of Living.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Miles City, Feb. 26.—Despondent and discouraged K. Rasmussen took his own life in the closet of his room at the Northern Pacific lodging house. He cut his throat with a razor. He had upon his person a certificate of deposit for \$85 and some poetry telling of a wasted life.

RICHARD BRADY SUCCUMBS

Northern Pacific Switchman Dies at Missoula of Injuries.

Missoula, Feb. 26.—After making a heroic struggle against the inevitable, Richard Brady, the Northern Pacific switchman who was injured in the yards Thursday night, died last night at the Northern Pacific hospital. His most serious injury was in the chest and pneumonia set in, which proved fatal. He came here a few months ago from Jamestown, N. D., where his wife resides, and where his remains will probably be sent.

Robert M. Dudley Dead.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Missoula, Feb. 26.—Robert M. Dudley, aged 45 years, is dead at Parson & Brown's hospital of pneumonia. He came here recently from St. Regis for treatment. He has relatives at Inwood and Linton, Ontario.

CUTHBERT MORONY MAY BE SENT UP

HIS MOTHER ALLEGES THAT SHE IS QUITE UNABLE TO KEEP THE BOY IN LINE.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Feb. 26.—Cuthbert Morony, one of the youthful offenders in the city of Anaconda and one of the worst of the lot, was up before Judge Hendricks this morning. His mother was present and said that she was unable to control the boy.

He is but 12 years of age and really a bright looking lad, and it is hard to believe that he is really a bad boy at heart, but his mother says that he is and that she is unable to control him.

It is alleged that he stays out at night and that he will steal and that he refuses to attend school.

Mrs. Morony lives in Washington street, and says that she is the mother of 22 children, and that Cuthbert is the black sheep of the lot.

In court this morning the boy had but little to say, and in parting with his mother he refused to permit her to kiss him good-bye, as he was laid back to a cell in the county jail, there to await the action of Judge Naptan as to the necessity of sending him to the reform school.

Largey, her attorney in fact, and the Butte and Boston Consolidated Mining company, a corporation existing under the laws of the state of New York, whose postoffice address is Butte, Montana, have this day filed their application for a patent for 660 linear feet, all westerly from the point of discovery in drift, of the Tropic lode mining claim, upon which a notice of intention to apply for a patent was posted on the 2d day of January, 1903, situated in Summit valley, unorganized, mining district, Silver Bow county, state of Montana, designated as Survey No. 6755, in Township 3 north, Range 7 west, Section 17, and being more particularly described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the northeast corner, a granite stone set in the ground, with a mound of earth alongside, and marked 1-6755 for Corner No. 1, from which the northeast corner of Section 17, Township 3 north, Range 7 west, bears north 0 degrees 15 minutes west 37.2 feet; and running thence south 0 degrees 15 minutes east 600 feet; thence south 89 degrees 43 minutes west 660 feet; thence north 0 degrees 15 minutes west 600 feet; thence north 89 degrees 43 minutes east 660 feet to the place of beginning, containing an area of 9.09 acres, all of which is in conflict with Survey No. 1516, and reports Nos. 152 and 174, inclusive, of .006 acres in conflict with Survey No. 1972.

The location of this claim is of record in the Recorder's office of Silver Bow county, Montana, in Book "U" of lodes, on pages 27 and 284.
