LADY COOK LOSES BIG DAMAGE SUIT

FORMER SECRETARY OF HER HUSBAND GETS VERDICT AGAINST AMERICAN FOR LIBEL.

London, March 4.—J. H. Wallace, formerly secretary of the late Sir Francis Cook, yesterday obtained a verdict for \$3,250 damages for libel against Lady Cook, better known as Tennessee Claflin of New York. The latter was charged with accusing Wallace of conspiring to circulate rumors that Sir Francis died an unnatural death with the object of blackmailing her. On hearing the verdict Lady Cook sprang from her seat and shouted: "Lord Alverstone, I am an American, and I want you to listen to me. This suit has cost me thousands of pounds, and I have trusted myself in the hands of an English judge and an English jury. I have witnesses from America. I can bring hundreds of witnesses. I want to go into the witness box myself." Chief Justice Alverstone tried to stem the torrent of protest and asked Lady Cook to leave the court, but she continued to protest in loud tones until the lord chief justice directed the ushers to remove her. When an usher laid his hand on her arm, Lady Cook shouted: "Oh, don't pull me out; I will walk out; I ought not to have trusted; I am a weak woman; I have done more for England and America than anyone else."

The last words heard as Lady Cook was disappearing from the court were: "My reputation is ruined."

A. C. BIRD TO BE AT HEAD OF A DOZEN RAILROADS

Is to Be Made Traffic Manager of All the Roads in Which the Goulds Possess an Interest.

Chicago, March 4.—Reports from New York and Milwaukee that A. C. Bird, third vice president in charge of traffic for the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, would be made traffic director of all the roads in which the Goulds are interested, are confirmed by Mr. Bird, who says he has accepted the position and would assume his new duties in a few days.

Mr. Bird's appointment brings the traffic affairs of the Gould railways under one head and will prevent competition between the various lines comprising this great system.

Roads over which Mr. Bird will have jurisdiction are the Wabash and its eastern connections, the Wheeling & Lake Erie, the Ann Arbor, the Western Maryland and a few small roads in the vicinity of Pittsburgh, the Missouri Pacific, the Iron Mountain & Southern, the Texas & Pacific, the Denver & Rio Grande, the Rio Grande Western, the Rio Grande Southern and the St. Louis Southwestern. The total mileage of these roads is in the neighborhood of 18,000.

Mr. Bird will probably make his headquarters at Chicago.

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AFTER ALL DOMINGAN WAR SEEMS TO BE OFF

Present Government Informs Our Minister That Steps Are Being Taken to mollify Everybody.

Santo Domingo, March 4.—The Dominican government has informed Minister Powell that it is willing to issue a decree, as suggested by him, to place Mr. Rosa in the full possession of the benefits of his concessions on the terms indicated by the minister.

The Dominican government has refused until now to take over certain improvements made by Salvador Rosa, including the building of a wharf and warehouse and the improvements of the Macoris channel.

These works were completed more than three years ago, but were not accepted, although the government has been enjoying the benefits of them since 1900. Minister of Finance Tevera has resigned as a protest against the settlement which he had opposed. Candelaria, Rosa and Suro, the leaders of the insurrection in the Barbona district, have been completed and that part of the republic is now quiet.

James Curry Dead.

Great Falls, March 4.—James Curry, for many years an employe of the Boston & Montana smelter here, is dead of pneumonia. He is survived by his son, Seymour Curry of Anaconda and two daughters, Mrs. J. S. Merritt and Mrs. Fred Fuller of Salt Lake City. Prior to being employed here in the Boston & Montana smelter Mr. Curry worked in the Anaconda smelter.

New Company Incorporated.

Helena, March 4.—The Bonanza Hydraulic Mining company, incorporated under the laws of the state of Washington, has filed its articles with the secretary of state. The capital stock is \$1,000,000, and the incorporators are H. J. Miller, Harry Dyer and W. M. Carr of Livingston. The company will operate in the Bear Gulch mining district.

MARYSVILLE MINING TRANSFER CONTROL

News of Men and Mines Round About Bustling Little Camp. Rumors of a Deal Pending in Montana Coal and Coke Company.

A telegram from Boston says that there are rumors afloat of a pending transfer of the controlling interest of the Montana Coal & Coke company which is operating at Horr, Park county. The following call for the annual meeting of the stockholders does not, however, bear out these rumors:

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Montana Coal & Coke company for the election of directors and for the transaction of such other business as may legally come before the meeting, will be held at the office of the company, No. 83 Montgomery street, Jersey City, N. J., on Wednesday, March 18, 1903, at 12 o'clock noon.

AN IMPORTANT TRANSACTION

Proposed Increase of Capital in the Guggenheim Company.

New York, March 4.—Not the least important of the many transactions on foot which will lead to large development in the metal productive industry of the United States is the proposed increase of the capital of the Guggenheim Exploration company from \$6,500,000 to \$20,000,000. This company was originally organized in conjunction with the firm of M. Guggenheim's Sons, whose business was afterwards merged with the American Smelting and Refining company. It acquired semi-developed gold, silver and lead mines in Mexico and the United States, which were thoroughly exploited and developed and either disposed of to separate syndicates or operated for the benefit of the smelting interests. As originally constituted, it was a "close corporation," the control of which was divided between the Rothschilds in Europe, H. H. Rogers, W. C. Whitney, Thomas F. Ryan and the Guggenheims.

The Guggenheim Exploration company has recently extended its business extensively. It has bought up large mining properties in Colorado, Arizona and other Western states, and especially in Mexico, and is now negotiating for all or nearly all the silver-lead mining properties in the Coeur d'Alene district in Idaho. It is due to this extension of its business that it proposes the enlargement of its capital.

It was recently announced that John Hays Hammond, probably the best known mining engineer in the world, had been appointed general manager of the company. It is also announced that Chester A. Beatty of Colorado, and almost as well known as Mr. Hammond, had been appointed assistant general manager. The appointment of these expert mining engineers, together with the proposed increase in stock, indicates that the company will extend its enterprises even more aggressively than it has in the past, and that its field of operations will be confined to no restricted location, but will be carried all over the world, wherever the prospect of successful mining is favorable.

GOOD ORE IN THE "SAMPLE"

Man Who Owns Claim Near Basin Has a Good Thing.

Basin, March 4.—One of the best looking ledges of ore in close proximity to Basin has been developed by C. M. Hewett who is leasing the "Sample" claim in the Basin creek district about one and a half miles north of this city.

Mr. Hewett leased the property a month ago and started a cross-cut tunnel. He encountered the lead a week ago and is now in about eight feet of solid ore, which is of the specular iron variety carrying good values in lead, silver and a little gold he is very much pleased with the present outlook of the mine.

The ore can be easily mined. A good wagon road leads to within a short distance of the property and it can be extended to the tunnel with but little expense.

ALL ARE BUSY AT LANDUSKY

Considerable Activity Reported in the Mining Camp.

Fort Benton, March 4.—Harry Lund, who arrived in Benton from Landusky, reports considerable mining activity in that camp. Development work is being rapidly pushed on several promising properties, and E. W. King has let a contract for the construction of a cyanide plant that will give employment to several additional men.

AMONG THE TOILERS

ELEVATED MEN MAY GO OUT

New York Traffic Is Threatened by a Great Strike.

Chicago, March 4.—An ultimatum, the rejection of which will mean a strike on the Metropolitan Elevated road, was adopted last night at a meeting of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees of America.

This session continued until early this morning. The action of the executive committee was endorsed by suspending negotiations with the company because of its alleged insistence upon a plan stipulating that the employees should work with non-union men. The committee was instructed to submit to the company an ultimatum, the chief specification of which is to the effect that the union members shall not use coercion or undue influence to bring the present employees of the road into the organization, but requiring that all new employees shall be union men.

INJUNCTION STOPS STRIKE.

St. Louis, March 4.—An injunction granted by Judge Adams of the district court prevented the culmination yesterday of the threatened strike of the 1,100 firemen and trainmen of the Wabash railroad for higher wages.

READY BY FRIDAY.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., March 4.—According to statements given out here by some of the prominent mine workers, the award of the commission is expected to be in the hands of the district presidents by Friday next.

TO BETTER THE CONDITIONS

Vienna, March 4.—The Neue Freie Presse announces that parliamentary steps are being taken for the creation of an association to further the economic condition of the Eastern European states. It would be non-political and its aims would be to promote Austro-German cooperation in economic policy and jurisdiction for the promotion of reciprocal preferential treatment with regard to customs, railroads, tariffs, etc.

PENNSYLVANIA IS SUSTAINED

Ohio Supreme Court Decides Relief Department is All Right.

Columbus, Ohio, March 4.—The supreme court of Ohio has upheld the validity of the Pennsylvania Railroad company's voluntary relief department. Suit was brought by the attorney general to oust the Pittsburg, Cincinnati, Chicago & St. Louis Railway company from its charter on the ground that in conducting its relief department it was doing an insurance business in contravention of the state law. It was also claimed that the railway company compelled its employes to become members of the relief association. The lower court held for the company and this decision is affirmed by the supreme court.

SUMMONED BY COMMISSION

Miners and Operators Called to the National Capital.

Washington, March 4.—The Anthracite Coal Strike commission has summoned representatives of the miners and operators to Washington to appear before the commission on Thursday morning to give their views on one of the features of the commission's inquiry on which a conclusion has not been reached. This is the demand made by the miners that it be paid for the coal mined by weight as it comes from the mines and before it goes into the breakers and not by measure or by other process.

The commission is anxious to obtain further opinions from both sides on this matter.

SHE MAY SEE HER CHILDREN

Arrangements Made for Disposition of Royal Saxon Offspring.

Vienna, March 4.—It is stated that the courts of Saxony and Tuscany have arrived at an agreement by which the former crown princess of Saxony may remove to Austria in May and deliver her newly-born child to the Saxon court. She will then be permitted to see her other children every summer. A satisfactory financial arrangement is arranged for her.

GOOD CHANCES HERE

Bowen Tells College Men That America Is the Place for Them.

New Haven, Conn., March 4.—Herbert W. Bowen, United States minister to Venezuela, is here. He paid a long visit to the office of the Daily News, the college paper, which Mr. Bowen founded when he was a student at Yale 25 years ago.

Mr. Bowen met all the "beaters" of the news and talked to them some time. In reply to a question of one of the young men present, Mr. Bowen said the United States was the best place in the world for a young man to start out in life. He spoke of the prosperity of the country and said no country offers a better field for success to a young man than the United States.

Mr. Bowen refused to be interviewed on the Venezuelan question and does not care to even discuss the matter. He will leave for Washington today.
