

These have been secured, and it is probable that the invention will soon be on the market, and in general use among carpenters.




The Plane in Position.

The plane, as perfected and improved by the inventor, is one of the most novel and efficient of all the labor-saving devices offered the public in a number of years. It is operated by means of an automatic roller. When the plane is pushed ahead the roller is even with the rest. When the plane is drawn back the

SAYS GRAND LARCENY OF HEART DISEASE

WARRANT IS OUT FOR J. P. CAMPEAU OF THE BUTTE CARPENTERS' UNION.

A warrant charging grand larceny on the part of Joseph P. Campeau, the treasurer of the Butte Carpenters' union, who has suddenly left the city leaving behind a letter in which he explained his reasons for departing, has been issued out of the county attorney's office upon the complaint of W. F. Gruber, one of the trustees of the union, who charges the embezzlement of the specific sum of \$600. It is claimed, however, that the shortage will exceed \$2,000. The whereabouts of Campeau is not known. The sheriff is endeavoring to locate him.

It is said that because of Campeau's long connection with the union and his supposed reliability, his bonds as treasurer had been allowed to lapse. As his accounts have not been audited for some time and the shortage is believed to be large the funds of the union are believed to have been practically wiped out.

To Lecture at High School April 14—Little Done at Meeting of School Trustees.

E. Benjamin Andrews, chancellor of the University of Nebraska, will lecture at the high school April 14 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon. It was about the most important event of the meeting which was largely given over to auditing bills. These amounted to \$4,821.37 beside the janitors' payroll for March amounting to \$1,570. This is the last meeting of the old board.

HUGE STATUARY FOR THE GREAT FAIR AT ST. LOUIS

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. Weehawken, N. J., April 8.—Karl Bitter, director of the department of sculpture of the Louisiana Purchase exposition; Gustav H. Gerlach, superintendent of Mr. Bitter's shop, and a score of workmen, have loaded into cars part of the heroic size statuary which is to decorate the world's fair ground and buildings. Mr. Gerlach says the number of groups made and being made for the St. Louis fair is nearly twice as large as for either the Pan-American exposition or the Chicago World's fair.

There will be somewhere between 250 and 300 groups. The statues set away already were nearly all of heroic size, varying from eight to 10 feet in height. Among them were the four great pieces for the mimes and metallurgy building, two male and two female. These were too large to be loaded into even one of the huge furniture cars without separation. The four big pieces were made each in two or three sections, which were accurately fitted together before they were finally loaded into the car. The weight of one of the parts of either of these is about 1,000 pounds.

The lower portion of the figure symbolizing civilization for the liberal arts building was so tall that it could just be passed through the doorway. The upper portion of the body and the pedestal were carefully stowed beside it, and the three pieces just filled the space between the end of the car and its side door. One pair of the mammoth lions for the decoration of the grounds will be completed within the next five days. These figures will be 14 feet long and about eight feet wide, and on account of the poses nearly 16 feet high. The figures for the mimes and metallurgy building each over 12 feet high, and typifying coal, copper, iron and gold, will go forward about the same time as the first lion.

The big Centaur and Cupid for the liberal arts building will be shipped probably tomorrow, and the female figures for the Colonnade of the varied industries building which Bruno Louis Zim is modeling will be ready for shipment within a week.
