SAWS STAPLE OFF CELL WITH KNIFE

DEER LODGE PRISONER LEAVES A DUMMY ON HIS BED AND FLEES INTO OPEN.

THE SHERIFF IS IN PURSUIT

Barnden Has Offered \$25 Reward and Is After the Man With a Posse—No Clew Up to Late Hour.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Deer Lodge, July 23.—John Cameron, arrested on a horse-stealing charge at Avon, in the Nevada valley, a month ago and awaiting trial here, broke jail some time last night.

He sawed his way out of his cell, breaking the staple on the window with a knife notched crudely by rubbing it on the stones. The knife was found.

Night jailer Eifer discovered Cameron's absence. The prisoner had arranged a dummy with his overcoat and it looked so like him asleep that his absence was not noticed for some time. Sheriff Barnden and posse are in pursuit. A reward of \$25 has been offered by Barnden.

Cameron served a term in the Montana penitentiary, being released last year.

His description follows: Age, 37; eyes, blue; hair, brown; height, 5 feet 10 inches; weight, 160 pounds; he wore a dark slouch hat and No. 7 shoes, with a brass tap on the toe of the right; his eyes are set well back in his head and he has a scar on the right side of his head near the back; his coat was dark and his pants checked.

No clew to the whereabouts of the prisoner has been received up to a late hour.

A RAISE FOR GLASS WORKERS Fifteen Per Cent Will Be Added To Their Wages.

IN THE STREET TODAY

New York, July 23.—Opening prices of stocks averaged a small fraction higher than last night.

There were 1,500 shares of United States Steel sold at 23 1/2@23 3/4, compared with 23 1/2 last night, and the price subsequently ran to 23 1/2. The preferred stock advanced 3/4.

Rock Island preferred gained 1/4. General Electric a point and a number of the standard railroad stocks a large fraction.

The meager demand was not sufficient to sustain prices and the opening gains were quite generally cancelled. Leaders, such as Reading, the Pacific, Rock Island and Amalgamated sold slightly below yesterday's final prices.

With the falling pressure Tennessee Coal, Oil & Gas and the market hardened in sympathy. United States Steel preferred rose a point over last night.

The market then became very dull. Bonds were irregular.

Fresh selling orders on a large selling scale appeared in some of the low-priced specialties and Rock Island which depressed them materially and pulled the general list back to yesterday's close.

New low prices were reached by Colorado Fuel and Tennessee Coal. A slight recovery in prices soon followed by another outbreak of liquidation.

Amalgamated broke to 4 1/2, extra dividend, being a new low record.

Rock Island fell below 24 and there were losses of a point or more in numerous other low-priced stocks, including Smelting and Southern Pacific.

The disorderly slump in Amalgamated of 5/4 to 3 1/4 had a very disturbing effect on sentiment and the whole market sold off rapidly. Standard railway stocks sold generally 1/2@3/4 below last night.

The close was feverishly active and irregular.

LA SOUFRIERE AGAIN ACTIVE Kingston, Island of St. Vincent, July 23.—The Soufriere volcano has been slightly agitated since July 19, emitting puffs intermittently which caused clouds and low rumblings.

A severe earthquake shock was felt at 1:40 a. m. Tuesday, accompanied by a subterranean sound of cracking, which shook the buildings here and threw people into a state of consternation, they fearing a destructive phenomenon would follow this earthquake similar to that of July 17, 1902, which preceded the eruption of September 3, 1902.

Boilermakers on Strike. (By Associated Press.) St. Paul, Minn., July 23.—Every boilermaker and boilermaker's apprentice in the employ of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railroad, struck today and the total number out is about 145. The boilermakers demand the payment of the Chicago scale.
