ONE MAN LAST HEARD OF IN SPOKANE AND WAS COMING TO MONTANA.

WILL AWARD A REWARD

New York Police Will Pay for Any Information as to the Whereabouts of the Man.

SPECIAL TO THE INTER MOUNTAIN. Anaconda, Aug. 13.—A communication from the chief of police of Syracuse, N. Y., has been received at police headquarters here stating a reward would be offered for any information regarding Peter Kay, Jr. Young Kay is 20 years old, 5 feet 3 inches tall, weighs 160 pounds, is of sandy complexion, smooth shaven, light brown hair, light blue eyes, large regular teeth, short black hands, wears a 14 collar, and 6 3/8 hat. He is a gardener or floriculturist by trade. When last heard of he was working for a man named McMillan near Spokane. He announced his intention of going to Butte.

CONFUSION BECOMES WORSE

Official Tangle in Anaconda Affects Fines From Law-Breakers.

ANACONDA, Aug. 13.—It looks as if every department of the city is getting a touch of the confusion incident to the administering of the law.

This time it is between Mayor Frinke and Police Judge Hayes. Owing to the tangle the residents of that part of town called Mainville are getting the use of the fines, instead of the city.

Last month the judge collected the fines, but as Mayor Frinke would not sign his salary warrant the judge held out the fines, amounting to \$75.

This month the fines will not be collected until the warrants are signed, at least, that is the way it looks today.

ARRESTS STEALER OF A HAT

Another Big Strike.

Crabtree, Griff Morris, Will Morris, Ben Morris, Abe Davis and Ben Daniels has made a big showing these last few days. The tunnel has been cut only 75 feet and the vein crossed to a distance of 8 feet with no sign of the other wall in sight. There are a number of rich mines in the neighborhood of this one and plenty of Eastern capital is in sight with which to work the mines.

No Trace Is Found.

Three men with features obscured behind a generous layer of burnt cork, wore one suit of clothes.
