# HUNDREDS OF THE WORSHIPERS WET

PIER ON WHICH NEGROES STAND TO WITNESS BAPTISMAL CEREMONY GIVES WAY.

## LET DOWN INTO THE WATER

Fortunately the Stream Is Not Deep and Few Are Hurt, Although the Panic Is Fierce.

New York, Sept. 7.—Three hundred negro men, women and children, dressed in their Sunday best and singing gospel hymns, have been precipitated into three feet of water and mud at low tide in Newark bay at Bayonne, N. J. The pier on which they were standing collapsed just as the Rev. John T. Thornton was about to baptize a number of his flock.

Forty persons were injured, the majority by the hysterical efforts of their companions to escape from what for the moment they thought was death by drowning. But when the ambulance surgeon looked over the bruised ones he found only four who needed attention. The rest, bedraggled by mud and water, waded ashore and the baptism was postponed.

The four injured are George Hendrickson, his wife and young son of Bayonne and Mrs. C. M. Theobald of Jersey City. They were all bruised from falling against broken timbers and being kicked and pushed by other persons.

Mrs. Theobald's ankle is broken and her shoulder is badly sprained. Several of those who took the unexpected cold plunge were whites, attracted to the pier by curiosity.

## HANNA IS TO BE PRESIDENT

Changes Scheduled in the National Civic Federation.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. New York, Sept. 7.—Changes in the organization and methods of the National Civic Federation have been decided on by the executive committee, which will be discussed at a conference of the federation in Chicago on October 14 and 15.

This will be preliminary to a week's preliminary congress of the federation at St. Louis next June. It is understood that the sub-title "industrial department" will be dropped.

Chairman Hanna's title of chairman will be changed to president and the title of Secretary Easley to chairman of the executive council, the office of secretary to be filled later.

The president has been authorized to appoint several committees, including those on "hours of work." The latter committee will arrange for a conference of employers in this city in November to discuss ways of bettering the conditions of employees.

The groundwork also is to be divided into sections, such as "building trades," "metal trades," "textile industry," "transportation," "mining" and "miscellaneous," to further the work of the federation.

## MAY TIE UP THE MINES

Ophir Miners' Unions Are to Present an Ultimatum.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. Telluride, Colo., Sept. 7.—At a meeting of the miners' union, held at Ophir, it was decided to present a scale of wages and hours to the mine managers similar to the demand made upon the mine managers of Telluride last Monday.

It is expected that the committee will present the scale tomorrow. The general belief is that the mine managers will refuse to make any change in present conditions, and that this proving true, a strike will be called and as a consequence the entire mining industry of San Miguel county will be tied up.

There is no change in the strike situation in Telluride. Over 100 men left the city last night destined for Montana and Idaho. It is estimated that nearly 800 men have left this camp since the inauguration of the strike last Tuesday.

## NAME COMMITTEE TO SEE

Labor Assembly Will Look Into the Bartenders' Union.

At the meeting of the Silver Bow Trades and Labor Assembly last night the question of admitting the bartenders' Protective association was discussed.

The admission of the bartenders' union on the ground that the former were divided among lodges, some of which hold a charter from the American Labor union and some of which hold charters from their own international association.

The matter was finally decided by the appointment of a committee of five to inquire into the status of the body applying for admission to the assembly and make a report.

# JIMMY THE BULL HAS PASSED AWAY

FAMOUS CHARACTER OF MULBERRY BEND AND CHINATOWN IN NEW YORK IS DEAD.

## HE HAD A MYSTERIOUS AIR

Thought Jimmy Had Come of Famous Family, Although His Condition of Late Years Was Miserable.

New York, Sept. 7.—Dying, as he lived, a mystery to the denizens of Mulberry Bend and Chinatown, "Jimmy the Bull," who gave his name to the police a few days ago as James Murry, but who is believed by his closest cronies to have been the scapgrace son of a former judge of the supreme court who once lived in Brooklyn, will be buried tomorrow afternoon by those among whom he lived.

It is not their contributions alone which will pay the expenses of his funeral. As his body lay in a casket in a Mulberry street undertaking establishment the past of "Jimmy the Bull" was wrapped still further in mystery when two well dressed women, heavily veiled, who declined to give any names or addresses, joined the mourners, and when they left dropped two bank notes into the battered cup which stood at the head of the casket.

No one could be found who knew "Jimmy" by any other name, although for a dozen years he had spent his life in the space of two or three blocks.

Once he received an income from some source, but recent years his income was irregular. When the news of his death spread through the Bowery hundreds of his miserable comrades visited the room where his body lay, and as each one passed pennies, nickels and dimes fell into the cup to pay for the funeral.

## CHICAGO BULGARIANS WILL GO TO THE WAR

Decide to Fly to the Aid of Their Country in the Coming Conflict With the Turks.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. Chicago, Sept. 7.—Believing that war with Turkey is imminent, Chicago Bulgarians are organizing to give financial support to their native land and to send fighting men to the field. A number of Bulgarians have left for Philadelphia, where a regiment is being formed.

Among those who have left for the scene of the threatened war is Stanislaus Svelboff of Waukegan, formerly a lieutenant in the Bulgarian army.

Meanwhile, 4,000 Chicago members of a Greek patriotic society that has for its chief object the extension of Greek territory, have manifested their lack of sympathy with the Bulgarian revolutionary movement. The Greeks declare that the Bulgarian revolution is prompted by Russia.

## REV. ALLEN GONE TO DENVER

Will Try to Bring Next Church Conference to Butte.

They will attend the annual conference of the church there and Mr. Allen will pursue his labors in some other field.

The meeting at the chapel last night was a large one and many regrets at the departure of Mr. Allen and his wife were expressed. The minister also was instructed to labor at the conference at Denver to bring the next annual conference to Butte.

## GENERAL FOOTE MAY DIE

Former United States Consul Is Ill in 'Frisco Home.

## QUEER RACE DISCOVERED ON ISLAND OF PAPUA

It is So Swampy That They Live in Trees, and, Like Apes, Their Feet and Legs Become Atrophied.

"The administrator of British New Guinea reports the discovery of an extraordinary tribe of marsh dwellers on the Island of Papua.
