## MARY LAYTON HAS TOLD HOW SHE TOOK MONEY

New York, Oct. 31.—Mary Layton, who was arrested a few weeks ago and pleaded guilty to charges of embezzlement brought by officers of the United States Playing Card company, is reported to have made a complete confession, showing that she diverted from the company's bank account \$37,000 while acting during six years as confidential clerk in the New York office.

The confession was made first to Assistant District Attorney Samuel. The woman has turned \$5000 back to her employers, all the money she saved. In her confession she mentioned the name of a prominent officer of a New York corporation who, she says, profited by her stealings.

She alleges that the man got her to cash checks and in that way she got rid of a good deal of the money. The balance went in high living.

Miss Layton will be arraigned in Judge Foster's court Monday for sentence. A strong plea for clemency will be made.

Fergus County Sheriff HAS BEEN RESTRAINED

Judge Knowles signed an order yesterday restraining L. P. Slater, sheriff of Fergus county, from disposing of property belonging to the estate of D. Anderson, who is taking advantage of the bankruptcy act.

The order cites the sheriff to show cause in Helena November 10 why he should not turn the goods over to the United States marshal. The order was issued on request of E. H. Sherwood, one of Anderson's creditors. The petition recites that should the sheriff be allowed to sell the goods he will turn the money over to Walter J. Wells and Bernard McDonnell and the other creditors will thus be deprived of their rights.

FUNERAL OF LATE MRS. EMMA BOOTH-TUCKER

New York, Oct. 31.—Funeral services for Mrs. Booth-Tucker will be held in Carnegie hall tomorrow.

Her body will lie in state at Carnegie hall from the time it reaches here from Chicago until that time. An elaborate order of ceremony has been prepared by the army, and following this the body will be taken to Salvation Army hall, where private services are to be conducted by members of the army.

It has been decided to bury the consul in Woodlawn, at the request of her husband, instead of taking the body to England.

## AMBASSADOR NOT ANXIOUS OVER JOB

SIR HENRY MORTIMER DURAND SAYS POST AT WASHINGTON IS REALLY SINECURE.

RELATIONS ARE SO CORDIAL Little Likelihood of Trouble Between Great Britain and the United States at This Time.

Madrid, Oct. 31.—Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, the British ambassador to Spain, who was recently appointed British ambassador to the United States, was interviewed yesterday by a correspondent of the Associated Press at the British embassy here.

When asked what line of policy he would follow, the ambassador answered: "That is difficult to answer, owing to my unacquaintance with the country, but naturally I shall follow the lines laid down by the foreign office."

"Regarding the difficulties of my new position, unless I am much mistaken, they will not be very great, perhaps less than at Madrid, owing to the number of pending international questions here. The relations between the United States and Great Britain are most cordial, there being no serious litigation pending between the two Anglo-Saxon nations, and I am personally convinced that Great Britain will use every endeavor to avoid causes for friction, as made evident by the submission of the Alaska question to arbitration. The political horizon being, therefore, cloudless, I imagine my part at Washington will be social rather than diplomatic."
