

MATRON FOR JAIL TO BE ADVOCATED

FLORENCE CRITTENTON CIRCLE CIRCULATES PETITION TO THE CITY COUNCILMEN.

ASSEMBLY IN FAVOR OF IT

Believes Matron Will Benefit Conditions in Bastiles—Mrs. Barrett is to Speak Here Tomorrow.

At the meeting of the Florence Crittenton circle this afternoon arrangements were completed to present the petitions to the mayor and city council requesting that a police matron be employed.

The work is directly in charge of the Florence Crittenton circle, but every organization of women in the city is interested and the members are working in harmony with the circle to have a woman employed to look after the women and children who are arrested and confined in the jails.

The city and county officers, under whose charge these unfortunate persons are placed, are in favor of having a woman put on the list of employees, as it is a great hardship on the officers to have to attend to many of the helpless creatures. It is now the hope of these men and of those women assisting in the matter that the city and county may cooperate and have all the women sent to the county jail, where quarters can be arranged to accommodate a matron.

Assembly Favours Plan. Among the organizations in this city deeply interested in this work is the Silver Bow Trades and Labor assembly, representing every union in the city. The following letter was received by Mrs. Bucher, 1225 East Second street, which speaks for itself:

Dear Madam: Your communication of recent date was read before the Trades and Labor assembly at its regular meeting last Sunday night, and I am happy to say that your plan of establishing the office of police matron at our city jail received the unqualified endorsement of our organization. There is no question in the minds of the working people that a reform in the affairs of our city jail, like the one your organization proposes, is very much needed, indeed, especially in view of the facts cited in your letter. Anything that is being done toward uplifting these unfortunate women will likewise tend to improve society at large. On behalf of the Silver Bow Trades and Labor assembly I am glad to assure you that we are ready and willing to lend our aid and hearty cooperation to the noble women who are about to undertake this grand work for the betterment of mankind. The lecture will be in the first Presbyterian church. Mrs. Barrett has been in this work of aiding unfortunate women for the past 20 years. She has visited most of the cities in this country and Europe. While in this state Mrs. Barrett will visit the cities and meet with the officers where circles are now organized, including Livingston, Helena, Missoula and Anaconda. She will also endeavor to organize circles in Great Falls, Bozeman and Dillon.

Make Them Independent. Within the past year great strides have been made in the manner of caring for those who go into the Florence Crittenton homes. Training courses are now being instituted in every home, so that each inmate when she goes out of the home at the end of a year will be well equipped with a practical way of earning a livelihood. The various branches of domestic science and professional nursing are among the lines taught in the home in Helena. This seems to be the best step ever taken toward real reform and the women are delighted to take up the work.

TYPES WALK OUT OF THE ASSEMBLY

A split in the ranks of organized labor occurred last night when the delegates from the Butte Typographical union walked out of the Silver Bow Trades and Labor assembly pursuant to instructions issued at a special meeting of the printers in the afternoon. One week ago a resolution was introduced in the Silver Bow Trades and Labor assembly to the effect that in the event of the striking plumbers refusing to submit to the discipline of that body the assembly would issue cards to those men who desired to return to work and to all others working at the plumbing trade in all its branches. This resolution was for final passage last night and the action taken by the Typographical union was intended as an attempt to prevent such action, the procedure of the printers being based upon the principle that the issuance of cards to men to take the places of the strikers was contrary to union principles. The resolution presented for adoption by the assembly read as follows: "Resolved, That this assembly will recognize as good union men engineers, machinists or such union men doing plumbing work in Butte at \$6 for eight hours work until such time as the Plumbers' union will recognize the findings of the Silver Bow Trades and Labor assembly affecting the plumbing shops of Walker & Forbis, and the Electrical Workers' union, and that this assembly will give credentials to such workers, recognizing them as union men in good standing." Immediately after its adoption the delegates from the typists announced their intention of withdrawing and presented their instructions from the union. After the typists left, the delegate from the cigarmakers departed also, but stated that he was not instructed to do so by his union. The seceding unions declare that the assembly wishes to organize scabs to take the place of the plumbers, while the assembly declares that the action of the plumbers is a violation of an agreement and that inasmuch as they came into the assembly with the understanding that they should obey its mandates, they had a right when disobeyed to discipline the offenders. The assembly further claims that it was not the intention of the resolution to allow the importation of scabs to take the places of the plumbers, but to enable those men who desired to hold to the contract to go to work as union men at the local scale. They claim that the plumbers have caused trouble many times and that with all their promises of obeying the assembly they have repeatedly created strife and withdrawn from the assembly.

FINAL JUDGMENT IN COURTEY ESTATE

The final decree and judgment was entered this morning in Judge McClernan's court in the matter of the estate of Thomas F. Courtney, deceased, wherein Patrick Courtney, Mary Ann Whitty and others, appealed to the court to have Dennis C. Courtney removed as administrator on the charge of embezzlement. At the time of the trial the court suspended Courtney as administrator and appointed Thomas F. Hogan special administrator. Judge McClernan today made permanent the appointment of Mr. Hogan and fixed his bonds at \$18,000. The judgment decreed that the final account of Dennis C. Courtney be received and accepted with the exception of the sum of \$1,199.28, money received by the administrator from the secret lease given to Thomas F. Courtney, for which no accounting had been made. The former administrator was ordered to deliver up all moneys and assets of the estate to Mr. Hogan. Chattanooga, Tenn., Nov. 30.—Edward Gould Richmond, one of the South's leading capitalists and manufacturers, died at his residence in this city yesterday.
