Styles in Dancing Have Changed Somewhat From the Old-Fashioned Square Four.

OME NEW MOVEMENTS.

Entertainments Given by Clubs During the Week—A New Dancing Club Which Starts Out With a Good Membership.

The dances of this season are new and exceedingly graceful. Those most commonly used are last season's, although Prof. Bezgs, the Helena teacher, has among his pupils several young society people, some of them members of the Assembly club, who have formed a private class to learn the new dances, in which they are already making rapid progress.

The new dances are the Boccacio, the new glide, Butterfly, Rockaway, La Belle, four step, five step and grapevine waltzes; new Military, Jersey, Columbia, Highland, Gavotte, Yaion, new Mazurka, new gallop, Sarago and York.

The new quadrilles are pretty dances of eight couples, called the Octagon, the Dodsworth, Lancers, Toboggan and others which will probably gain favor among lovers of the art.

Prof. Bezgs says he has over more graceful dances in Helena than any other city of its size and is introducing. The professor is introducing a new feature in the position of partners in the waltz; instead of a gentleman placing his arm about the lady's waist, as so long practiced, he advocates placing the left hand on the arm, about the hips, which will preserve a proper distance, the other hand clasping the hand of the lady.

It is, however, a question if it will not be preferred. "America leads the world in dancing, as there is always some new dance being introduced which improves the old style, while foreign countries cling to the ancient forms," said the professor. "I expect to leave next August for Europe, I intend visiting London, the principal cities in Scotland and France, teaching the American style of dancing and studying the fancy dances of those countries. Upon my return I shall locate either in New York or Chicago."

"I have taught about 12,000 pupils during the past seventeen years, in Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, Wisconsin and Montana. Dancing has changed very materially during that time, so much so that one would hardly compare the waltz of to-day with the one I taught seventeen years ago. Deportment has changed for the better, as will be proved by the new position in waltzing which is being taught."

"I am a member of the American Society of Professors of Dancing. At the yearly convention of the society any member who has invented any new step of dance is required to show it, and if it is graceful and proper it is generally adopted; if not it is thrown aside. There are two teachers in Paris, two in London, two in Glasgow, Scotland, one or two in Australia and two in Canada, who are members of the association. A teacher is required to come to America and study the style practiced here before he is eligible for membership."

ASSEMBLY CLUB DANCE. The Assembly club gave the third reception, which proved fully as delightful as the dances preceding it, Friday evening, at Encore hall. The programme contained sixteen dances. The floor was every way conducive to good dancing and the music, by Yeager's orchestra, was most inspiring. Some beautiful gowns were worn, the gentlemen were in full dress and the scene was brilliant. A palatable lunch was served in an ante-room reserved for the purpose. The entire evening was devoted to dancing, which was most enjoyable.
