

THE BIG GRANITE.

Owners and Officers of the Great Montana Mine Pay a Visit to Helena.

The Mine Good for Years to Come and Developments Still Being Made.

Cerman Gulch South of Butte Coming to the Front as a Rich Metal Producer.

L. M. Rumsey, president of the Granite Mountain company, Charles Clark, president of the Bi-Metallic, Charles D. McClure and Paul Fuz, also officials of the Granite Mountain, arrived in the city yesterday via the Northern Pacific from St. Louis.

At an early day the Boston Quintette club will be with us. The club is composed of John F. Rhodes, solo violinist; Paul Mendel, violinist; Oscar Hentschel, flute virtuoso and violinist; Paul Stoeving, violin and viola soloist; Louis Blumenberg, violin virtuoso, and Miss Annie Carpenter, prima donna soprano.

"It was reported about a week ago that the Granite Mountain company would be bidders for the West Granite?" With a slight laugh Mr. McClure said: "Well, that's a good one. I'd like to know what we want the West Granite for."

"The third stack was fired up yesterday at the Helena smelter, and will begin turning out bullion to-day. Everything around the works is running with clock-like regularity, and abundant supplies of ore are being received daily."

A SECOND BUTTE.

Dr. G. W. Beale of Butte, who operates quartz and placer mines at German gulch, several miles south of Butte, is in the city on legislative business. He says that the quartz developments of the place and also at American gulch, about two miles above him, give promise of bringing out a second Butte.

EYES ON MONTANA.

JOHN MAGUIRE ARRESTED.

A misunderstanding with Bozemanites and the Minstrels.

A deputy sheriff from Bozeman arrived in the city yesterday and placed Manager John Maguire under arrest for non-payment of a \$5 license at Bozeman. The deputy arrived the amount, with costs, had swollen to \$35. Maguire gave bonds and was released.

The story of the trouble is a long one, but briefly it appears to be as follows: The minstrel troupe appeared at Bozeman last week and the license wasn't paid. Sheriff Jefferis was notified and collected the amount here from Maguire. The company suddenly left the town after the show by having their special car attached to a freight train, but they might reach Helena in time to make a street parade. They say they had two meals at a hotel there, and when the minstrel manager went up to pay his bill they were charged with lodging, which they claim they did not have. A remonstrance was made by the manager, who thought such an action was unfair. The hotel proprietor seized the hat box containing the white silk ties and would not give them up until the whole bill was paid. He had already paid for the meals. Of course the minstrel troupe couldn't leave without their hats, as they are the main feature of the parade, and the bill was paid in full. But about the license, it seems to have grown out of some misunderstanding. Maguire kicks on paying \$30 costs for a \$5 license and will fight it out in the courts.
