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AMONG THE RAILROADS.

The Union and Northern Pacific to Arrange Their Own Divisions. ST. LOUIS, May 10--Traffic Manager Oids, of the Canadian Pacific, arrived today and the Transcontinental association got into actual work. The Page-Sound trouble between the Union and Northern Pacific with the Canadian Pacific is being taken up, and discussed at length and finally referred to the three lines mentioned, who are to settle the matter by arbitration.

The Interstate Hearing. NEW YORK, May 10--Before the senate Interstate commerce committee this morning the President Charles N. Smith, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, referred to the fact that railroad building in India and about the Black sea ports was being pushed rapidly and he greatly feared that under present conditions it would not be long before America had lost what little export trade it had. He even advocated the carrying of mail and express matter by the railroads at less than cost when necessary.

Testing the Charleston. NEW YORK, May 10--The U.S. Navy's cruiser Charleston was tested today in the Atlantic Ocean. The ship was found to be in excellent condition.

The Philadelphia Convention. PHILADELPHIA, May 10--At the morning session of the Y. M. C. A. convention opened with a bible study and song service. The report of the international committee was read and taken up for discussion.

The Florissant Robbery. COLORADO SPRINGS, May 10--Two men arrested at Florissant yesterday were charged with the robbery of a stagecoach. The robbers were found to be the same men who were arrested in the same place last year.

Foreigners Blacklisted. PITTSBURGH, May 10--The Window Glass Manufacturers' Association has blacklisted several foreign firms that were found to be selling inferior quality glass.

Three Good Indians. SATE PA, N. M., May 10--Pueblo Indian Agent Williams to-day received a telegram from Gen. Carr, at Fort Wingate, N. M., saying that in a fight between Indians and cowboys near that post three of the reds were killed and the perpetrators of the deed were under arrest.

The Parnell Hearing. LONDON, May 10--The proceedings before the Parnell committee to-day were uninteresting.

Idaho's New Marshal. WASHINGTON, May 10--The president has appointed Joseph P. Wilson, of Idaho, United States marshal for that territory.

A WOMAN IN IT.

Sensational Developments in the Matter of the Disappearance of Dr. Cronin, of Chicago. Frank Woodruff Makes a Confession Which Casts Doubt Upon the Murder Theory.

Cronin said to Have Had a Hand in the Disposal of the Mutilated Body of a Young Woman.

CHICAGO, May 10--The most startling information in the mysterious case of the missing Irish-American, Dr. P. H. Cronin, came out to-night. Last night an officer from the Twelfth street station arrested a young man who was trying to sell a white horse and wagon in a livery stable near the station for a small sum of money. When taken to the station the man gave his name as John Brown, and when asked the routine questions always addressed to prisoners betrayed much emotion and distress.

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A GREAT STORM.

Various sections of the East Visited by a Terrible Whirlwind. NEW YORK, May 10--The weather to-day was intensely hot, the mercury reaching 82 in the shade. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon clouds began to gather in the western and southern sky and soon swept on towards Jersey and New York. A tremendous wind developed and much damage was done at Burlington, N. J. While sweeping over the face of that state the wind, blowing fifty miles an hour, whirled up volumes of gray dust from the soil which was carried before the storm.

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WITHOUT DELAY.

Butte Liveworks Set an Example of Quick Work with a Burglar Captured There. Caught, Indicted, Pleads Guilty, Sentenced and If the Penitentiary All Within Eighteen Hours.

Butte, May 10--(Special to the Independent.)--The burglar in the case of John Greer, who gave his name first as Martin, shot by Officer Trice, last evening, completely escaped. He was captured by Trice when both were boys, and was surprised to meet him in Butte. He saw him last night, and Greer said he was in hand with the burglar. He was arrested and sentenced to the penitentiary for eighteen hours.

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
