THE TRUE STORY.

Black, the Horse Thief, Makes a Confession, Giving the Details of Dr. Cronin's Murder.

CHICAGO, May 28.—The most sensational developments of the Cronin investigation so far were announced late to-night, in the shape of an extraordinary confession which was made almost absolute. OTTAWA, May 28.—Speaking with reference to the action of the American government in sending three cruisers to Behring's sea, a prominent cabinet minister said, "I am hopeful of a peaceable settlement, and negotiations were progressing favorably before the republicans assumed office. Secretary Bayard had gone so far as to propose an international convention to take steps for the protection of the fur-bearing seal." The minister also said that the seal fisheries of Okhotsk, Japan, Russia and England had agreed to send representatives. "I don't anticipate trouble this year. Even though British vessels proceeded to Behring's sea, their presence there is only natural."
