

DOWN TO DEATH.

Conductor Frank Kyes Loses His Life by Falling From a Freight Train in Motion.

The Accident Occurs One-Half Mile South of Bernice—An Inquest Held.

Sent to Jail for Trying to Extort Money—Fell Fifty Feet Without Serious Injury.

Frank B. Kyes, of this city, conductor of a freight train on the Montana Central, was killed yesterday morning by falling from a car, fracturing his skull and resulting in instant death. There were no witnesses to the accident, which occurred at 4:45 a. m., one-half mile south of Bernice.

At headquarters in this city the details received were, that the deceased started to walk over the train, which was stopped at a refrigerator car, it had been raining ever since the train left Butte, leaving the cars very slippery.

Kyes missed his footing while stepping to another car or stepped off. He was not missed until the train reached Bernice, when the train engineer looked up and found his dead body on a pile of rocks a few feet distant from the train.

The track, with the skull fractured and head and body severely cut by the rails on the road, was found by the cars, as the body was taken to Bernice, where an inquest was held.

The facts as stated above were elicited and the company was compensated from any blame by the jury. The body was brought to Helena yesterday morning and turned over to the family of the deceased.

Frank B. Kyes was in the employ of the Montana Central, where he had been for many years, and was a man of good and temperate habits.

He was a young man, about 35 years of age, and was a native of Iowa. He was married and had a family.

The mother of the deceased resided at Forsyth, Mont. The arrangements for the funeral have not yet been perfected.

NOT VERY SMOOTH. The Mahoney Turned on a Youth Who Remonstrated with Him for a Charge of a Heinous Crime Against Thomas McCallister.

John Mahoney, the youth who preferred a charge of a heinous crime against Thomas McCallister, came to grief yesterday and was confined in the jail for a period of thirty days for attempting to extort money.

McCallister is about 22 years of age, arrived here Wednesday from Chicago, and is a native of that city. He is a man of good reputation here.

When Judge Sanders pronounced sentence upon Mahoney the latter cried and wept, but could not be comforted.

Thomas McCallister, employed at the Broadway hotel, which he has occupied fifty feet from the ground, yesterday afternoon lost his footing and fell to the earth.

He was picked up unconscious and placed in a bed. He soon recovered and was able to walk, but he was unable to get on his feet.
