

IT IS ENDED.

The Constitutional Convention, After Sitting Many Days, Comes to a Close.

But Two Members Vote Against the Adoption of the Constitution, But Come Over.

President Clark Makes a Nice Speech in Response to Hershey's Complimentary Resolution.

The constitutional convention has ended. The closing hours were similar to legislative assemblies. Resolutions were passed thanking the employes, and when the final vote came but two men, Warren and Courtney, voted against the adoption, and they afterwards changed their votes. A number of resolutions were introduced and accepted. The particulars in full follow:

MORNING SESSION.

The convention met at 9 o'clock, when Middleton, chairman of the committee on revision and correction, reported that the committee had not finished its labors and a recess was taken until 11 o'clock. On re-assembling, J. K. Toole presented the following resolution, which was adopted: "Resolved, That when the constitution and address shall have been printed, as provided by an ordinance of this convention, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the territory, to whom the same shall be delivered, to mail fifty copies of the same to each member of the convention, and to send the remainder thereof to the several county clerks of this territory for distribution."

Cooper called attention to the omission of the proposition on apportionment from the arrangement of resolutions, and recommended that it be placed between legislative and executive departments propositions and be numbered 5. Hartman made a motion that two members be added to the committee on address, and the motion prevailed. Rickards moved that the convention take a recess to be 1 o'clock. Carried. Warren submitted a resolution naming Magnus, J. K. Toole, Craven, Carpenter and Mutt as a committee to superintend the publication of the constitution and Henry Bernard as their clerk. The resolution to the effect that three members from Lewis and Clark should be appointed to superintend the publication was withdrawn and Warren's resolution was adopted. A recess was taken until 1 o'clock, on motion of Rickards.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon resumed at 1 o'clock. Warren offered a resolution providing for the payment of \$100 for clerk of committee on printing the constitution and for typewritten copy of the constitution. The motion was carried.

Knippenberg offered the following: "Resolved, That the president of this convention is hereby requested to appoint a committee of seven for the purpose of making permanent organization of body for social purposes." The chair appointed as said committee Knippenberg, Magnus, Stapleton, Marshall, Gibson and Rickards. The chairman then announced the committee on address as follows, J. K. Toole, Callaway, Dixon, Carpenter, Collins, Bickford and Warren. The clerk then read the journal up to the hour of recess.

The chairman of the engrossment and enrollment committee reported that the constitution was enrolled in full, including memorial and ordinances. Cooper moved that the constitution be read before signing. Carried. The clerk proceeded to read and read the preamble and one or two articles when Rickards moved that after the reading of the article on judicial department the reading be dispensed with. The motion was carried.

Hartman moved that the clerk call the roll, and the final vote on the passage of the constitution be taken. Warren moved an athena case be added to the constitution. Carried. Before the roll was called Bickford moved the following: "That an appropriation of \$50 each be made for the Independent, Journal and Herald, of Helena; The Miner, of Butte, and Leader, of Great Falls. Carried. The president asked that the Butte Miner be eliminated from the provisions of the resolution. Rickards said if the resolution was to pass as it he hoped the Miner would not be dropped. He said the proceedings had been telegraphed from here regularly, and the members had received their papers in common with the rest of the press, and if any paper merited kind treatment from the convention it was the Miner. Bickford said the papers were as much help to them as the clerks and pages. They had every morning a synopsis of their proceedings of the previous day laid on the desks, and it had sometimes proved errors creeping into the journal of the convention. He hoped the resolution would pass.

The resolution was carried. The vote on the final adoption of the constitution was then taken and carried by a vote of 24 to 2. Courtney and Warren voted in the negative. The constitution was declared adopted amid applause. Hickman moved that members who were not present be allowed ten days to affix their signatures to the instrument. Carried. Hershey, of Lewis and Clarke, sent up a resolution. The president called Marshall to the chair and the clerk read the following resolution: "Resolved, That the thanks of this convention be and they are hereby tendered to the Hon. Wm. A. Clark for the able, faithful and efficient manner in which he has discharged the duties of presiding officer of this convention, and for his uniform courtesy and impartiality we extend to him our warmest gratitude.

Resolved, That this convention, in its appreciation of the high character and work of its president hereby expresses its sincere wishes for his future health, happiness and prosperity, and upon the dissolution of this convention he will be accompanied by the earnest trust that his highest aspirations may be fulfilled and his every aim realized." A Tribute to Clark. Mr. Chairman and Mr. President: I am certain that each member will carry away with him nothing but pleasant recollections of his associations here and a consciousness of having discharged their duties faithfully, each according to his own conscience. I know that I express the views of all the members of this convention that you, Mr. President, will carry with you not only the respect but the best wishes of the members for your future happiness and prosperity. [Applause.] Rickards moved the adoption of the resolution by a rising vote of the convention, and the motion unanimously carried. President Clark then spoke as follows:

A Nice Address. Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Convention: For the generous and very complimentary expression of your personal regard conveyed in the resolution which you have just adopted, and which has been so eloquently supplemented by the remarks of the honorable gentlemen from Lewis and Clarke, I cannot summon words to fully express my appreciation and gratitude, but I desire to avail myself of this

opportunity to reciprocate the sentiment and to the attaches of this convention to extend to each one of you personally for the kindness, forbearance, courteous treatment and kindness which have uniformly and continually characterized all of your actions and relations towards me, by heartfelt thanks. After forty-five days of arduous and busy part, during which there have been considered and discussed the most important and vital questions, involving peace-easily many heated but mostly conducted contests, which required frequent and prompt decisions on the part of the presiding officer, I can point with pleasure and pride to the fact that in every instance these opinions were received and accepted without appeal. This probably indicates a certain amount of unanimity in the history of deliberative assemblies implies a confidence in the judgment and fairness of the presiding officer, as well as a dignified and respectful consideration which I deeply appreciate and shall ever remember with grateful pleasure. [Applause.] Our work is now finished and our names are about to be appended to that instrument which I trust may be adopted as the constitution of the state of Montana. It is a perfect instrument. In it are incorporated ideas and principles upon which we are not all agreed, but which are gracefully to that recognized republican principle that the will of the majority should prevail, we have unanimously adopted it, and it will soon be submitted to a critical and intelligent people for their approval. I am confident that whatever may be found objectionable, the people of Montana will accept it. It defers them to the wisdom of future legislatures, and be confidently relied upon to remedy them. Montana has been presented an opportunity which she should not now neglect. She cannot afford to pause or falter on the very threshold of admission, while her three great neighboring sisters are pressing forward to distinction and renown. It is time to break the shackles that have so long embarrassed the development of our matchless country. It is time that this people so richly endowed with all the best qualities that the most auspicious should enjoy the fullest privileges of American citizenship. Statehood will quicken all our energies and stimulate our ambition. It will encourage a faith in our stability and credit, and induce large investments in our properties. It will enhance the credit of both individuals and the state, and encourage the building of additional lines of railroads within our borders and people our fertile valleys. It will build new cities and increase the wealth of the old. It will establish manufactures and facilitate the exporting of our countless mines. It will promote education, develop the highest and best attributes of civilization, and increase the intelligence and refinement of our people. May each one of you live long to enjoy a reasonable fruition of your labor here and until the envied yet deserved fame of this magnificent state, our own beloved Montana, is proclaimed in the fundamental law you have helped to frame, may be known to all the ends of the earth. Middleton moved the adoption of a resolution thanking attaches of the convention which was adopted unanimously.

Middleton moved a vote of thanks to Warren for his efficiency and versatility in preparing and introducing resolutions. Warren returned the compliment by moving that the things of the convention be tendered to the gentleman from Clatsop, for not occupying any of the time of the convention during the last 45 days. Rickards moved that Lee Swords be appointed clerk of the committee on address, and providing for an additional sum to be tendered to the gentleman from Clatsop, for not occupying any of the time of the convention during the last 45 days. Carried. Middleton moved that the president of the convention send messages of congratulation to other territorial conventions. Carried. Courtney changed his vote to aye as did Warren, making the vote unanimous. On motion of J. K. Toole, the president sang the "Star Spangled Banner," all joining in the chorus. The president presented the gavel to the Montana historical society and the convention adjourned sine die.

Henry R. Whitehill. One of the members of the constitutional convention who proved himself to be the right man in the right place. That man was Henry R. Whitehill. Mr. Whitehill is a native of Pennsylvania and was born in the village of Hookstown, Beaver county, Pa., March 25, 1838. He was a freshman in Jefferson College in 1853, but left at the end of the year. In 1857 he crossed the plains with Reno's battery of Johnston's army, and was at Fort Bridger in Utah during the winter of 1857-58. He remained with the army until after the building of Camp Floyd. Thence he went to California, by way of Los Angeles, reaching San Francisco in January, 1859. He resided near Woodbridge, in San Joaquin county, until March, 1860, when he went to Carson City, Nevada. From 1861 to 1864 he was employed as a telegraph operator on the overland line between Austin and Virginia City. He was elected to the last territorial legislature from Churchill county. He returned to Pennsylvania in 1864 and was a student at West Academy, Washington and Jefferson and Princeton colleges, graduating at the latter in the class of 1870. He returned at once to Nevada and was elected the same year to the office of state mineralogist, was re-elected in 1874, serving in that position until 1878. He was admitted to the bar in 1878 by the supreme court of Nevada, being complimented on the excellence of his examination by an order spread upon the minutes of that court. Soon after the expiration of his term of office in 1878 he went to Bodie, California, remaining there until the spring of 1881, when he came to Montana and resided in Deer Lodge county ever since, practicing law. He was married in 1875 to Miss Sarah S. Brownson, of Washington, Pa., and is the father of one son. He was unanimously chosen by the republicans to represent the Anaconda district, that being the only district in the territory where there was no contest for delegates to the convention.

REPORTORIAL NOTES. Work has begun on the street car extension to the Montana Central depot. There will be a meeting of the Queen City Wheelmen at the office of Dr. Wait, on Broadway, at 9 o'clock, Monday, Aug. 19. All wheelmen are invited. A picnic will be given on Tuesday, August 20th, at Wilder's Lake. Tickets, \$1.50; for children not members of the Sunday school, 75 cents. Train leaves the Montana Central depot at 8:25 a. m. The motor will run within 100 feet of the Breakwater hotel every day. The hotel is finished and the bath will be within a short time. It will well pay any one to visit it. Frank Lynch stole \$15 yesterday on Clark street. He hid the theft at first, but was strangled at the station house and the money was found in his underclothes. Governor White pardoned yesterday Michael O'Brien, who is now serving a sentence in Deer Lodge for manslaughter. O'Brien was pardoned from the penitentiary from Deer Lodge in 1887 and his term will have expired November 25, 1889. A full, free and unconditional pardon was issued. The total amount of the sale of McLean Park sold at auction by Mr. Wolf for the benefit of the poor, bringing a total of \$8,308, in addition to which, on Friday evening, he disposed of three parcels of central city property for the sum of \$3,150, an evidence that this means of disposing of real estate is growing in favor.
