CUTS NO FIGURE. Soldiers Dishonorably Discharged From the Service Just as Well Off as Any Other.

At least Commissioner Tanner Says so, and Rules That They Are Entitled to Pensions.

Black's Order Reversed and Those Cut Off Hereafter May Now Get Arrears.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Commissioner Tanner has rendered an important decision on pensions. He has reversed the order made by Commissioner Black Sept. 3, 1888, and overrules the opinion of ex-Assistant Secretary Hawkins in the same case. That a dishonorable discharge is a bar to a pension is a well established principle. It is also held that a bar to a pension is an erroneous interpretation of the statutes governing pensions to the soldiers of the late war. It is held that a dishonorable discharge does not affect the character of the soldier discharged and does not prevent him from receiving a pension on account of such disability. He holds that a dishonorable discharge is a bar to a pension for a specific offense against the service for which a soldier may be punished, but that the penalty cannot include nor extend to a claim for a pension based on other disability. The two things are held to be wholly distinct and not governed by the same legal considerations. The law does not deprive a dishonorable discharged soldier of a pension. This restores all veterans who were barred by Gen. Black's ruling.
