A FATAL JUBILEE.

Fearful Set-to Between Negroes in Arkansas in Which a Number Are Killed.

A Weekly "Hurrah" in Which Whisky and Guns Played the Most Important Part.

After Operating Successfully for Fourteen Years a Gang of Robbers is Broken Up in West Virginia.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 28.—The Register this morning prints the following: "In formation reached here yesterday of a terrible negro riot at Jordan's Rock, not far from Locksburg, Sevier County, resulting in the death of several and the wounding of many others. Jordan's Rock is a small town situated on the edge of an immense strip of pine timber, many miles from the nearest telegraph office. For some time the negroes in that county have been spending their Saturday nights in a jubilee ceremony in the woods near town, and last Saturday night was regarded as the time for an especially large and uproarious gathering. Great quantities of whisky were introduced, people coming from all over the county to participate in the "hurrah." Shortly after 9 o'clock trouble began in a quarrel between Joseph Jordan and William Newcombe, and it ended in Newcombe shooting Jordan in the breast with a load of turkey shot. The wounded man was carried into the woods, and while the fighting was going on at the grounds he died from his wounds. Meanwhile the utmost confusion prevailed, and while the women scattered to get out of the way, the men fired at each other in a drunken fury, without knowing whom they were aiming at. After the scattering that resulted it was impossible to secure the names of all the wounded and injured, but it is known that several are fatally hurt while others are seriously wounded. Frank Holt is known to be dead with four bullets in his body. While Anderson Neel lay near him, shot three times. These two met in the darkness and promptly began to battle with pistols, killing each other. As soon as the news reached Locksburg a posse of white men started for the scene of the disturbance, but the contestants had all disappeared when they arrived. The grounds were in great disorder, however, and bore evidence of a terrible struggle.

Robber Gang Broken Up
WHEELING, W. Va., Aug. 28.—For the past fifteen years a well organized gang of robbers has been operating in the southwestern part of Greene county, Pa., and the eastern portion of Greene and Wetzel counties, W. Va., and during all that time in Greene county, but there were always enough of the rascals to wear the suspected comrades out of trouble. Saturday last David Garby and Hezekiah Kemble were arrested and taken to the Littleton jail. There Garby made a confession of the details of which extend over a period of fourteen years and including nearly seventy-five robberies. Four other arrests were made at once and many others will follow, thoroughly breaking up the gang.

Information is desired of George Frederick (Fritz) Renner, who came west from St. Louis, Mo., shortly after the war, and perpetrated and mixed in Montana and elsewhere. He was heard from by letter from Barnack, Mont., Nov. 20, 1860, and June 18, 1866, from Marysville, Mont., Dec. 3, 1867; from Barnack City, Mont., March 23, 1874, from Barnack City, April 12, 1874. His last letter was dated at Salmon City, Idaho, Jan. 28, 1875, in which he stated that he was going to Salmon River and would be located about six miles from Salmon City. Renner had "claims" at Bear Gulch, near the Battlement, and in other portions of Montana, as well as the Court of Alaska country. He is also known to have been in Helena some time preceding 1874.
