CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—The editor of the Farmers' Review, being interviewed this evening as to what damage to the corn crop would probably follow the frost at this date, one having been predicted by the signal service, gave it as his opinion that as a general thing the crop is out of the way of frost. Frost would undoubtedly injure late planted corn on low land where a superabundance of moisture tends to make the corn rank and grow to maturity in Wisconsin, where the drought has not appeared, corn is already dry and past injury in the drying districts.
