

BEFORE JUDGE SANDERS.

Lonick Held to Appear at the Next Term of District Court.

A New Complaint is Filed Against Him By a Bank Cashier.

Two Other Forgers Held to the Grand Jury—Other Miscellaneous Criminal Cases.

Business is brisk in Judge Sanders' court, and it is all criminal business. The judge puts in about eight hours a day now, owing to the demands for justice made upon him, and a clerk is employed.

The case of "Doc" N. L. Lonick was the first one called yesterday, the result being that the doctor was bound over to the grand jury in the sum of \$2,000, in default of which he will remain in jail. Several witnesses were examined. Mr. Hardwick related his experience with Lonick. He said having heard the fellow was the representative of wealthy German syndicates, he never thought of the check being worthless, and besides Lonick was losing money at his game and he (Hardwick) was willing that he should lose some more. Lonick asked him to cash the draft, saying it was as good as money, but the bank was closed.

Mr. Woods, Hardwick's partner, said Lonick told him there was no such person as H. Durandt, the name by which the draft was certified.

S. E. Atkinson of the Montana National bank, had a little experience with Lonick and his \$1,000 draft, which he succeeded in passing on at Beck Hamilton. Mr. Rinds, of the Grand Central hotel, introduced him to Mr. Atkinson at the bank, and Lonick then presented the draft for payment. Mr. Atkinson said he would honor it if Lonick would get some responsible person to certify to it. "It's already certified to by the cashier of the Second National bank of New York," said Lonick, and then Mr. Atkinson requested him to leave it in the bank until he could telegraph to New York, but Lonick would not do this, and appeared indignant. He then left the bank and did not come back again.

Mr. Atkinson filed a new complaint against Lonick yesterday charging him with an attempt to fraudulently extort money. This latter case will come up in a few days. After the testimony was all in, Attorney Casey introduced a motion to discharge the defendant on the grounds, first, "That the evidence does not show the check to be fictitious;" second, "that no check has been introduced in evidence;" third, "that there is no evidence showing that H. Durandt, was not or is not in existence." The motion was overruled and the prisoner disposed of as stated.

H. Harris, who was convicted of stealing clothes a few days ago, was released yesterday upon the payment of his fine of \$50 and costs.

"Billy" Baker, the superintendent of the Helena Street railway, discharged a car driver yesterday for being drunk. Charles Linscott was the driver. Baker says Linscott attempted to strike him with a yoke, but he jumped into and trounced him. Both men were smeared with mud when the fight ended; Baker, the smaller and much younger man, getting the best of it. The latter was arrested and will stand trial, which will come up to-day.

The case of Frank Posey, the alleged colored partner of \$40, this being the amount his wife accuses him of stealing from her last spring, was continued until 10 o'clock this morning. Posey was released on bond.

J. H. McKenzie, the \$25-forgery, waived examination and was bound over in the sum of \$500 to await the next term of district court.

Wm. Easton, the other \$25-forgery, was similarly disposed of. H. Hershfield testified against him. It is understood that the sheriff of Meagher county wants Easton for forgery also. The prisoner said he knew the name signed to the check was not anything like G. E. Wilson's handwriting, as he had worked for Mr. Wilson a long time. James Pidge, the wood thief, was given fifteen days free for board and lodging in the county jail.

Another bogus check was presented to George Booker, the auctioneer, yesterday, by the cashier of the Merchants National bank. The check was for \$78.87 and payable to "Albert Neligan or bearer." It was signed with Mr. Booker's name, but the writing was totally unlike his signature. The check was found on the street and probably lost by the forger.

Burned by Electricity.

At an early hour yesterday morning N. J. Muehling, the night electrician at the Helena Steam Power and Light company's works, was severely burned about the hands while transferring a wire from one dynamo to another. The fore finger of his left hand was burned into the bone and will have to be amputated. The back of the right hand was badly burned, the flesh being torn back. The injuries are very painful, and it will be some time before he will be able to resume his work.

Every night at 12:30 o'clock it is Muehling's duty to throw off the alternating dynamo, No. 2, which has a very powerful current of about 2,000 volts. Dynamo No. 1 was running at the same time, and the entire load is transferred to this dynamo every night. In making this change of the wire Muehling was burned as stated. Mr. Muehling is an old Brush electrician.
