A GIRL WHO HIBERNATES.

Curious Phenomenon Reported From the South—Stories of Emily Bacon. A letter from Mt. Auburn, Ala., says: "Miss Emily Bacon, the daughter of a well-known merchant of this town, exhibits a most peculiar phase of nature in her physical constitution. In the spring and summer months the young lady is full of life, is cheerful to gayety and of a blooming beauty, but with the decay of nature in the autumn she will lose her spirits and rosy flush of health, and gradually sink into a helpless torpor or stupor, which seems to be not so much a drowsiness as an actual hibernation.

This stupor grows heavier as winter advances, overpowering her almost completely at mid-winter. She shows a disposition to creep away in some dark place, and cannot be induced to converse or take more than a moment's notice of anything, lapsing back after every attempt to arouse her into a state of semi-somnolence, as if under the influence of a powerful opiate beginning to operate. "She will take food at rare intervals if it is forced on her, but if it is not brought will evince no desire for it. Thinking, perhaps, to awaken her dormant senses by hunger, her family have tried leaving her without offered food until, fearing she would die of inanition, as she did not even appear to miss the food, they were obliged to minister to her. She drinks but little water, and that but rarely, going in search of it, however, when she does want it. She is perfectly amiable and very docile, and when prevented from secreting herself will remain sitting or reclining in place, but without apparently any interest whatever in the matter. She will reply in monosyllables if directly and emphatically addressed, seeming to arouse herself with difficulty from her comatose state. But, though to all appearances so drowsy, she seldom sleeps soundly for more than a few minutes at a time. "During this period of torpidity she does not, as might be expected, become attenuated and exhausted, but continues well and strong, although a pallor, which is not that of ill-health, however, marks her countenance, and a coldness and blue appearance as of congested blood, in her hand and feet, with a sort of clammy perspiration all over her body. When signs of spring begin to appear she gradually begins to assume her vivacity and to take on interest in life. It is then that she shows a great taste for eating the buds of flowers and tender shoots of plants, indeed subsisting almost entirely on such, rejecting with disgust animal food of any sort. "This awakening of hers takes place imperceptibly as a plant might become revitalized or a hibernating animal throw off its torpor. Miss Bacon, who is a very pretty girl of quite a bright and even intellectual turn of mind, says she is only conscious of an uncontrollable inclination to sleep, against which she struggles when it first begins to creep over her, though she soon loses all desire or care for anything. She is unable to recall whether she has any thoughts at all after once succumbing to the soporific influence. Her parents are people of education and means, and are much troubled by this peculiar disposition of their daughter. She is now in her nineteenth year, but they say she has been so since her infancy. They have consulted many physicians of note, who are all at a loss to account for the case, which they unite, however, in pronouncing unique."

Stocks while rather dull to-day were strong all through, and while the movements in most of the lists were confined to an insignificant proportion, the few stocks which made large advances and caused activity in them served to make a moderate day's business. The announcement of the intention to use the steamers of the Pacific Mail company in connection with the Northern Pacific, despite the relations now existing between the Pacific Mail company and the Union Pacific, and the further reduction of rates by the Missouri Pacific is regarded as an evidence of the fight between the Rock Island, Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific, and is to be even more bitter than at present. The recommendation of the ways and means committee on the sugar tariff made sugar refineries the principal feature, and buying on the impression that the new legislation will increase the consumption of sugar and so give employment to idle refineries was sufficient to send certificates up nearly 3 per cent during the forenoon. The market closed firm at about the best prices of the day. Governments steady.
