

JUST HOW MANY BEERS?

A Judge Says a Man Who Drinks That Many Daily is Not Temperate.

But Experts Conclude That the Number Varies With Different Men.

It Depends on Whether Schooners or Ponies Are Used, Likewise on the Kind of Beer.

Recently in the license court of Pittsburg Judge Ewing expressed the opinion that a man who drank five or six glasses of beer a day was not temperate. Such a conclusion is contrary to the experiences of experts.

There are, for instance, in all breweries plenty of men who drink more than that quantity year in and year out, day by day, and are sufficiently sober to keep regularly at their work.

The amount of alcoholic stimulant in an ordinary glass of beer is so small that when five glasses are distributed throughout the working hours of the day they do not produce any perceptible effect.

Any one in the habit of drinking beer can take a glass every three hours without interference with his powers of locomotion or with his working capacity.

The question whether lager beer will intoxicate has long been disputed. There are plenty of men in New York who will testify that they can drink to their full drinking capacity without being affected by beer.

It is a common thing for workmen who are engaged in occupations that cause a great deal of perspiration to drink large quantities of beer without apparent injury.

It is often a disputed question whether a man is drunk or not. Persons who are drunk ought to be experts, frequently mistake sickness for drunkenness, and when they find men limp helpless jump at the conclusion that they are drunk.
