Howe & Williams have leased the Pavilion building on West Granite street and are refitting the old skating rink room preparatory to opening it up for a roller skating rink.

D. J. Powers died at the Sisters' hospital yesterday of typhoid fever after an illness of nearly three weeks. He was working at the Anaconda mine and was well and favorably known to a large circle of friends. His funeral took place at three p. m. Wednesday.

The Silver Bow National bank has removed from Granite to its superb new quarters in the Marcheseau and Valiton building, corner of Granite and Main streets, and is now permanently situated in one of the most centrally located, well lighted and beautifully finished rooms in town.
