Thomas Fowler, who has a ranch about four miles southwest of town, threshed last week, and from one piece of ground which measured exactly nine acres, he obtained one thousand bushels of oats. This is not a bad showing for a dry season.

Messrs. Sanborn & Brooks, of Moreland, shipped eight carloads of horses and two carloads of mules from their stock range on Willow creek Wednesday, their destination being Moberly, Mo., where they expect to find a remunerative market for their stock.

A man named Loebenstein, who has been with a threshing crew in the valley for some time, got up in the middle of the night, nearly dead, and attacked the crew with a volley of stones. He was secured by three of the party, brought to town and upon due examination was found to be insane. He will be sent to the Warm Springs asylum.

Will C. Houston, who has about completed the work of taking the school census in the Bozeman district, reports that he finds 762 between the ages of 21 and four years and 236 below the age of four, making an aggregate of 998. By taking the recent arrivals and picking up a few stragglers that he may have overlooked, he will no doubt be able to raise the number to an even 1,000.

Mr. Frank Armstrong has sold his handsome frame residence and lots on Central avenue to Mr. A. K. Yerkes, editor of the Chronicle. Consideration \$4,400. How is this for a crop? Peter Carlson, who is cultivating Miss Kent's ranch on Cottonwood creek, recently threshed 3,500 bushels of wheat, oats and barley from 120 acres. Twenty-five acres of oats yielded 104 bushels to the acre and weighed forty pounds per bushel, and forty acres of barley yielded sixty-four bushels per acre. It is only the wonderfully fertile soil in the famous Gallatin valley that can produce such crops as these.

Although this has not been a very remarkable year for heavy crops in Gallatin valley, we are informed that our old-time friend, Mr. C. H. Waterman, recently threshed out 3,300 bushels of grain on his farm on Middle creek. His crop was principally oats and yielded over fifty bushels per acre, which is not bad considering that they run about forty pounds to the measured bushel, and are worth from \$1.20 to \$1.40 per hundred pounds in the Bozeman market.

Neihart and Barker will be commenced next week. The Bonds Land and Cattle company have purchased of S. C. Gibson the TL ranch, of 80 acres, adjoining the company's land near Choteau.

H. E. Randall and Eugene Prior have formed a partnership in the real estate and abstract business. James Barnes, of the real estate firm of Barnes & Collett, has sold out to Mr. Collett and will soon take up his residence in Minneapolis.

The Valeria Library association has completed plans and will commence at once the erection of a handsome library building on First avenue north. The building will be completed before January 1st.

Thursday morning a Continental Oil company car was burned on the Great Northern track near S. C. Ashby & Co.'s implement warehouse. A conference of the Congregational church met yesterday, and after examining Mr. Peterson, of Butte, organized a church. The organization and ordination services were interesting and impressive.

One Lidner attacked John Carlson Tuesday with a pick, frightfully bruising Carlson's head and cutting his back. Carlson is unable to appear in court and Lidner is held to await the result of Carlson's injuries. Gibson will start the smelter at Hughesville on the 15th on ore from the Barker mine.

A force of men have been set to work in the Barker mine to put it in good shape after years of idleness. Mike Wilson struck a large body of rich ore in the Wyndot at Barker. That camp is livelier than it has been for years.
