The matter of building a court house was submitted to a vote of the people about a year ago, and the proposition was overwhelmingly defeated. It is not generally considered, however, that a fair expression on the question was had, as at that time it is said the commissioners had been doing a little "financing" on the quiet, which did not meet the approval of the people, and the vote was a condemnation of their method of purchasing a court house site. The land was purchased secretly and the money paid long before the county received a deed. Should another election be ordered, without much doubt the court house proposition would carry.

NOT BULLET-PROOF.

Erroneous Declaration of a Medicine Man at Wounded Knee.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Secretary Proctor and Noble and Gen. Schofield had a conference at the war department this afternoon in regard to the Indian troubles, and agreed to recommend to the president the appointment of an officer of the army as agent of the Indians at Pine Ridge agency, thus necessitating the retirement of Indian Agent Royer from that duty. The officer so appointed will, however, retain his position in the army. The Indian agents at other agencies will not be disturbed, but as shown in Gen. Schofield's telegram of the 4th instant to Gen. Miles, army officers have been designated to take military control of four other agencies, with instructions to cooperate with agents of the interior department. The report that these agents had been displeased is without foundation, except so far as relates to the Pine Ridge agency; Capt. Pierce, of the First Infantry, has been selected as agent at Pine Ridge, and will probably be appointed by the president to-morrow. A message embodying the facts given above has been sent by Gen. Schofield to Gen. Miles.

Secretary Proctor is considerably exercised over newspaper reports of a controversy between the war and interior departments in regard to the management of the Indian campaign. He said this afternoon that the two departments were in perfect harmony in the matter and authorizes the most emphatic denial of any report indicating the slightest friction between the two departments.

The commissioner of Indian affairs has received a long report from the agent at Pine Ridge about the Wounded Knee fight, according to which the fight was started by the medicine man of Big Foot's band. When soldiers were searching the tepees for arms, he suddenly began to cry out, "Kill the soldiers; their bullets won't have any effect on our ghost spirits." At the same time he threw up a handful of dirt into the air. After a short programme he fired his gun in the direction of the military and this started the fight.

TOO MANY LIES.

An Old Buck Says They are the Cause of the Trouble.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Capt. E. L. Higgins, at army division headquarters here, received a dispatch this evening from Assistant Adjutant General Corbin, at Pine Ridge, saying a number of Indians are coming to the agency from the camp of the hostiles. How many of the savages are en route it was impossible to approximate. According to the dispatch the general situation had not greatly changed from the day preceding. The message said the difficulty was well expressed by one old Indian who to-day put in an appearance at Pine Ridge. He declared that the trouble is that too many lies are passing in both directions between

Senator Teller received a dispatch from Denver signed by all the republican members of the senate and legislature, which met Wednesday to elect a United States senator, expressing confidence in him and stating that their votes would be cast for him.

Silver offered Wednesday amounted to 1,395,000 ounces, of which 628,000 ounces were purchased at prices ranging from 104.92 to 105.25.

Rome, Jan. 8.—A terrible snow storm accompanied by a violent gale is raging on the gulf of Trieste and along the shores. The severest cold weather known to the present generation prevails in the olive growing region of Italy. A violent rain storm prevailed here.
