Some months ago, it will be remembered, one Nellie King, a young lady of uncertain social standing and masculine propensities, took it into her head to do the cowboy act. She was noticed first driving about the city, with a broad-brimmed hat set jauntily on her curls, in a training suit, and often her fair form was the center of many glances about the city streets on the backs of fleg Kentucky steeds. It was during these days that she met and loved George, the defendant, notwithstanding the fact that he was the property of another woman. Soon she appeared to him of the conventional mode of coquetry exercises, and after dark tried it in a clothes-pin. BLIZZARD AND FOG.

Together They Create Havoc From Chicago Westward.

Chicago, Jan. 30.—A heavy fog overhung this city and adjacent country Wednesday night and continued this morning. Telegraphic communication in all directions is almost completely paralyzed. Dispatches from Minnesota, Northern Wisconsin, Iowa and Nebraska report that a severe snow storm raged in those sections yesterday and continues to-day. Omaha reports that traffic on the railroad west is suspended. The Union Pacific train from the west is indefinitely behind time. Passenger trains from the west are run in two sections with engines each. The Golden Gate express on the Union Pacific is reported blocked at Columbus, Hastings, Neb., reports the street car traffic suspended on account of the storm, with a blizzard raging further west.

The Palo Alto Sale.

New York, Jan. 30.—Stanford's Palo Alto sale closed to-day. One hundred and twenty-two horses have been sold for \$123,000. The sales on the whole were not as satisfactory as those of last year, and the average prices received were not as good.


